NOTES FROM THE CHAIR

When and where did the idea behind WFYR begin?



The official history of the World Federation of YMCA Retires (WFYR) states it started at Geneva Park in Canada in 1994. But the concept behind WFYR started more than 100 years earlier. Let me explain:

In 1877 the first national organization of Christian college student groups was formed in Louisville, KY. Then, during a meeting of the National Board of the YMCA of the USA, **Luther Wishard**, a student at Princeton

University, invited students from other associations to meet separately from the adults. Twenty-five students representing twenty-one colleges – three of them black – met and formed the Intercollegiate YMCA.

Although Wishard was a missionary candidate, the YMCA asked him to be a full-time staff member assigned to work with students in US colleges. By 1888 he had spent four years travelling overseas, helping more than 2,100 men and women student volunteer missionaries. He returned and helped form the "Foreign" department of the YMCA, today's International Division

What is the connection you ask? – the YMCA of the USA has worked closely with YMCAs around the world to strengthen their work, and our own, in partnership with one another. The concept and purpose of WFYR was in the minds of YMCA

leaders, world-wide, well before 1994!

What is my persone connection to <u>Luther</u>? Well, a relation of his, <u>Glenn P. Wishard</u>, also served the YMCA movement overseas, and married a woman, <u>Leonette</u>, who traveled with him, as YMCA missionaries, spending some time as a WW II Prisoner of War when they served the YMCA in China. While attending a supper at my local church, I sat across the table from a very old lady and said hello. It was <u>Leonette Wishard</u>. It was an interesting, and inspiring, supper hour listening to her talk

about the important work the Wishard family did for the YMCA. I was always a "YMCA internationalist", but my conversation with Leonette, who lived to 109 years young, just strengthened my commitment.


Is the international dimension of the YMCA movement important? Is our partnership with various movements around the world important for all? Is the Christian heritage of the YMCA vital? The

Canadians are working to increase and retain Y retirees and long-term volunteers. There are major challenges to enrollment and retention facing the Canadian YMCA Alumni.

There is no system to connect Y retirees after they leave the Y from our Retirement Fund. Another challenge is our "value proposition." Some members are not renewing because they do not perceive a value in their association with the Alumni.

Through personal connections we have developed a list of retired YMCA staff and are surveying them to better understand their awareness of our organization and understand their needs. We plan to share the results with WFYR and would be pleased to hear insights and relevant reports from other WFYR groups dealing with similar issues.

New President for Y's Retired of the UK


Y's retired UK announces the appointment of **Rev Graham Clarke** to succeed **Jim Lamb** as President who has been in post for 11 years.

As a staff member Graham was President of the APS (the UK Staff Association) and involved in the APS/APD exchange programme, the planning and

management of the 150th Anniversary Youth Event in 1994 as well as European Secretaries Conferences in Germany and Ireland.

He is currently Minister of Marshalswick Baptist Free Church in St Albans, the home of Britain's first Saint where he is also involved in Christian Youth Work in Schools.

A Personal Glimpse of John R. Mott's Legacy by John Schmiechen

Many YMCA retirees know me, from my work with the Chicago and Philadelphia Associations, as a member of the East Field and National Financial Development staffs, and now with the Central Atlantic Chapter of YMCA Alumni.

Some of you know my husband, <u>Theodore Hall</u>
<u>Schmiechen, (ne' Lewis)</u>. I am eager to share with you how Ted is connected to the great YMCA leader, <u>John R. Mott</u>. This came as a great surprise as I got to know the Lewis/Hall family. As most of you know, Mott was a major YMCA leader, "Father of the Modern Ecumenical Movement," and recipient of the Noble Peace Prize.

Ted's great-grandfather, **Raymond S. Hall**, graduated with an engineering degree from Worcester Polytechnic Institute. During those college years, he was involved in the student Christian movement. Certainly, the young men who, like Ray, enlisted in the Movement lived up to the famous directive, "Expect great things *from* God. Attempt great things *for* God!"

Upon his graduation, Mott approached Ray with a request that would impact three generations of the Hall family. Although Ray had no formal theological training, that was not a problem. Mott needed an engineer to do the Lord's work. Mott asked Ray to go to China where the Tientsin YMCA needed a teacher of math and physics. So, with the divine care and direction of God, Raymond began an amazing lifetime career as a YMCA General Secretary.

At Tientsin, he enrolled nearly 600 students in bible study and led many students to baptism. His teaching career led him to larger callings. After a six-year stint as General Secretary of the Tientsin YMCA, he was appointed as administrator of the famine relief program after disastrous floods in North China. For this, he was decorated by the Chinese Government. He was then appointed to administer a nationwide building program in China, and during the course of six years, utilizing his engineering skills, oversaw the design and construction of ten new YMCAs. Ray then received orders from Mott (working at the YMCA headquarters in New York), to travel to remote parts of China to report on the feasibility of organizing YMCAs there. During these years, Ray and Great-grandmother **Margaret** became close personal friends of Chiang Kai Shek.

After the invasion of the Japanese military, Ray escaped to Calcutta and eventually joined a 72 ship naval convoy on a slow freighter through the sub-infested Atlantic to Maine.

After 37 years of service with the YMCA, Ray did not settle down but, due to his intimate knowledge of China, his photographic memory for people and places, and his fluency in writing and speaking the Chinese language, took a position with the UN Relief Agency and then the CIA. In these capacities, he was able to continue to help solve the relief problems of people in China as he had done while living amongst them.

Ray lived a full life and raised a family, including Ted's grandmother <u>Christine</u> who married his grandfather <u>Ardron</u> <u>Lewis</u> in Nanking. Christine later returned to China with Ardron who was serving as an agricultural economist for the US State Department. (It was then that he and Christine became close friends with <u>Pearl Buck</u>.) Indeed, Mott was proud of his young missionary Ray. Certainly God "preserved his going out and coming in," to quote the familiar words of the 121st Psalm. He was a true servant of the Lord.

The <u>Raymond S. Hall</u> collection at the YMCA Archives in Minneapolis is extensive, and according to the staff, among the most visited. Ted has contributed several documents to these archives.

As was said at Ray's memorial service, we are reminded of the words of St. Paul, "I have fought a good fight; I have finished my course; I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day; and not to me only, but unto all them also who love his appearing." It was in this same triumphant vein that Paul wrote to the Christians at Philippi, "For me to live is Christ; to die is gain." It was thus, likewise, with Ray.

Love and Understand the Bible

"We had a moving week with many spiritual impulses, inspiring experiences and encounters in fraternal spirit behind us." With these words **Klaus Jürgen Diehl**



summarized his impressions at the

farewell of the CSI meeting week in the town of Rothenburg ob der Tauber. There were 117 men and women who met in the Evangelical Wildbad Conference Center, a historic building in the lovely Tauber valley, built in 1903 as a first class. health resort.

Professor **Johannes Berthold** gave the Bible studies in the Rococo Hall. He taught at the University of Applied Sciences for Religious Education and Community social welfare work in the town of Moritzburg and was chairman of the Saxon Community Association until his retirement last year. He got to the bottom of passages and put Jesus Christ at the center of his reflections, because the theme of the week was: "For no one can lay any foundation other than



the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 3:11).

" It is not enough to love the Bible, you also have to understand it," Faith must also take

intellectual responsibility. The Bible studies not only the addressed the mind but also the heart. Berthold said: "I need God like the air that I breath". He invited us to trust God and to open our hearts using the words of the psalms.

Pastor Peter Siemens, member of Open Doors, an organization in service for persecuted Christians worldwide, reported on life-threatening challenges for Christians. According to Peter Siemens, 200 million Christians cannot live their faith freely. As an example, in Bangladesh, only 0.3 percent of the population are Christians and they are placed at a disadvantage by the vast majority. "Christians in persecution need encouragement," pastor Siemens said, asking for intercessory prayers for them.

There were guided tours in the city of Nuremberg

including churches and as well a visit to the former Reichsparteitagsgelände (site of the Nazi Party rallies). During a half-day excursion to the town of Creglingen, the Herrgottskirche was visited. That marvelous church is known for the Altar of Mary, considered the masterpiece of Würzburg artist Tilman Riemenschneider. The medieval town of Rothenburg ob der Tauber was also explored, including the St. James' Church. The Altar of Sacred Blood in St James church is another excellent example of the work of Riemenschneider.

All in all, it was again an encounter week with a packed program. *By Udo Waschelitz*
