

Last month's letter I wrote about the 20th anniversary of 9/11 and there was to be a service of remembrance that day in Lake Mills. I am thankful to be a part of that service and to listen and see the crowd that gathered to remember. Many people shared stories, experiences, and personal feelings about that day 20 years ago. The emotions were running high and it was as if these events happened only last week. On my way home from the service I was listening to a radio broadcast titled, I don't have enough faith to be an atheist. One of the presenters related the raw feelings, emotions and details that are still very present in the minds of those who witnessed these events were like the details in the gospel accounts of the bible. The gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John were written many years after Jesus' death and a strong critique is how could the writers of the gospels get all of the details right and accurate?

The gospel of Mark is the first gospel to be written and it was written about 30 years after Jesus' crucifixion. How could the witnesses remember the events of that day enough to give an accurate account? This was a traumatic, highly public event so it is easy to agree that they would have remembered every single detail of that day just as we can remember everything about 9/11. The images, where they were, what was said would be as vivid 30 years later as it was that very day. The sight of Jesus hanging on the cross, what the crowds were doing, who was there, the soldiers gambling for his clothes. We can believe these details to be accurate.

The Holy Spirit had a hand in the writing of the gospels and helping them to remember what had taken place. In John 2, Jesus talks about destroying the temple and rebuilding it in 3 days. The disciples did not know what Jesus meant by that but remembered it after his death and resurrection. "Therefore, when He had risen from the dead, His disciples remembered that He had said this to them; and they believed the Scripture and the word which Jesus had said" (John 2:22).

The bible is great literature because it contains poetry, wisdom, inspirational stories, and historical details of that day. It is God's word, written by many authors guided by the Holy Spirit and contains one overarching theme. Enjoy God's word given to you.

During August in Iowa, we have seen an unprecedented number of severe storms and tornados. The Iowa UMC Chainsaw Teams have been working in the communities of Earlville, Cedar Rapids, Marble Rock, <u>Manchester</u>, Charles City, Hazelton, Marshalltown, Hiawatha, Robins, Palo, Todd Ville and Marion, logging more than 850 hours of volunteer time in August alone.

Ingathering 2020 brought many changes, and some of those are continuing. Our partnership with Midwest Mission Distribution Center grows stronger and stronger. In 2020, they distributed \$10.8 million worth of supplies, up from \$3.5 million in 2019 – and their number of volunteers/ because of Covid was 70% less! Wow!! That the Holy Spirit is at work, for sure.

#### ARE YOU A MISSIONARY IN YOUR COMMUNITY?

When we think of missionaries, we often have an image of persons who travel to far-away places. However, as disciples of Christ Jesus, all of us through our baptism are called to be the mission of the church in whatever community we find ourselves as Christians. The 2021 Mission Ingathering is less than two months away (Saturday, November 6<sup>th</sup>).



- 20 ziplock bags


For Layette kits, we have a few items on hand; and for Student kits, we have enough to complete seven more kits, including the one-handled bags, plus a few extra items

**UMCOR Cleaning Kit** Previously known as the "Flood Bucket" (\$75 Value)



## Kit Contains:

- One five-gallon round bucket with resealable lid (14.35" h x 12.19" w x 12.19" d) No screw lids. Can be gently used if there is no residual residue.
- One 32-64 oz. bottle liquid laundry detergent
- One 16-40 oz. bottle liquid concentrate household cleaner -No spray cleaners
- One 16-34 oz. bottle dish soap
- One scrub brush
  - -With or without handle
- One 4-8 oz, pump spray air freshener
- One 6-14 oz. pump spray insect repellent (pack of 10-20 wipes also acceptable)
- Pump spray bottles must have protective covers
- One scrub brush
- 18 re-useable cleaning wipes No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels
- Five scouring pads -No stainless-steel pads with soap in them
- 36-50 clothespins
- One 50-100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic line)
- 24 roll of heavy-duty trash bags (33-45-gallon sizes)
- Five N95 particulate respirator dust masks (1-3 mm thickness) No surgical masks
- Two pairs kitchen gloves
- One pair work gloves -Cotton with leather palm or all leather


