


150th Anniversary Update





NOTES FROM YOUR PARISH NURSE

Choosing a Nursing Home

Currently, I am working as a case manager. As a case manager, I meet with patients and their families to determine where the patient wants to go upon discharge from the hospital. Patients may go home, they might go home with home health care, or they may need to go to a nursing facility for a short rehab stay or for long term.

Odds are high that someone in your family will need a nursing home sooner or later. A majority of people over age 65 will require some type of long-term care services during their lifetime, and over 40 percent of people will need a period of care in a nursing

home, according to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

Once the decision has been made for a nursing home- how do you choose a facility? The number one reason most facilities are chosen is the location is close to home. Talking with other individuals who may have been at a nursing home or had a loved one at a nursing home may give you an honest opinion of the facility. It is important to understand that two individuals at the same facility may have two completely different experiences. It is important to do your own research on two to three nursing facilities prior to choosing which facility is best for your needs or the needs of a loved one.

When visiting a nursing home look around:

Safety hazards aren't always obvious. For example, you should look for frayed carpets and other potential fall hazards.

Adequate staffing is critical to a safe and healthy environment. Without enough nurses and aides, care suffers. A resident with shaky hands who doesn't get the help she needs at meals can become malnourished. An infirm resident who has to wait to get help with toileting can develop a urinary tract infection that could progress to a life-threatening blood infection or kidney failure. Ask about the patient to staff ratios.

You can pick up signs that staff members respect and care about residents in the small interactions. Before entering a room, for example, do nurses knock? Do staffers address residents casually and impersonally, or politely and by name?

Find out ways the staff keeps residents occupied throughout the day. You don't want Mom in the hall in a wheelchair all day.

In the end, a home has to be affordable. A year in a nursing home now costs an average of close to \$100,000, and not all charges are obvious. Some homes, for example, tack on fees for physical therapy or dentist appointments. Medicare only pays for short stays following hospitalization, and Medicaid—which not every home accepts—requires depleting most of a resident's assets.

If you would like more information on the questions to ask when choosing a nursing home- there are copies of "Your Nursing Home Checklist" from U.S. News and World Report on the table across from the office.


Figures printed in red are those amounts not meeting budgeted giving.

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. ² Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God-- what is good and acceptable and perfect. (Romans 12:1-2)

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from Jesus Christ, whom we worship and adore, amen.

What does worship mean to you? How important is worship in the life of a Christian? Can a good person be a Christian without worship on a weekly basis? These are all really important questions for Christians to consider. I just finished a really good book by Michael Foss titled "Real Faith for Real Life: The Six Marks of Disci-

pleship." In this book Foss said, "Worship is about the coming of God. In the midst of the Scripture reading, the preaching, and singing God shows up. In worship, people who long to connect with the Spirit can heal their heart's hunger." In every book I've read on discipleship weekly worship is an extremely important mark, or sign of what makes one a disciple of Jesus Christ. This is so because Jesus promised where two or more are gathered In His Name He is there among them. God is present when hymns or songs of praise are sung, when prayers are said, when the Scriptures are read, and when the sacraments are celebrated. In worship, which is less about what we do or how we do it and more about the One in whom we gather, the longing of our souls is touched by God's Holy Spirit and we encounter the living God. Worship is God's gift to your soul...

The human soul that does not worship shrinks into itself and is far less than it was created to be. There's an old story about a pastor who noticed a member had been absent from worship for quite some time and he decided he would pay the man a visit. He knocked on the man's door and was invited to sit in a chair near the cozy fireplace. The two men sat in silence for several minutes. During this time the absentee parishioner kept waiting to the pastor to rebuke him for failing to come to Church services. Instead the two sat in silence. Finally, the pastor took one of the fireplace tools that was hanging next to the fire and nudged a burning hot coal from the center of the fire. He moved it off to the side, a few inches away from the red hot flames. As the two men continued to gaze at the captivatingly beautiful fire the coal that had been set aside cooled off. In fact it stopped glowing altogether and turned cold and black. Noticing this change, the pastor took the fireplace tool and nudged the coal back close to the center of the blazing fire. The coal almost immediately returned to its former red hot state. A few minutes went by without a word being spoken and the pastor got up and walked to the door. At this point the man was in tears and promised the pastor he would be at worship the very next Sunday. And he was...

Another story I love is told by a professor I had at seminary. He was at a Christian music concert and was seated next to a rather long haired hippy sort of fellow. This man was clearly into the music and loved to sing about Jesus. My professor commented to this person about how much he seemed to be enjoying the concert and the man said he really loved Jesus and loved to sing about Him. When asked about his Church and where he attended the man admitted he didn't attend any Church services at all. My curious professor asked him why he didn't attend and the man said the music, preaching and all that praying were too boring and the service lasted too long. Upon hearing this my professor again asked the man if he loved Jesus and the man said he would die for Jesus... To this my professor replied something along the lines of, "so, you love Jesus enough to die for Him, but not enough to be bored for an hour or two on a Sunday?"

I know February has some bad weather and it might be cold outside, and we might sing songs that are unfamiliar and boring. There might even come a day when you might think the pastor's sermon is boring (although I doubt that's possible...). In fact, I guarantee there will be Sundays when you just don't feel like dragging yourself out of bed to get to Church. On those days, I ask you to consider, "Do you love Jesus enough to be bored for an hour or so?"

For Christians, worship isn't an optional thing—it's what we do! As your pastor, I don't expect everyone to be in Church every single week, but as a follower and disciple of the risen Christ I pray it's so important for the health of your soul that you desire to be present with the living Christ as an essential member of His Body as often as you are able and that worship becomes such a priority in your life that little other can lay claim to Sunday morning.

May you find rest, refreshment, and rebirth every time we worship together. May your fire never become cold because you separated yourself from the source of the flame. And may you be a living sacrifice Holy and acceptable to God each and every time you present yourself to Him in His House for Worship. Amen.
