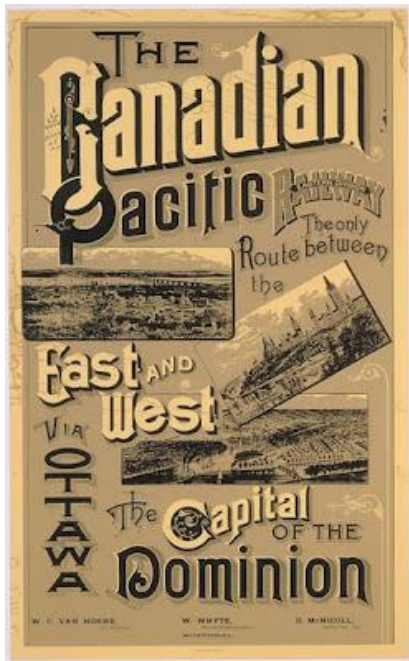

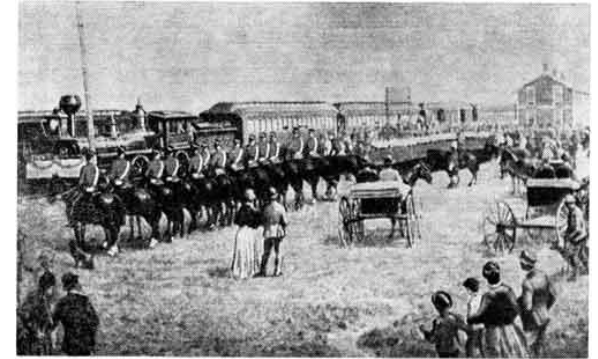

Sept 1905 Alberta become a Province

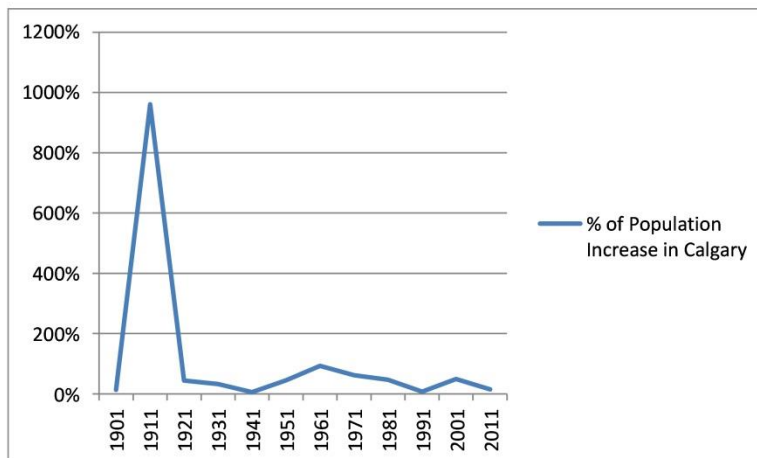
Impacts to Calgary/World Growth

Inexpensive land and a new life for immigrants create a rush.

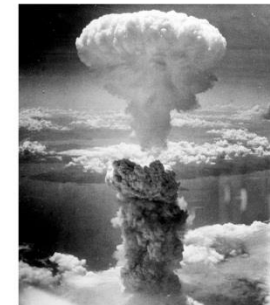


First World War impact 1914 to 1918

THE GOLF CLUB

Over 120 Names Enrolled as Members—Plans Made for Season

At a crowded meeting of golfers held on Saturday night in the offices of Messrs. Broomfield and Sellar, at 14 Alexander corner, there was formally inaugurated a new golf club, which is certain to play a big part in the athletic life of the city. There are many sets of golf clubs stowed away in the corners of rooms which have seen much service in far-off lands, and have lain unused for a long time owing to the lack of facilities for play. These will shortly be gripped and handled, and the shout of "fore!" will re-echo through the Bow valley.

Already 120 names have been enrolled, among them some of the most prominent citizens of Calgary. The membership is limited to 250, and applications are pouring in, so those who desire to join and have not intimated their intention will require to do so at once. The subscription is \$10 for gentlemen and \$5 for ladies, who will be admitted under reasonable restrictions.

Through the kindness of E. H. Riley, ground has been secured free of charge on the heights adjoining Parkdale, lying on a plateau and tapering to a point. The course commands magnificent views with the city lying at its feet on the east and the Rockies towering along the sky line on the west. A course of eighteen holes has been already sketched out, and a green committee appointed to have the course put in order at the earliest possible moment.

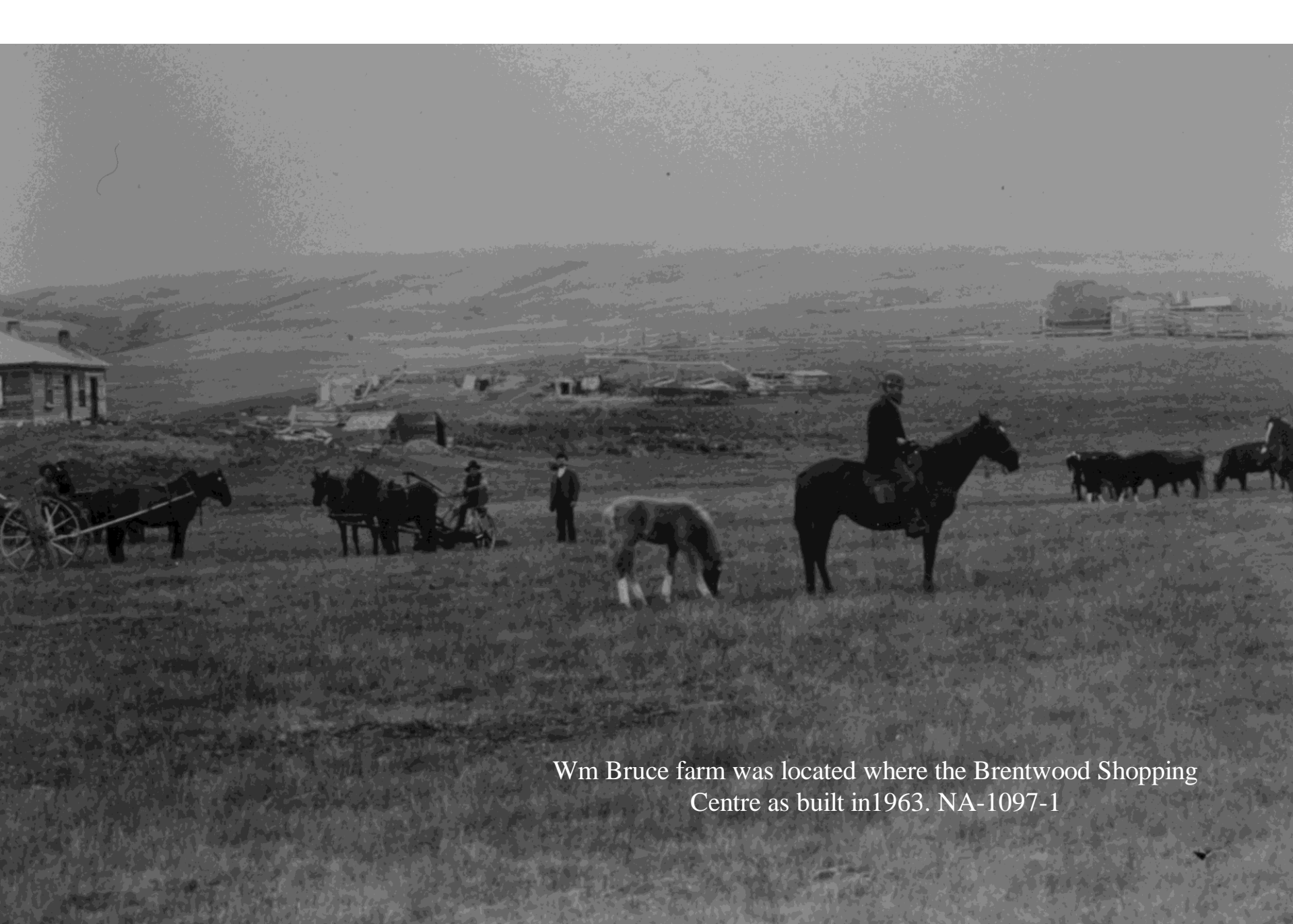

LOCAL RULES

1. All play shall be governed strictly by the Golf Rules as established by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club except as modified by these local regulations. All points in dispute shall be referred to the Committee, and the judgment of the Committee shall be final.

2. A ball lying in a gopher hole or partially filled gopher hole may be lifted and dropped without penalty. A ball played into a gopher hole, unless recovered, must be treated as a lost ball.

3. A ball played through any fence is out of bounds and the player shall play his next stroke as nearly as possible at the spot from which the ball which is out of bounds was played. If the ball was played out of bounds from the tee, a player may tee a ball for his next stroke; in every other case the ball shall be dropped. The penalty is loss of distance only.

4. A ball resting on or against a stone or within twelve inches of an immovable stone or within two club lengths from a tree or planted shrub may be lifted and dropped not nearer the hole, without penalty.

5. A ball lying on an old green, may, or if lying on any green in use other than the one being played to, must be lifted and dropped off the green, not nearer to the hole, without penalty.

6. **Putting Greens.**—A player may (a) remove any grass or roots growing on the green; (b) pick up the ball when matting the green; (c) remove any sand or dirt adhering to the ball on the putting green; (d) lift and place (but not on the green) any ball lying on the green and so close to the edge of the green that the player is interfered with in playing his next stroke, without penalty.

7. No roads, trails or paths are hazards.

8. No players shall start from the tenth tee unless the ninth fairway is vacant.

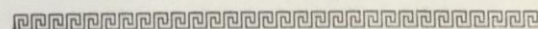

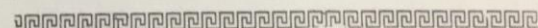

HANDICAPS—In match play, (i.e. hole and hole) $\frac{1}{2}$ of the difference between the handicaps is the number of strokes allowed for singles. For foursome or four-ball games, allow $\frac{1}{2}$ of difference of combined handicaps. Fractions of $\frac{1}{2}$ and over count as 1. In medal play (i.e. stroke play) the full handicap is allowed. $\frac{1}{2}$ handicap in par competitions.

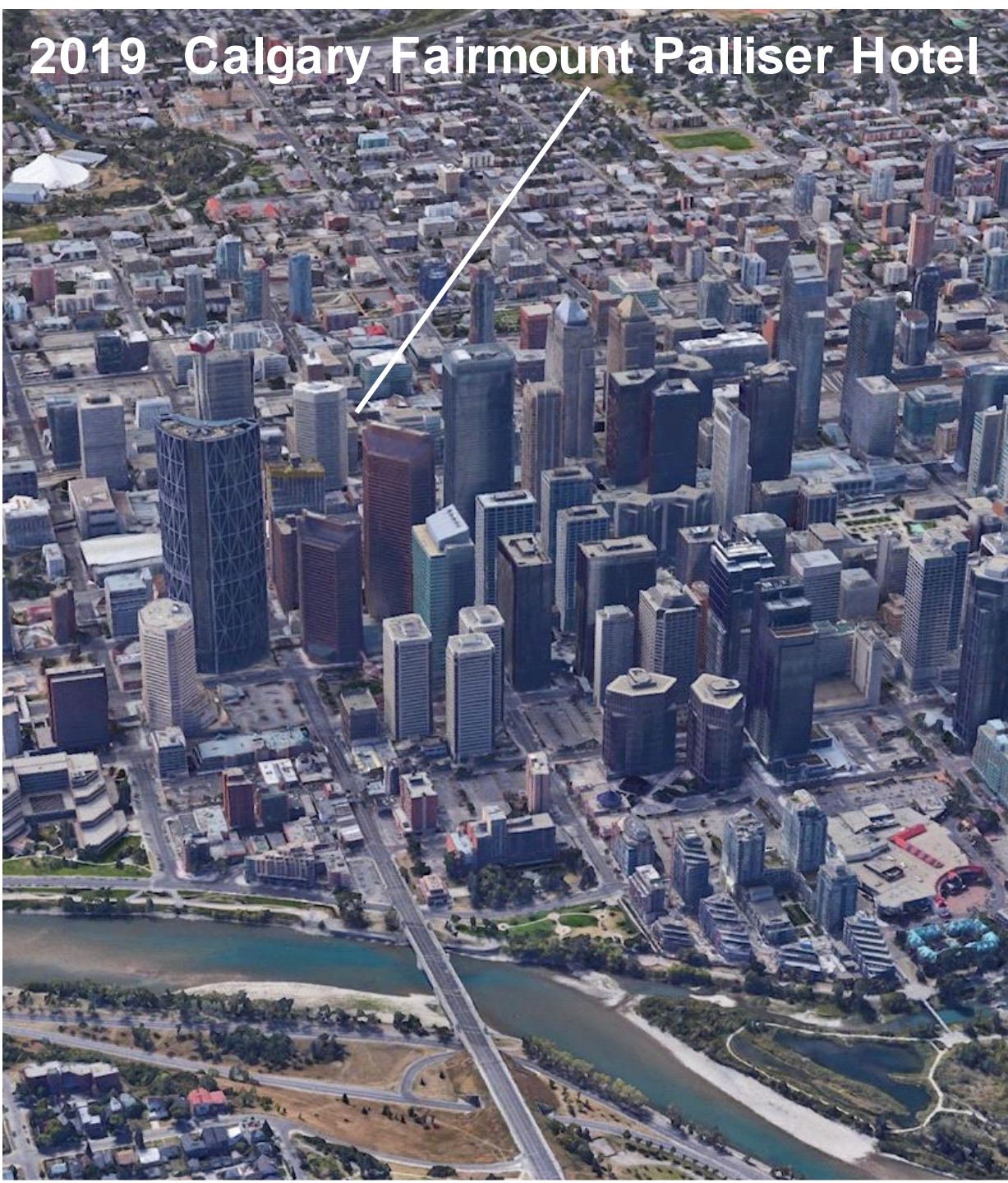

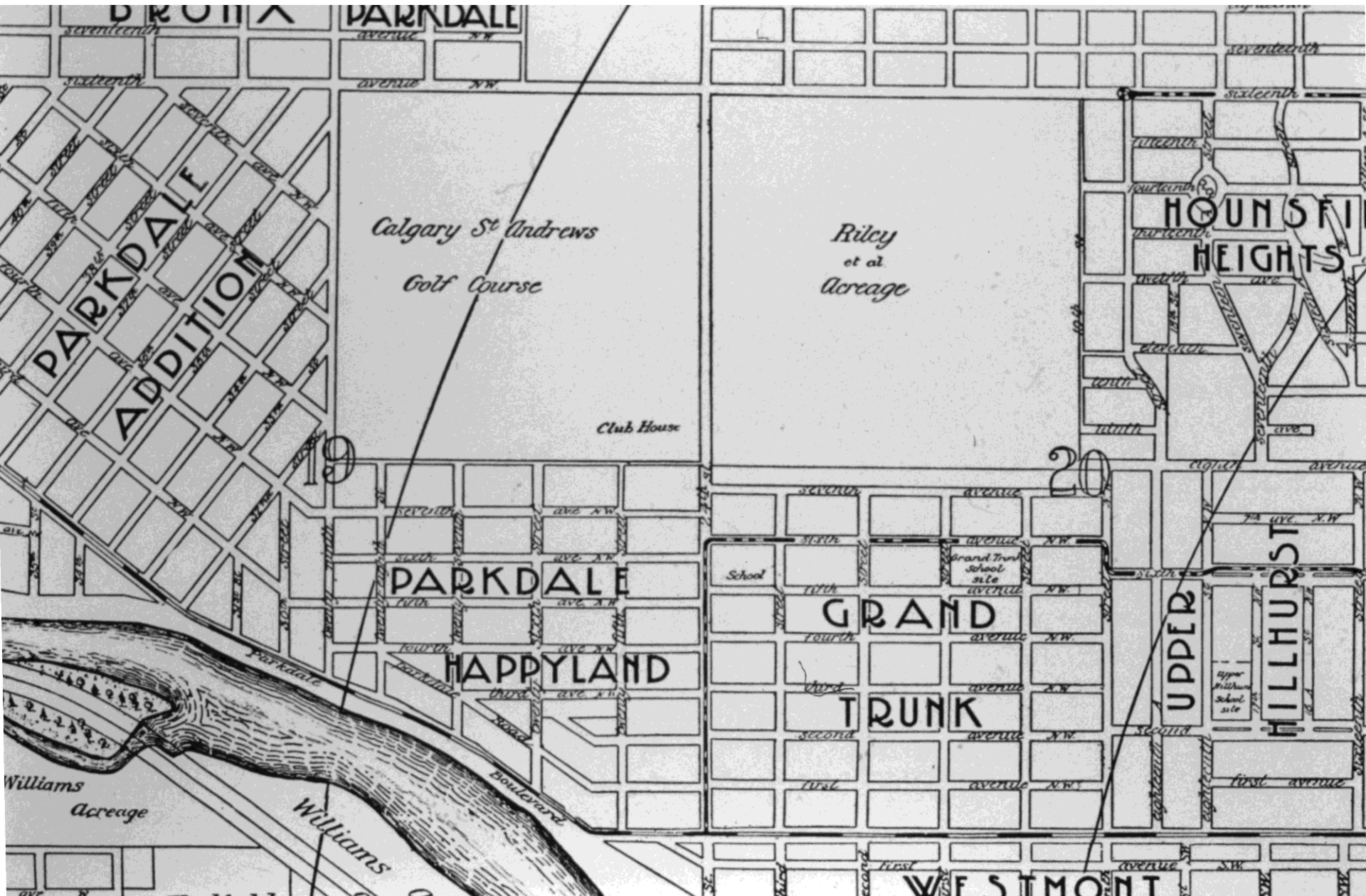

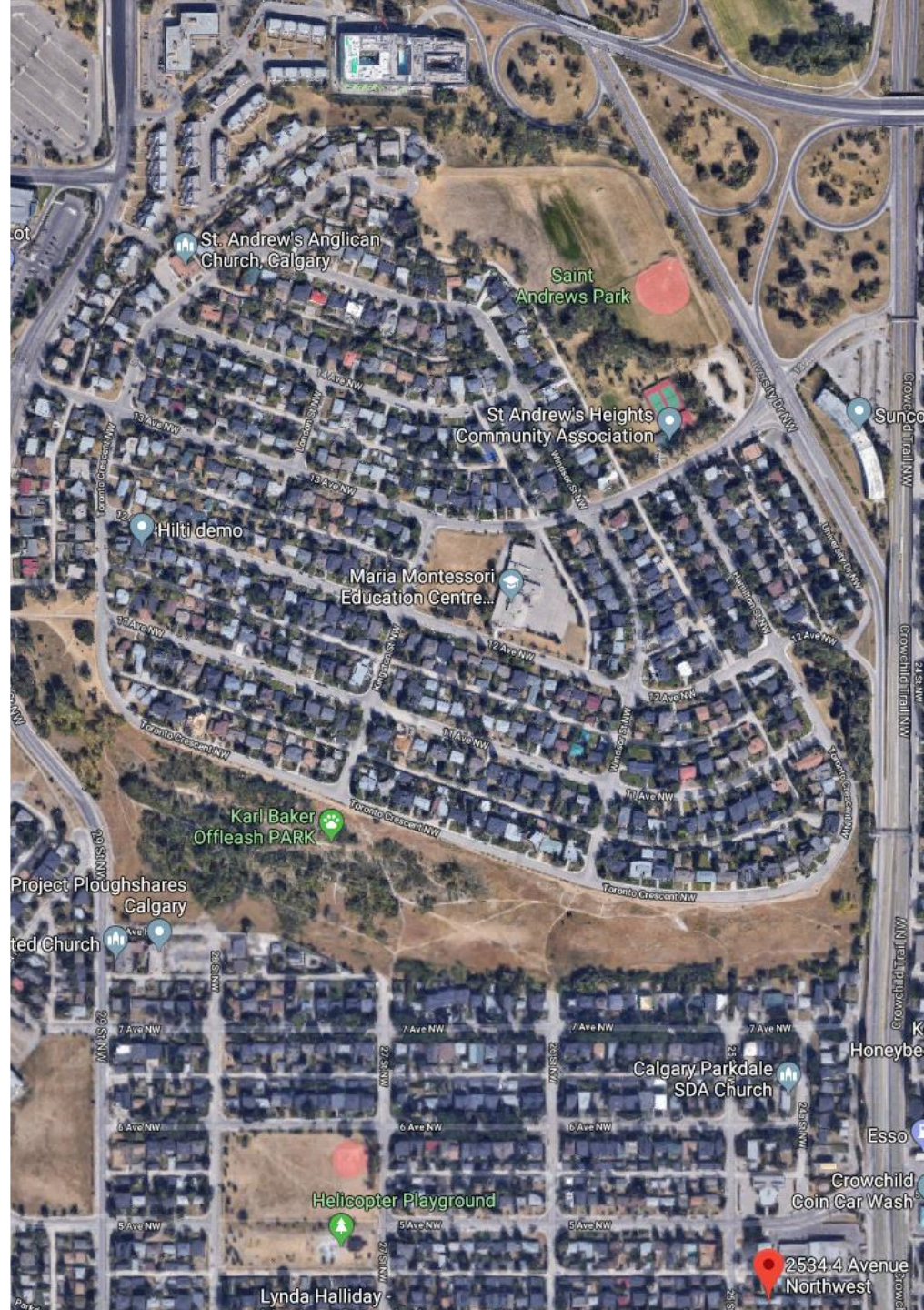

View of Calgary St Andrew's Golf Club from 2534-4 Ave NW in Parkdale in late 1920's





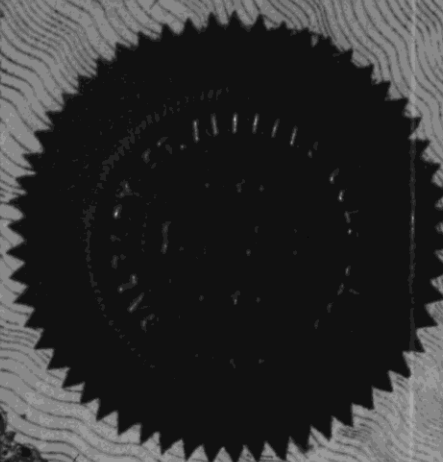

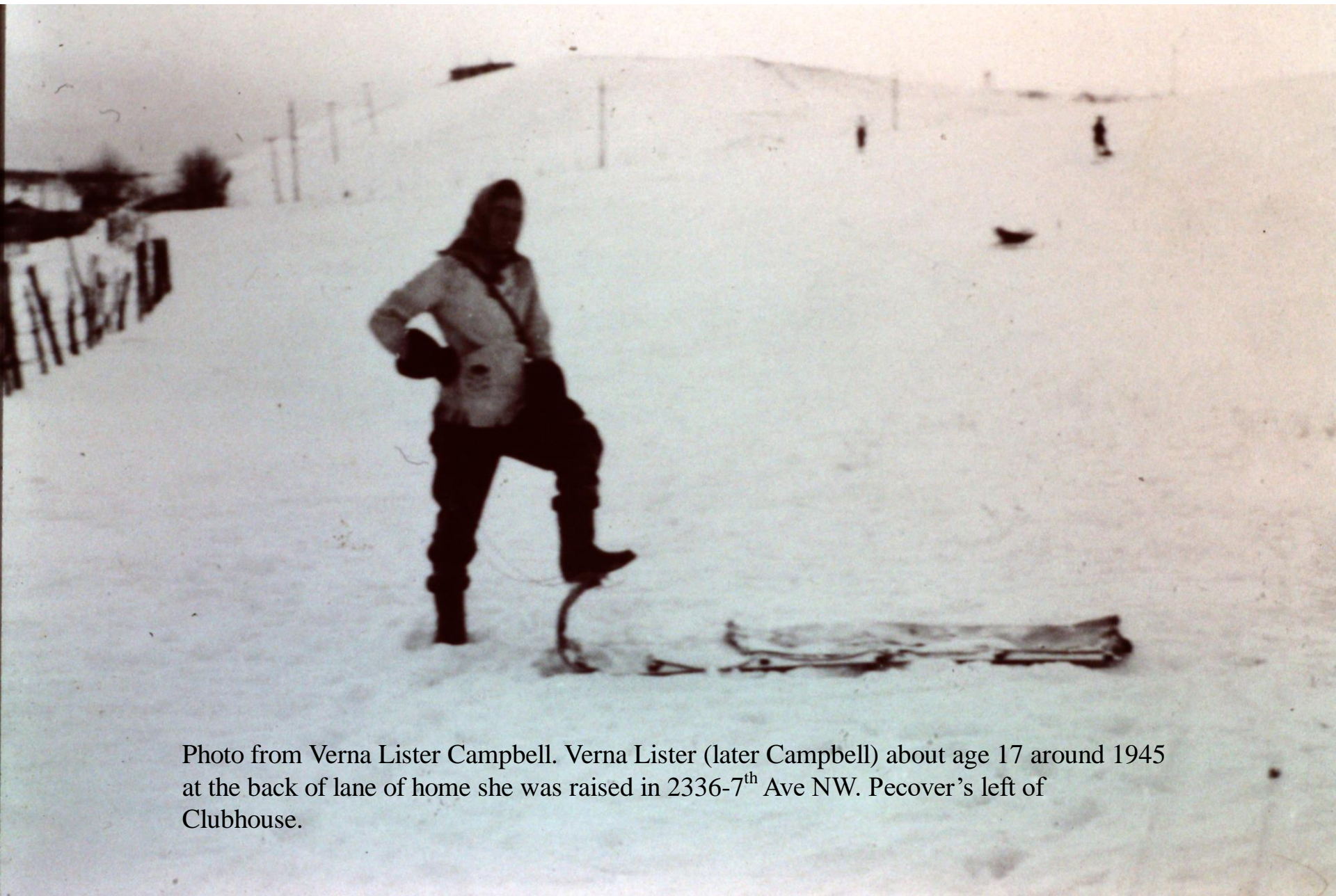

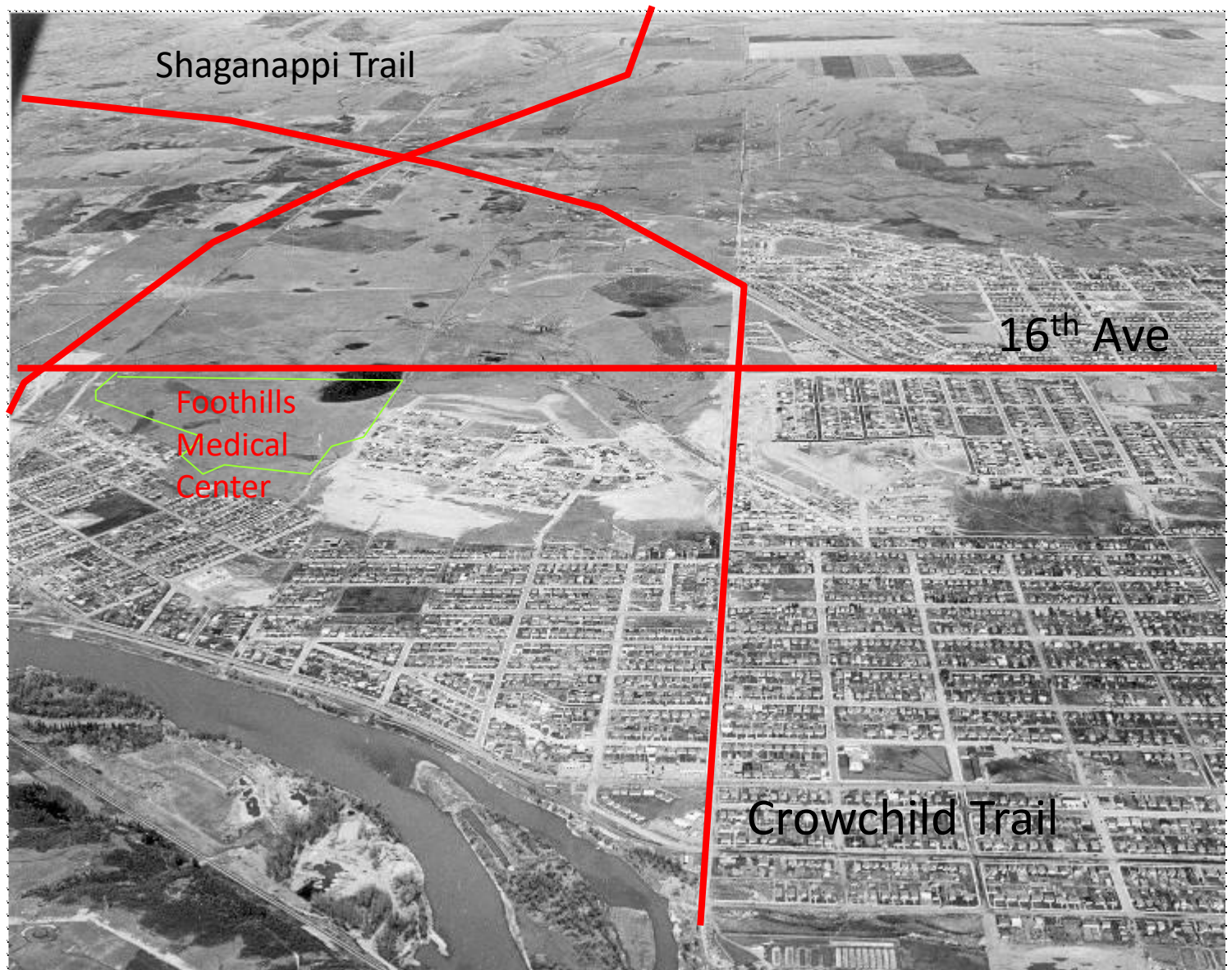
Chief Crowfoot School opened in 1955.
