Ponderings From The Pastor

INVESTING IN GOD'S FUTURE: THE TIME IS NOW!

YOU'VE LIKELY HEARD the word before: <u>sustainability</u>. In a global sense, sustainability means development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. It means being unselfish and concerned about who comes after us. It means being responsible and compassionate, and willing to take a long view of things.

RIGHT NOW, in the present time, our church—like a <u>majority</u> of mainline congregations—has <u>slipped out</u> of sustainability. In recent years we've passed deficit budgets and had to take money from endowed funds to help meet current expenses (more than once--thankfully, the investment "market" has overall been good!). We often have to "rob Peter to pay Paul." And, our "pledges" (our members' promised monetary offerings to the church) are <u>significantly</u> less than last year...and last year they were less than the year before that...

IN OTHER WORDS, we are in <u>depletion</u> mode, rather than sustainability mode. We are slowly whittling away our resources, while living in a time of increased costs, a still adequate-but-aging facility, and overall, fewer members to make it all work out somehow. But, again, we are not alone. Here are some statistics from <u>Hope</u> <u>Partnership</u> (the folks who "run" **New Beginnings**, our proposed vision process we'll be discussing on June 24) about the "average **New Beginnings** congregation"...

- The average **New Beginnings** congregation is using only 32 percent of its total facility. A **New Beginnings** assessment has helped these congregations either downsize their facility needs (lowering utility costs) or share the unused portions of their building with other ministries, or even other churches.
- About 70 percent of the participants in **New Beginnings** churches are over age 45 — and half are over 65. With the help of a **New Beginnings** assessment, many of these churches are seeing the need not only to reach new people, but to also welcome younger people and younger leadership into their congregations...and learning strategies to accomplish that.
- Most *New Beginnings* churches spend a minimum of 33 percent of their operating budget on facility costs (utilities, insurance, upgrades, and maintenance). In many cases, a *New Beginnings* assessment has helped these congregations lower their facility expenses and find more life-giving ways to steward their finances.
- The average *New Beginnings* congregation funds only about three quarters of its budget with congregational offerings. The other quarter comes from savings accounts, building-use income and endowment interest. In other words, *New Beginnings* congregations are living off the assets of a previous generation. After the assessment process, these churches are finding answers to the question, "How do we become more <u>sustainable</u> for the mission God calls us to today?"

Ponderings From The Pastor (continued)

IN OUR CASE here at St. Paul UCC, if falling out of sustainability is the "bad news," then **New Beginnings** has the potential of bringing great "good news"!! We MUST NOT be afraid to name and claim our current reality. Mature Christian disciples can look at things realistically without falling into despair or hopelessness: they <u>always</u> remember that they have an Advocate—the Holy Spirit—as their greatest ally! God is on our side, and we are a resurrection people!

SO, TAKING THE STEP into *New Beginnings* is taking action NOW—a step of faith and trust in GOD—to enter a sustainable future. It is good news because it means we have the courage and wisdom to once again grasp the long view! Sure, it will take a while to get there....but the journey is one toward wholeness, health, vitality and spiritual fulfillment. These things are ALL good news! They are the fruit of discovering and living God's dream for St. Paul UCC!...and THAT'S a dream worth sharing!

ST. PAUL UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST Council Meeting April 16, 2018 8:30 P.M.

Council reconvened after the presentation on "**New Beginnings**" by Pastor Barry and Pastor Becky from Mt. Healthy Methodist Church. "New Beginnings" is a process that helps churches answer the question "**What is God calling our congregation to do and be in this time and this place?**" It helps churches choose their future, instead of letting it get chosen for them. The process is three phases and usually takes 6-8 months. Phase I – On-site assessment and report; Phase II – Training for 8-12 key leaders within the church who learn to guide congregation through a discernment process; Phase III – These leaders conduct small group meetings toward a "big picture" decision about that key question.

- Nancy felt that, should we decide to take this to the Congregation for a vote, if a member is willing to help with the costs (\$4,000 - \$5,000 ?) as Pastor Barry had stated, we should accept that offer. We could also look into the grant that will match offer. Yes, the Church could also pay some so that we are invested in the process. However, under our circumstances, we should accept the offer.
- The minister steps back so that the process is from the bottom up and the members decide what they want to do.

A **MOTION** was made (Maybury/Woods) to recommend the "New Beginnings" program to the congregation to vote on at the next Congregational Meeting. **MOTION CARRIED** with Jan Apro and Lois Manifold abstaining from the vote.

- Margaret suggested that the Pastor's Epistle articles be shorter and to the point.
- Information regarding "New Beginnings" should also be sent out to the congregation ahead of the June meeting.
- At this point, Mike suggested that Council look over the minutes from the previous month and the financials and Pastor Barry's mileage and summary of his time.


The "New Beginnings" Corner

Keeping <u>YOU</u> Up To Date on our Church-Wide Vision Process!

LOOK HERE in each month's "Epistle" for Updates and Information

As you probably know by now, our St. Paul congregation will hold its summer annual meeting on **JUNE 24 after worship** (we will meet that day in our Chapel), and our members will be asked to affirm our participation in NEW BEGINNINGS. Below is an excerpt from HOPE PARTNERSHIP, the denominational group that would be helping us through the New Beginnings process. Take a look-see!

Lifecycle of a Church



Congregations, like all living organisms, follow a similar bell-curve pattern of development. The point at the far left of the curve is the congregation's origin. Following a congregation's birth, it grows and matures, and along the way, it adds new people, new programs and new administrative tools. At some point, a congregation reaches "maturity" — the point at which it begins to fulfill the vision named in the early days of the church's life. This is when we might say a church is "running on all cylinders." Looking back, we might be inclined to call this period of maturity the "glory days" of a congregation — the sanctuary was full, the classrooms were bustling with activity, the

committees were functioning to their fullest.

But shortly after a congregation reaches this point of maturity, it often takes its eyes off the vision for the new future ahead of it. Churches become content and don't see the gradual decline that begins to take place. They may seek out temporary (or technical) fixes to regain the maturity they once had. They may hire a youth pastor in an effort to "replace the young people" who have left. Or, they may start a second worship service, with the hope that the sanctuary will fill up again. Often, these efforts are done with the expectation that the church will once again return to the maturity of its "glory days." People express their desire for the church to "get back to" the ministry it once had.

Experience shows that once a congregation has begun to decline in both participation and energy, it becomes nearly impossible to return to any *previous* point on the lifecycle. Instead, what is required is the birth of an entirely new lifecycle. This requires a congregation to make a bold decision for its future.

The New Beginnings Assessment Service is designed to help a congregation make that bold decision. A decision of this magnitude takes a special set of assessment tools and conversations. It also helps to have a compassionate set of outside eyes to help the congregation see its situation anew. This is Hope Partnership's role in the New Beginnings process.
