**Preschool:** I can't believe the last week of March is upon us! So much left to do in such a short time. The balances I sent home last week are for the remainder of the school year, so you have until May12th to pay those balances. If you have questions, please don't hesitate to ask! This week we will talk about animals. A lot of animals have babies in the spring. Some hatch and some are born. We are going to look at different ones from each. We will continue to talk about spring weather and rainbows! Enjoy the week. Hopefully it warms up soon and starts to feel like spring!

**Kind:** This week our theme is Frogs! We will discuss the life cycle of frogs and other facts. During writing, we have been focusing on writing facts from our reading unit. We have also been discussing the mechanics of good writing: handwriting, punctuation, spacing, and capitalization. This week we will write the stages of a frog's life cycle. In Math, we will work on ABBC patterns, dividing by sharing, comparing numbers through 10, identifying left and right, and exploring tangrams. Please be sure students are continuously practicing sight words, knowing these fluently makes the students better readers. I am sending home a few new words (because, who, what) this evening that will help as we continue to read more and more. Thank you! - Mrs. Stewart

1st/2nd: This week we will be doing a lot of math review and focusing on concepts that have been a struggle. Please, practice telling time and counting money with your kids. First grade should be telling time to the hour and half hour. Second grade should be telling time to the 5 minutes. First grade knows dimes, nickels, and pennies and second grade knows all the coins. First grade will also be working on "oi" and "oy" sounds in their reading. Second grade continues working with the bossy R. Again, I want to remind students to be reading AR books and practicing their math facts EVERY night. I hope everyone has a great week. - Mrs. Hird

**5th/6th:** 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders have a busy week ahead! In Writing, 5<sup>th</sup> grade will work on Limerick poems and 6<sup>th</sup> grade will start writing a Sonnet. In Science, both grades will have a test on Friday. In English, students will be reviewing homophones. In Reading, students will present Lit. Circle roles over Ch. 13-21 on Tuesday and will also continue working in their Buckledown workbooks. In Social Studies, 5<sup>th</sup> grade will read about the Gettysburg Address and 6<sup>th</sup> grade will start a unit on Ancient Rome. 5<sup>th</sup> grade will also have a label South America test on Wed. Both grades have started working on their Famous Person in History projects. **4<sup>th</sup> Quarter AR Book Requirements**: Students must pass two AR books. The first book needs to be passed by Friday, April 8<sup>th</sup> and the second book by Friday, May 6th. So make sure to keep reading! **7/8 Comm. Arts**: Students will present Lit. Circle roles today and will work in their Performance Coach and CRA workbooks. Students will have final Book Talk presentations due on Wed. April 13th and Thurs. April 14th. 5/6 Math: In fifth grade, students are looking at graphs which show change over time, the different ways to simplify fractions, and division with 2-digit divisors. In sixth grade, students are working on perimeter and area of complex shapes corresponding parts of similar shapes, and line and rotational symmetry. 7th/8th: In science, 7th grade is learning about planet formation, characteristics, their orbits, and moons of each planet. In eighth grade, students are working on the eras of the geologic time scale. In math, seventh grade is working on multi-step equations, learning about slope, and simple an compound interest. Pre-algebra students are working on rotational symmetry, calculating markups and markdowns, and area of specific quadrilaterals. In algebra, we are working on problems involving graphing to determine the solution of dependent equations, systems of equations, and testing graphs for functions.
