### 2004 review

### January

The commoner divers and grebes were only seen in small numbers, with the morning of the 16<sup>th</sup> seeing the best passage of both Red-throated Diver (80) and Great Crested Grebe (13) west past Mill Point. However both **Great Northern Diver** (feeding off Sandgate on the 26<sup>th</sup>) and **Slavonian Grebe** (on the sea off Mill Point on the 11<sup>th</sup>) were recorded in January.

Three Shags were on the sea off Copt Point on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, with another there on the 10<sup>th</sup>. Single Little Egrets were on the shore below Abbotscliffe on the 5<sup>th</sup>, and at Samphire Hoe on the 24<sup>th</sup>.

There was a noticeable wildfowl passage at sea on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, when 26 Pintail, 53 Wigeon, 3 Gadwall, 14 Brent Geese and 5 Shelduck flew east, but the only other movements of note were 2 Red-breasted Mergansers west and 22 Brent Geese east past Mill Point on the 6<sup>th</sup>, 2 Pintail west there on the 11<sup>th</sup> and 11 Wigeon east there on the 22<sup>nd</sup>. Numbers at Nickoll's Quarry were disappointing, with a peak of only 3 Pochard (18<sup>th</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>) and just 2 Wigeon (on 1<sup>st</sup>), 3 Gadwall (3<sup>rd</sup>), 3 Teal (27<sup>th</sup>) and 2 Pintail (31<sup>st</sup>). However a presumed escaped Fulvous Whistling Duck provided an exotic diversion there on the 13<sup>th</sup>. Sandling held 60 Teal, 20 Gadwall, 18 Mandarin, 4 Tufted Ducks, 3 Pintail and 2 Pochard on the 3<sup>rd</sup>.

A Peregrine at Nickoll's Quarry on the 13<sup>th</sup> was a good record for the site, and there were two inland sightings of Common Buzzard. Coot peaked at 68 at Nickoll's Quarry on the 27<sup>th</sup>, and a Water Rail was seen there on the 24<sup>th</sup>.

A Woodcock was flushed at Casebourne Wood on the 4<sup>th</sup>, and single Jack Snipe were at Nickoll's Quarry on the 27<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup>, but Common Snipe peaked at just 8 there on the 13<sup>th</sup>. Green Sandpipers were seen on 4 dates in the Botolph's Bridge - Nickoll's Quarry area, with a peak of 2 on the 18<sup>th</sup>. A Purple Sandpiper was at Hythe Redoubt intermittently throughout the month.

A Great Skua flew west past Mill Point on the 11<sup>th</sup>, and single adult Little Gulls were seen there on the 8<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup>. A count on the 17<sup>th</sup> produced 2,710 Black-headed Gulls and 1,280 Common Gulls roosting off Hythe fishing boats. Mediterranean Gulls were present in good numbers (as always) at Copt Point and in the Folkestone area in general but no counts were received, however one was at Nickoll's Quarry on the 29<sup>th</sup>.

Guillemots were seen in reasonable numbers on the  $2^{nd}$  (c.200),  $16^{th}$  (c.300),  $28^{th}$  (2-300) and  $31^{st}$  (c.200), and notable Razorbill counts included 15 west past Mill Point on the  $6^{th}$ , c.40 west there on the  $16^{th}$ , 58+ east past Samphire Hoe on the  $20^{th}$  and 50+ east past Mill Point on the  $28^{th}$ .

A bizarre incident on the 17<sup>th</sup> involved a Kingfisher flying out to sea from Hythe Ranges before being killed by gulls.

Passerine highlight of the month was a **Dartford Warbler** at Abbotscliffe on the 24<sup>th</sup> – the first winter record for the area. Warblers were also represented by a Blackcap at West Hythe on the 17<sup>th</sup> and single Chiffchaffs at Nickoll's Quarry and Joye's Road (Folkestone) in the last week of the month. A Firecrest was at West Hythe on the 5<sup>th</sup>.

A Nuthatch was at Brockhill CP on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, and Marsh Tits were seen at Sandling Park (17<sup>th</sup>) and Brockhill CP (2 on 22<sup>nd</sup>). Up to 7 Lesser Redpolls were at West Hythe throughout, and 12

Siskins were at Sandling Park on the 17<sup>th</sup>. The 3 Snow Buntings (from 2003) were seen again at Samphire Hoe on the 18<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup>, with at least 2 still present on the 24<sup>th</sup>.

# **February**

The only movements of Red-throated Diver of note were at the very start of the month, with 45 west past Mill Point on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 30 west there on the 2<sup>nd</sup>. 25 Great Crested Grebes also flew west past Mill Point on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 24 were off Copt Point on the 4<sup>th</sup>. 57 Great Crested Grebes were counted off Hythe on the 13<sup>th</sup> and 10 at Nickoll's Quarry on the 26<sup>th</sup> was a good count for the site.

First migrant dates in February:

7<sup>th</sup> - House Martin

A single Shag in Folkestone Harbour on the 1<sup>st</sup> preceded an exceptional influx, with 9 off Copt Point on the 3<sup>rd</sup>, 10 on the 4<sup>th</sup> and a new area record of **15** there on the 7<sup>th</sup>. Numbers decreased quickly to 5 on the 8<sup>th</sup>, with up to 3 remaining in the area to the end of the month.

A Velvet Scoter west past Mill Point on the 1<sup>st</sup> was the only seaduck of note. Nickoll's Quarry again disappointed with just 2 Gadwall (7<sup>th</sup>), 31 Teal (27<sup>th</sup>) and peaks of only 2 Pochard (18<sup>th</sup>) and 2 Tufted Duck (26<sup>th</sup>). c.20 Mandarins flew over Pedlinge on the 9<sup>th</sup>.

The only wader count received was 8 Redshank on Folkestone Pier on the 4<sup>th</sup>. Nearby a Glaucous Gull was reported in Folkestone Harbour on the 1<sup>st</sup>, though not relocated. 235 Kittiwakes flew west past Mill Point on the 1<sup>st</sup> and c.100 were feeding off Copt Point on the 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Auk passage was noted early in the month, with counts of 510 Guillemots west past Mill Point on the 1<sup>st</sup>, 770 west there the next day, and 350 off Copt Point on the 3<sup>rd</sup>, decreasing to c.200 there on the 7<sup>th</sup>. Razorbills included 12 west past Mill Point on the 1<sup>st</sup> and up to 12 off Copt Point on the  $3^{rd}$ - $4^{th}$ .

Passerine highlight of the month was an exceptionally early House Martin which arrived in off the sea at Copt Point on the 7<sup>th</sup>. The long-staying **Cetti's Warbler** (from 2003) was again singing at West Hythe on the 15<sup>th</sup>, and a Firecrest was at Mill Point on the 8<sup>th</sup>. 2 Marsh Tits were at Pedlinge on the 18<sup>th</sup> and 4 Siskins flew west at Copt Point on the 4<sup>th</sup>.

### March

The only movements of Red-throated Diver of note were at the very start of the month, with 45 west past Mill Point on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 30 west there on the 2<sup>nd</sup>. 25 Great Crested Grebes also flew west past Mill Point on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 24 were off Copt Point on the 4<sup>th</sup>. 57 Great Crested Grebes were counted off Hythe on the 13<sup>th</sup> and 10 at Nickoll's Quarry on the 26<sup>th</sup> was a good count for the site.

The 1<sup>st</sup> saw the early winter period peak of Tufted Duck (8) at Nickoll's Quarry, with 4 remaining, and joined by 2 Pochard, the next day. Two Shags were still off Mill Point early in the month and remained until at least the 27<sup>th</sup>.

The first hints of spring passage were a Siskin east at Capel-le-Ferne on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, an *alba* wagtail in off the sea at Abbotscliffe on the 3<sup>rd</sup> and single Goldcrests behind the Café on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and at Mill Point on the 4<sup>th</sup>. A small movement at sea on the 5<sup>th</sup> comprised 21 Brent Geese, 5 Oystercatchers and a Curlew east past Hythe, with 2 Shoveler and 3 Wigeon offshore there.

The 6<sup>th</sup> produced the first migrant Firecrest, at the Gun Site, and the first visible migration of any note – with 120 Chaffinches, 300 Starlings, 3 Siskins, and 5 Sky Larks east there. A further 556 Chaffinches flew east at Capel-le-Ferne on the 7<sup>th</sup>, plus 6 Siskins and 2 Sky Larks. On the 8<sup>th</sup> 100 Chaffinches and 2 Siskins flew east at the Gun site, but more unusual was an apparent migration of 59 Great Tits (in 3 flocks) east there. Similar movements were noted elsewhere around the coast at the same time. 5 Siskins flew in off the sea at Copt Point on the 9<sup>th</sup>.

A period of colder weather halted any passage until the 15<sup>th</sup>/16<sup>th</sup>, when a small movement of Redwings and 1+ Fieldfare was noted over Hythe at night. The following morning the first migrant Chiffchaff of the spring was seen at Abbotscliffe and a Woodcock was flushed near the Café. Grounded thrushes included c.25 Redwings and 1 Fieldfare, and other migrants at the cliffs comprised 45 Chaffinches, 20 Meadow Pipits, 2 Reed Buntings and a Goldcrest. The 17<sup>th</sup> produced the first Wheatear at Copt Point, and at Abbotscliffe 200 Wood Pigeons, 4 Stock Doves, 2 Collared Doves and 24 Redwings flew west, with a Little Egret on the shore there. The first Little Ringed Plover and White Wagtail were at Nickoll's Quarry on the 18<sup>th</sup>, and Redwings were grounded by fog at Abbotscliffe (6) and Church Hougham (15).

A Woodcock was flushed near the Café on the 21<sup>st</sup>, and 2 Siskins flew west there. A singing Chiffchaff was in the Warren on the 22<sup>nd</sup>. The 23<sup>rd</sup> saw a good movement of Chaffinches at the cliffs, with 656 east, plus 40 Meadow Pipits, 17 Siskins and a Brambling in/east. Another Chiffchaff was by the Café. Visual migration was again evident at the cliffs from the 24<sup>th</sup>, with 136 Chaffinches, 15 Meadow Pipits, 6 Siskins and single Grey and alba Wagtails east on the 24<sup>th</sup>, 379 Chaffinches, 48 Siskins and a Tree Sparrow in/east on the 25<sup>th</sup>, and 251 Chaffinches, 20 Meadow Pipits, 11 Siskins and single Grey and alba Wagtails in/east at the cliffs on the 26<sup>th</sup>.

Attention turned to the sea on the 27<sup>th</sup>, when the first 3 Sandwich Terns of the year flew east past Copt Point, along with 340 Gannets, 9 Brent Geese, and 5 Shoveler. A further 358 Brent Geese and 6 Shoveler flew east past Copt Point on the 28<sup>th</sup>, when an Avocet and the first Yellow Wagtail were at Nickoll's Quarry, and at least 6 Chiffchaffs were singing in the area. Two summer-plumaged **Black-necked Grebes** on the sea off Seabrook on the 29<sup>th</sup> were a very good local record, and 13 Wigeon flew west there, whilst a Little Egret was seen at Samphire Hoe.

On the 30<sup>th</sup> 62 Chaffinches and 17 Siskins flew east at Capel-le-Ferne, but there were just 10 Brent Geese east at sea, with 6 Shoveler at Nickoll's Quarry. The 31<sup>st</sup> produced 41 Brent Geese, 42 Gannets and 14 Sandwich Terns east past Copt Point, plus 235 Chaffinches east there. Totals of almost 2,550 Chaffinches and 120 Siskins were logged passing east through the area in March.

A littoralis Rock Pipit was seen in Samphire Hoe in March but date unknown.

# **April**

Good movement at sea was noted off Mill Point at the start of the month with 340 Brent Geese, 1,680 Common Scoters, 14 Red-breasted Mergansers, 16 Shoveler, 15 Teal, 2 Gadwall, 2 Velvet Scoters, 2 Black-throated and 19 Redthroated Divers, 32 Gannets and 15 Sandwich Terns east on the 1<sup>st</sup>, 882 Brent Geese, 2,550 Common Scoters, 27 Red-throated Divers, 39 Teal, 12 Wigeon, 10 Shoveler, 5 Gadwall, 26 Red-breasted Mergansers, 4 Grey Plovers, 4 Black-tailed Godwits, 4 Bar-tailed Godwits, 4 Curlew, 1 Whimbrel, 2 Dunlin and 98 Sandwich Terns east on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 2 Arctic Skuas, 250 Brent Geese, 15 Eiders, 41 Sandwich Terns and 2 Shags east on the 3<sup>rd</sup>.

On land the first migrant Blackcap of the year was singing at Mill Point on the 1st, the first 4 Swallows were at Nickoll's Quarry on the 2<sup>nd</sup>. and another Swallow flew in off the sea on the 3<sup>rd</sup>. On the 4<sup>th</sup> there was a Blackcap and 2 Chiffchaffs by the Café, and 2 Firecrests and 3 Chiffchaffs were at Samphire Hoe on the 6<sup>th</sup>. At Nickoll's Quarry there was an Avocet and 6 Dunlin on the 1<sup>st</sup>, a Red-breasted Merganser on the 3<sup>rd</sup>, a **Common Bittern** reported on the 7<sup>th</sup> and the first Willow Warbler on the 8<sup>th</sup>.

Visual migration picked up at the cliffs in the second week of the month, with 16 Chaffinches, 15 Meadow Pipits, 14 Linnets and a Siskin in/east on the 7th, 52 Chaffinches, 26 Linnets and 5 Siskins east on the 8<sup>th</sup>, and 102 Chaffinches, 45 Meadow Pipits, 8 Siskins and a Brambling east on the 9<sup>th</sup>. The 9<sup>th</sup> also produced an **Osprey** north over Folkestone, a male Marsh Harrier in off the sea at the Gun Site and the first 4 Sand Martins in off the sea at the cliffs, plus 2 Swallows and 3 Wheatears. 82 Meadow Pipits, 12 Chaffinches, 8 Sand Martins, 2 Swallows and a Siskin flew in off at the cliffs on the 10<sup>th</sup>, and a White Wagtail was along the Hythe Canal.

On the 11<sup>th</sup> a Jack Snipe was at Abbotscliffe and a Merlin arrived in off the sea at the Café. 3 Swallows and 2 Sand Martins also arrived in off the sea, and 91 Chaffinches flew east. Two 'continental' Coal Tits and the first Whitethroat of the year were at the Gun Site on the 12th, and a White Wagtail arrived in off. At sea 2 Black-throated Divers, 2 Velvet Scoters and 49 Sandwich Terns flew east. On the 13<sup>th</sup> a **Crane** was reported north over Hythe and the first Tree Pipit was at the Gun Site, with 230 Sandwich Terns and a Slavonian Grebe east past Copt Point. 7 Swallows came in off, and at Nickoll's Quarry there were 10 Swallows, 2 Sand Martins and the first House Martin (since February).

Focus again switched to the sea from the 14th, when 170 Sandwich Terns and 3 Whimbrel flew east past Copt Point, and on the 15<sup>th</sup> the first 9 Common Terns of the year, 182 Sandwich Terns, 114 Common Scoter, 15 Eider, 30 Brent Geese and 2 Pintail flew east there. The first 6 Little Terns passed Mill Point the next day, and 270 Sandwich Terns, 105 'Commic' Terns, 60 Gannets, 139 Common Scoters, 5 Velvet Scoters, 38 Eider, 34 Shoveler, 9 Red-breasted Mergansers, 7 Gadwall, 2 Pintail, 9 Whimbrel, an Arctic Skua, a Bonxie, 2 Med Gulls and 2 Little Gulls also flew east. It was fairly quiet on the land, with 3 Whitethroats at the Gun Site on the 14<sup>th</sup>, the first Grasshopper Warbler, a Tree Pipit, a Willow Warbler, and a Yellow Wagtail, on the 15<sup>th</sup>, and the first migrant Black Redstart, Wheatear and 2 Yellow Wagtails on the 16<sup>th</sup>, plus a trickle of Swallows.

The first Common Sandpiper and Reed Warbler (2) of the year were at Nickoll's Quarry on the 16<sup>th</sup>, with the first Sedge Warbler there the next day. The 17<sup>th</sup> also produced 9 Swallows, 2 Sand Martins, House Martin, 2 Yellow Wagtails and 2 Redpolls in off at the cliffs, with single Wheatear and Willow Warbler there. A windy day on the 18<sup>th</sup> saw a dark phase "**Blue" Fulmar** and 2 Bonxies pass at sea. 2 Firecrests at the Gun Site were the only birds of note on the 19<sup>th</sup>, but on the 20<sup>th</sup> the first Lesser Whitethroat was at Abbotscliffe, together with 2 Wheatears, a Tree Pipit, a Willow Warbler and a Corn Bunting.

An easterly passage of 84 'commic' terns on the 21<sup>st</sup> included at least a couple of Arctic Terns (first of the year), and 131 Sandwich Terns and 3 Little Gulls also flew east, with 140 Gannets west. A Tree Pipit was at Mill Point and 6 Swallows arrived in off. There were no less than three firsts for the year on the 22<sup>nd</sup> – a Swift in off at Capel-le-Ferne, a Ring Ouzel at Samphire Hoe and a Cuckoo at Nickoll's Quarry. There was a notable arrival of Wheatears too, with about 25 along the cliffs, plus 7 Willow Warblers at Abbotscliffe and 5 at Samphire Hoe, and 22 Swallows and a Yellow Wagtail in off. Terns were again moving at sea with 95 Sandwich, 24 Common and 1 Little east. On the 23<sup>rd</sup> 27 Swallows, 20 Sand Martins, 8 House Martins, 2 Yellow Wagtails, a Tree Pipit and a Wheatear were seen arriving in off the sea

The 24<sup>th</sup> produced the highlight of the month when a **Quail** was flushed from the cliff-edge at Abbotscliffe. Single Ring Ouzel, Firecrest, Tree Pipit and 6 Yellow Wagtails were also seen there, and 6 Green Sandpipers were at Nickoll's Quarry. On the 25<sup>th</sup> 268 Sandwich Terns, 59 Commic Terns, 44 Common Scoter, 16 Whimbrel and 4 Red-breasted Mergansers flew east past Copt Point, and 15 Swallows, 2 Yellow Wagtails and 2 House Martins flew in off. 3 Lesser Whitethroats were at the Gun Site. At Nickoll's Quarry 3 Greenshank and a Green Sandpiper flew over, and a good selection of warblers there included a Cetti's, 9 Reed, 6 Sedge, 5 Blackcap, 3 Lesser Whitethroats and a Willow

A quieter day on the 26<sup>th</sup> saw just 40 Sandwich Terns, 4 Whimbrel and a Bonxie east past Copt Point in the morning, with 14 Common Terns and a Bonxie east past Mill Point in the evening, when 4 Swifts were feeding over the town. A Serin flew east over Copt Point on the 27<sup>th</sup>, and 290 Sandwich Terns, 14 Common Terns, 10 Eider, 9 Velvet Scoter, 21 Whimbrel, 5 Bar-tailed Godwits, 3 Black-tailed Godwits, 40 Dunlin, 60 Black-headed Gulls, 35 Common Gulls, 5 Med Gulls and 7 Little Gulls flew east. 18 Swifts, 37 Swallows, 6 Sand Martins and 4 Yellow Wagtails arrived in off.

The first Nightingale of the year was in song behind the Café on the 28<sup>th</sup>, but it was otherwise fairly quiet with single Wheatears at Hythe and Nickoll's Quarry, 59 Sandwich Terns and 2 Bonxies east past Copt Point, 2 Common Sandpipers on rocks there, and 3 Swifts and 2 Yellow Wagtails in off. Rain prevented much passage on the 29<sup>th</sup>, with just 20 Common Terns, 11 Sandwich Terns, 27 Gannets and a Whimbrel east past Samphire Hoe, and on land only a Wheatear at the Gun Site and 2 Wheatears, 2 Willow Warblers and Blackcap at Abbotscliffe were of note. However the month ended with some decent sea passage on the 30<sup>th</sup>, when 495 Sandwich Terns, 52 Gannets, 18 Fulmars, 235 Bar-tailed Godwits, 2 Knot, a Grey Plover and an Arctic Skua flew east past Copt Point. A Greenshank, 6 Common Sandpipers and 3 Wheatears were at Nickoll's Quarry.

# May

The month began with the Nightingale still in residence behind the Café (to 15<sup>th</sup>), and the 1<sup>st</sup> also produced the first 2 Turtle Doves of the year there and a male Ring Ouzel below the Café. 25 Whitethroats and a Wheatear were at the Gun Site, and 4 Yellow Wagtails, a Sand Martin and 4 Swallows arrived in off. At sea 185 Sandwich Terns, 71 'Commic' Terns, 51 Dunlin, 25 Bar-tailed Godwits, 11 Whimbrel and 4 Arctic Terns flew east, and a flock of **14** Common Sandpipers at Copt Point constituted a site record. A further 8 Common Sandpipers were at Nickoll's Quarry.

A Marsh Harrier and the first Hobby flew in off the sea at the Café on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, together with 54 Swallows, 5 Swifts, 3 Sand Martins, 3 House Martins, a Tree Pipit and a Turtle Dove. A Ring Ouzel was at Abbotscliffe, and a total of 3 Wheatears were in the area. In the evening single Pomarine Skua and Black-throated Diver passed Mill Point, and 53 Whimbrel, 30 'Commic' Terns and 2 Little Terns also flew east. The first Garden Warbler of the year was seen behind the Café on the 3<sup>rd</sup>, with a Cuckoo there also, and 50 Swallows, 4 House and 2 Sand Martins arrived in off. At sea 81 Sandwich Terns, 25 'Commic' Terns, an Arctic Skua and a Black-throated Diver flew east

On the 4<sup>th</sup> 210 Sandwich Terns, 155 Gannets, 30 Fulmars, 54 Common and 2 Velvet Scoters, 3 Arctic Skuas, a Bonxie and a Little Tern flew east past Copt Point, and a Hobby, 17 Swallows, 5 Swifts and 2 House Martins came in off the sea. Another Hobby was at Abbotscliffe, and 8 Dunlin was a good count for Nickoll's Quarry. The first Manx Shearwater flew west past Mill Point on the 5<sup>th</sup>, with 46 Common Scoters and 30 Sandwich Terns east, and a Hobby was seen over Lympne.

The 6<sup>th</sup> produced just a Cuckoo and 37 Swallows in off the sea at Abbotscliffe, and 100 Gannets and 40 Kittiwakes west at sea. Hirundines were again arriving on the 7<sup>th</sup>, with 101 Swallows, 44 House Martins and 10 Sand Martins in off at the cliffs. A Little Ringed Plover in off at the Cafe was a good site record, and a Tree Pipit also arrived there. There was some action at sea too on the 7<sup>th</sup>, with 59 Common, 34 Sandwich and 6 Little Terns, 6 Whimbrel and 2 Bar-tailed Godwits east, and a Little Egret was on the shore below Abbotscliffe.

The 9<sup>th</sup> saw a good passage of terns at sea, with 779 'Commic', 189 Sandwich, 12 Little and 3+ Arctics east. Also moving were 5 Arctic Skuas, 32 Whimbrel, 17 Turnstone, 2 Bar-tailed Godwits, 8 Dunlin and a Little Gull east, and 179 Gannets west. 4 Tree Pipits flew in off the sea and 45 Swallows were in the area. Terns were again a feature on the 10<sup>th</sup>, with 378 'Commic', 176 Sandwich, 12 Little and the first Black of the year east. Also of note were 8 Arctic Skuas, 14 Velvet Scoters, a Little Gull, 43 Dunlin, 3 Grey Plover, 4 Turnstone and 3 Sanderling east. On the 11<sup>th</sup> a Little Egret flew west over Mill Point, but just 142 Sandwich Terns and 2 Bar-tailed Godwits passed at sea. 22 Swallows arrived in off.

Two **Red-rumped Swallows** arrived near the Café on the 12<sup>th</sup> and remained in the area all day, before moving to Abbotscliffe on the 13<sup>th</sup> (photos). 79 Swallows and 9 Swifts flew in off on the sea on the 12<sup>th</sup>, and c.150 House Martins were in the area. 2 Pomarine Skuas and 2 Shoveler flew east and a Shag was on the sea off Copt Point. On the 13th c.65 Swallows, 30 House Martins and 2 Sand Martins came in off, and arrival continued the next day with about 70 Swallows and 40 House Martins in off. 3 Black-throated Divers flew east at sea. The 15<sup>th</sup> produced 84 Swallows, 20 House Martins, 5 Swifts, and singles of Marsh Harrier, Hobby, Sand Martin, Turtle Dove, Cuckoo and Yellow Wagtail in off the sea at the cliffs.

Highlight of the 16<sup>th</sup> was undoubtedly a flock of five **European Bee-eaters** which flew east over Samphire Hoe in the afternoon. A new Nightingale was singing in the Warren, and 28 Swallows, 10 Swifts, 3 Turtle Doves, Cuckoo and Sand Martin arrived in off the sea. The 18<sup>th</sup> produced another **European Bee-eater** (east over Abbotscliffe), and singing **Wood Warbler** behind the Café.

A Spotted Flycatcher at the Gun Site and a Whinchat at Samphire Hoe on the 19<sup>th</sup> were both firsts for the year, and single Cuckoos were at the Gun Site and the Café, and 2 Turtle Doves flew in off. On the 20<sup>th</sup> 2 Reed Warblers (unusual away from Hythe in spring) were in song at Copt Point and a Turtle Dove arrived in off at the Café. 2 Great Northern Divers and 2 Velvet Scoters flew east past Copt Point on the 21<sup>st</sup>, and 21 Swifts arrived. Another late migrant Reed Warbler was at the Gun Site on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, and a Siskin flew east. At Nickoll's Quarry 3 Little Egrets, 2 Common Sandpipers and a Dunlin were notable.

A Spotted Flycatcher was at Abbotscliffe on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, and c.100 Swallows, 35 House Martins, 20 Swifts and 2 Sand Martins flew in/east at the Café. 4 Turtle Doves arrived in off on the 25<sup>th</sup>. A first-summer Little Gull lingered off Copt Point on the 26<sup>th</sup>, and 18 Swifts flew east at the Gun Site. On the 29<sup>th</sup> a Hobby and c.200 Swifts were seen over Crete Road in the afternoon.

The month ended with a *hippolais* (Melodious or Icterine) warbler briefly at the Gun Site on the 31<sup>st</sup>, also a Lapwing west there.

### June

June was predictably quiet with a trickle of hirundines and Swifts continuing to arrive, and just a couple of typical late spring migrants – a Turtle Dove in off the sea at the cliffs on the 3<sup>rd</sup> and a Reed Warbler at the Gun Site on the 4<sup>th</sup>. Two Lapwings in off the sea at the cliffs on the 5<sup>th</sup> was another usual mid-summer occurrence.

A movement of 435 Swifts west at Abbotscliffe on the 12<sup>th</sup> were most likely birds moving in search of food, but a **Red Kite** in off the sea at the Café the next day is more difficult to explain.

There were a few hints of return passage late in the month - 4 Curlews west past Mill Point and a Mediterranean Gull offshore on the 27<sup>th</sup>, a Meadow Pipit east over Hythe on the 28<sup>th</sup>, and 30 Swifts west at the Café on the 29<sup>th</sup>.

# July

**Honey Buzzards** are often a feature of early July and this year there were 3 over the west end of Folkestone on the 6<sup>th</sup> and 2 over Hythe on the 11<sup>th</sup>. Two Grey Herons in off the sea at Mill Point on the 10<sup>th</sup> was another typical record, however an Arctic Skua east past Copt Point on the 8<sup>th</sup> was more unusual.

Return passage of Sand Martins was noted from the 11<sup>th</sup>, when 5 were at Nickoll's Quarry, increasing to c.40 there on the 12<sup>th</sup> and c.50 on the 14<sup>th</sup>. Waders began to trickle through from the same time, with a Green Sandpiper at Nickoll's Quarry on the 11<sup>th</sup>, Green and Common Sandpiper there on the 12<sup>th</sup>, and 3 Green Sandpipers, 2 Dunlin, 2 Common Sandpipers and a Little Ringed Plover on the 13<sup>th</sup>. Nickoll's Quarry also hosted a Little Egret from the 12<sup>th</sup>-15<sup>th</sup>.

On the 17<sup>th</sup> a **Wood Sandpiper**, a Greenshank, 6 Common Sandpipers and a Green Sandpiper were at Nickoll's Quarry. 3 Grey Herons flew in off the sea at Seabrook on the 21<sup>st</sup> and a Common Sandpiper was heard over Cheriton at night. By the 24<sup>th</sup> the Mediterranean Gull flock at Copt Point had built up to 180+ (including 7 juveniles), and another 4 juveniles were by Hythe Redoubt on the 27<sup>th</sup>.

An exceptionally early female-type **Red-backed Shrike** was at Abbotscliffe on the 26<sup>th</sup>, as well as the first 2 returning Willow Warblers. On the 27<sup>th</sup> a **Curlew Sandpiper** was seen at Nickoll's Quarry (to 29<sup>th</sup>) together with a Dunlin, a Snipe, 3 Green Sandpipers and 2 Common Sandpipers. The second **Wood Sandpiper** of the month at Nickoll's Quarry from 29<sup>th</sup> completed a good run of local rarities.

#### August

The **Wood Sandpiper** was still at Nickoll's Quarry on the 1<sup>st</sup> (and remained until the 8<sup>th</sup>). Also present were 3 Green Sandpipers, a Common Sandpiper, a Dunlin and a Snipe, with 4 Green Sandpipers the next day. 2 Willow Warblers and a Yellow Wagtail were at Abbotscliffe on the 1<sup>st</sup>, and a Corn Bunting was seen on the 3<sup>rd</sup>. On the 6<sup>th</sup> there were 3 Green Sandpipers, 2 Common Sandpipers, a Golden Plover and 4 Willow Warblers at Nickoll's Quarry, and the following day produced 3 Little Egrets, a Greenshank and 2 Dunlin there. Also on the 7<sup>th</sup> two Common Buzzards flew over Folkestone and a Reed Warbler was at Abbotscliffe.

Last migrant dates in August:

26<sup>th</sup> - Cuckoo 28<sup>th</sup> - Little Ringed Plover

There was a fine array of waders at Nickoll's Quarry on the 8<sup>th</sup>, with a **Spotted Redshank**, a **Black-tailed Godwit**, the long-staying **Wood Sandpiper**, 8 Green Sandpipers, 4 Little Ringed Plovers and 3 Common Sandpipers. The Gun Site hosted single Reed Warbler and Wheatear on

the 8<sup>th</sup>, and 2 Yellow Wagtails flew west over Abbotscliffe. 4 Willow Warblers were at the Gun Site on the 9<sup>th</sup> and there were 5 Dunlin at Nickoll's Quarry, with 6 Common Sandpipers there the next day, and a Greenshank on the 11th. At the cliffs on the 11th there were 8 Willow Warblers, 4 Lesser Whitethroats, 3 Yellow Wagtails and a Hobby.

Abbotscliffe produced a Reed Warbler, a Garden Warbler, 8 Willow Warblers and 2 Lesser Whitethroats on the 13<sup>th</sup>, also 15 Swifts and 3 Yellow Wagtails west, and a Marsh Harrier flew south-west over Hythe. A flock of 10 Black-tailed Godwits east at the Gun Site on the 14th constitutes a record count for the area. Single Tree Pipit and Wheatear were also seen there. whilst a Whinchat and 4 Wheatears were at Abbotscliffe and 420 Swifts, 3 Yellow Wagtails and a Turtle Dove flew west.

An **Icterine Warbler** at Abbotscliffe on the 15<sup>th</sup> continued the good run of local rarities, and single Tree Pipit and Wheatear were also present there, with a Tree Pipit at the Gun Site, and 11 Yellow Wagtails flew west. However something of a lull followed before attention turned to the sea on the 19<sup>th</sup>, when 6 Black Terns, 70 Commic Terns and 40 Sandwich Terns were feeding off Copt Point, with 4 Arctic Skuas, Bonxie, 2 Ringed Plovers and a Whimbrel past. At least one Arctic Tern was feeding with 50+ Commic Terns off Copt Point the next day.

On the 21<sup>st</sup> 2 Whinchats were at Abbotscliffe with at least 8 Wheatears at Samphire Hoe. An Osprey flew east at Abbotscliffe on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, and there were 10 Willow Warblers, 12 Wheatears and 3 Whinchats there, 4 Wheatears at the Gun Site, and 19 Yellow Wagtails west. 3 Arctic Skuas flew west past Copt Point. 20 Yellow Wagtails flew west at Abbotscliffe on the 25<sup>th</sup>, and a Cuckoo was seen there on the 26<sup>th</sup>, when 30 Swifts went west. An Arctic Skua passed Copt Point on the 27<sup>th</sup>.

The 28th produced 4 Wheatears, 3 Whinchats and a Sedge Warbler at the cliffs, with 25 Sand Martins and 4 Yellow Wagtails west at the Gun Site the next day, plus a Tree Pipit there. Whinchats increased to 7 at Abbotscliffe on the 30<sup>th</sup>, with another Whinchat and 2 Wheatears at Hythe and a Garden Warbler at Samphire Hoe. The month ended well, with a Wryneck, Little Egret and Reed Warbler at Samphire Hoe on the 31<sup>st</sup>.

#### September

The 1<sup>st</sup> produced singles of Redstart, Spotted Flycatcher, Reed Warbler, and Sedge Warbler at Abbotscliffe, plus 5 Whinchats and 6 Wheatears, with a Spotted Flycatcher and a Wheatear at the Gun Site, and a Reed Warbler at Samphire Hoe. A Grey Wagtail flew over Abbotscliffe on the 3<sup>rd</sup>, and there were 5 Wheatears, 3 Whinchats and a Redstart there on the 4th, with another Grey Wagtail and a Great Spotted Woodpecker over. A Pied Flycatcher arrived at Abbotscliffe on the 5<sup>th</sup>, and a Redstart, 3 Reed Warblers, 3 Whinchats and 3 Wheatears were also present. 4 Whinchats were noted there the next day.

On the 7<sup>th</sup> a Manx Shearwater, a Whimbrel and a Razorbill passed Copt Point. A new Pied Flycatcher was at Abbotscliffe in the evening, and it was joined by 10 Whinchats, 3 Wheatears and a Grey Wagtail the next day. Whinchats increased to 16 at Abbotscliffe on the 9<sup>th</sup>. The 10<sup>th</sup> saw an Osprey fly west at Abbotscliffe, and singles of Firecrest, Pied Flycatcher, Spotted

Flycatcher, Redstart, and Sedge Warbler were also present, together with 13 Whinchats and 2 Wheatears, and 15 Meadow Pipits flew east. A Common Buzzard flew west over Hythe and 110 Gannets, 4 Fulmars and 2 Razorbills were seen off Copt Point. Whinchats peaked at 19 at Abbotscliffe on the 12<sup>th</sup>, and 4 Arctic Skuas flew west past Copt Point the next day.

Return passage of Chiffchaffs became evident from mid-month with 10 at Abbotscliffe and 4 by the Café on the 15<sup>th</sup>, when Abbotscliffe also hosted 7 Whinchats, 2 Blackcaps, 2 Willow Warblers, a Wheatear and a Lesser Whitethroat, with 97 Meadow Pipits, a Grey Wagtail and a Great Spotted Woodpecker over. 21 Chiffchaffs were at Abbotscliffe on the 16<sup>th</sup>, and a Redstart, a Reed Warbler, 7 Blackcaps, 2 Whinchats and a Wheatear were also present. Meadow Pipits increased to 300 there and a Grey Wagtail and Great Spotted Woodpecker flew over.

The only Sooty Shearwater of the year flew west past Copt Point on the 18<sup>th</sup>, and a Bonxie, 2 Arctic Skuas and an Arctic Tern were also seen there. Back on land there were 14 Chiffchaffs, 6 Whinchats, 5 Wheatears, a Hobby, a Great Spotted Woodpecker, a Goldcrest, a Reed Bunting, 12 Yellow Wagtails and 2,000+ House Martins at Abbotscliffe on the 19<sup>th</sup>. A further 25 Chiffchaffs and 10 Blackcaps were seen below the Café and a Marsh Harrier flew in off the sea. The sea was again the focus on the 20<sup>th</sup>, when 3 Bonxies, an Arctic Skua and an Arctic Tern were seen off Copt Point.

On the 22<sup>nd</sup> 125 Meadow Pipits and 4 Yellow Wagtails flew west at Abbotscliffe, and a Wheatear and 6 Whinchats were present. 27 Chiffchaffs were counted at Abbotscliffe on the 24<sup>th</sup> and at least 3,000 House Martins and 1,000 Swallows were in the area. On the 25<sup>th</sup> Abbotscliffe yielded a Garden Warbler, 16 Chiffchaffs and 2 Whinchats, and 2 Common Swifts, a Hobby, a Merlin and 3 Golden Plover flew over. A Grasshopper Warbler was new at Abbotscliffe on the 26<sup>th</sup>, with Common Swift, Hobby and Merlin again at the cliffs.

A Snow Bunting was at Samphire Hoe on the 27<sup>th</sup>-28<sup>th</sup>, but it was quiet otherwise, with just a Hobby and c.2,000 House Martins west at Abbotscliffe on the 27<sup>th</sup>, a Red-throated Diver past and a Grey Wagtail over Samphire Hoe on the 28<sup>th</sup>, and a Sedge Warbler at Abbotscliffe on the 29<sup>th</sup>. About 20 Redwings were heard over Folkestone during the night of 29<sup>th</sup>/30<sup>th</sup> and the following morning produced a **Lapland Bunting** west at Abbotscliffe, and reports of 2 Hobbies and 2 Merlins at the cliffs.

# October

21 Chiffchaffs and single Lesser Whitethroat and Great Spotted Woodpecker provided the only interest at the cliffs on the 1<sup>st</sup>, whilst on the sea 41 Brent Geese, 15 Teal, 10 Wigeon, 3 Red-breasted Mergansers, a Gadwall and 2 Dunlin passed Mill Point. A Manx Shearwater, 4 Arctic Skuas, 28 Little Gulls, 17 Arctic Terns, 8 Pintail, 4 Razorbills and 90 Gannets flew west past Copt Point on the 4<sup>th</sup> but it remained quiet on the land. A Grasshopper Warbler and a Ring Ouzel appeared at Abbotscliffe on the 5<sup>th</sup>, and there were c.20 Chiffchaffs, c.15 Goldcrests and 14 Blackcaps in the area. Single Merlin, Yellow Wagtail, Great Spotted Woodpecker and 3 Grey Herons flew west.

On the 7<sup>th</sup> 250 Starlings flew in off the sea at the Cafe, and 13 Sky Larks, 4 Reed Buntings, 2 Grey Wagtails, a late Yellow Wagtail, and a Great Spotted Woodpecker flew west. A further 570 Starlings arrived in off the sea at the Cafe the next day, and 14 Chaffinches, 9 Sky Larks and 4 Yellowhammers flew west, but the highlight of the 8<sup>th</sup> was a **Yellow-browed Warbler** at Abbotscliffe in the evening. Several Redwings had also appeared there by the evening and more were moving overnight. A male Hen Harrier flew north over at Abbotscliffe on the 9<sup>th</sup> and a **Honey Buzzard** was reported over Folkestone Harbour. 20+ Redwings were at the Gun Site, with a Fieldfare and several Redwings at Abbotscliffe, and an Arctic Skua and 100 Brent Geese passed at sea. On the 10<sup>th</sup> 47 Brent Geese, 20 Razorbills, 14 Dunlin, 3 Arctic Terns, an Arctic Skua and a Purple Sandpiper flew east past Mill Point, but there were just a few Redwings and Fieldfares of note on the land.

The 11<sup>th</sup> produced 2 Snow Buntings (to 20<sup>th</sup>) and a Ring Ouzel at Samphire Hoe, and a Firecrest at the Gun Site heralded the start of a small influx, with 12 at Samphire Hoe and singles at Abbotscliffe and behind the Café the next day. A Black Redstart was also at Samphire Hoe on the 12<sup>th</sup>. On the 13<sup>th</sup> there were Firecrests at Samphire Hoe (7), Abbotscliffe and Mill Point. Samphire Hoe also held 3 Ring Ouzels and 20 Redwings, and there were 12 Fieldfares at the Gun Site, with 2 Little Gulls past on the sea. A further 10 Little Gulls were seen off Mill Point the next day, together with a Red-breasted Merganser and an Arctic Tern.

A **Richard's Pipit** was found at Abbotscliffe on the 15<sup>th</sup> and 5 Ring Ouzels, 5 Firecrests, 11 Chiffchaffs, 4 Redwings and 2 Wheatears were also present there. 8 Reed Buntings, 2 Siskins, 2 Redpolls, a Brambling and a swift (probably common) flew over. 2 Firecrests were at Nickoll's Quarry, with 13 Chiffchaffs, 9 Goldcrests, 3 Tree Sparrows, a Whinchat, and a Jay there, and c.600 Swallows and c.600 House Martins moved west over Hythe in the afternoon. The **Richard's Pipit** was still present at Abbotscliffe on the 16<sup>th</sup>, but highlight of the day was only the second modern area record of **Corncrake** there. A Ring Ouzel, a Redstart, a Brambling, 4 Tree Sparrows, and 21 migrant Long-tailed Tits were also seen. Samphire Hoe produced 2 Ring Ouzels and c.1,000 House Martins were in the area. A second **Richard's Pipit** was at Abbotscliffe on the 17<sup>th</sup> and 140 Chaffinches, 500 Starlings, 17 Sky Larks, 11 Fieldfares, a Golden Plover and a Siskin flew in off the sea. A Ring Ouzel and a Black Redstart were at Samphire Hoe and a Merlin flew over the Warren.

A quieter spell followed with just 110 Goldfinches, 4 Reed Buntings, 3 Fieldfares, and a Brambling over Abbotscliffe on the 18<sup>th</sup>. A Redstart, a Black Redstart and a Wheatear were at Samphire Hoe on the 20<sup>th</sup>, and 6 Little Gulls, 2 Red-breasted Mergansers, 2 Razorbills and 2 Wigeon passed Mill Point, with 8 Redwings in off the sea there. A Firecrest was at Samphire Hoe on the 21<sup>st</sup>. 3 Little Gulls and a Grey Plover flew past Mill Point on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, and 11 Sky Larks arrived in off the sea. 3 Little Gulls were off Copt Point on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, with 4 Black Redstarts and 2 Wheatears at Samphire Hoe on the 24<sup>th</sup>.

Visual passage on the 26<sup>th</sup> included a **Lapland Bunting** east over Samphire Hoe, and 1,160 Wood Pigeons, 145 Stock Doves, 60 Chaffinches, 2 Siskins, 2 Bramblings, a Snow Bunting, a Tree Sparrow, and 2 Bullfinches mostly headed west over Abbotscliffe. There were also 2-3 Ring Ouzels in the area. On the 27<sup>th</sup> 2 Firecrests were by the Café, with a Firecrest and a Black Redstart at Samphire Hoe, joined by a Snow Bunting the next day, when 6 Little Gulls, 4 Brent Geese and an Arctic Skua flew west past Copt Point.

The month ended with another small influx of Firecrests, involving 4 in the Church Wood area and 2 behind the Café on the 29<sup>th</sup>, 3 by the Café on the 30<sup>th</sup>, and a total of 8 in the area on the 31<sup>st</sup>. The 29<sup>th</sup> also produced 4 Black Redstarts at Samphire Hoe, 2 Redpolls and 160 Lapwings over, and 17 Brent Geese and a Red-breasted Merganser past Mill Point. A further 3 Black

Redstarts were at Abbotscliffe on the 30<sup>th</sup> and on the 31<sup>st</sup> there was a Ring Ouzel in the Warren and c.30 Fieldfares in the area.

#### November

A Snow Bunting, a Redpoll and 2 Lapwings flew in/east at Abbotscliffe on the 1st, and a Snipe was also present there, with another Snow Bunting at Samphire Hoe. The latter site then produced a Lapland Bunting, a Twite and a late Garden Warbler the next day, when 118 Brent Geese and 11 Pintail flew west at sea. The 2<sup>nd</sup> also saw a Firecrest in a garden in the town, and further Firecrest were at Abbotscliffe (2) and Samphire Hoe on the 3<sup>rd</sup>. Abbotscliffe also hosted a Corn Bunting on the 3<sup>rd</sup>, and 3 Swallows and 8 Redpolls flew over there on the 4<sup>th</sup>.

On the 5<sup>th</sup> 265 Wood Pigeons, 23 Stock Doves, 4 Swallows and a House Martin flew west at Abbotscliffe, and 121 Chaffinches arrived in off the sea over the Café the next day, plus singles of Snow Bunting, Brambling and Redpoll. Visual migration continued on the 7<sup>th</sup>, with 760 Starlings, 7 Sky Larks, 3 Bullfinches, 2 Redpolls, 2 Lapwings, a Marsh Harrier, and a Brambling in off the sea at the Café. 12 Swallows. 2 House Martins and a Chiffchaff were also seen there. and 20 Swallows and a Peregrine were noted over Hythe.

Samphire Hoe produced the only Short-eared Owl of the autumn on the 8th, and 2 Black Redstarts, 2 Blackcaps and 2 Fieldfares were also present. A Dartford Warbler was found at Abbotscliffe on the 9<sup>th</sup> (remaining until the 14<sup>th</sup>), when a Woodcock was flushed behind the Café and a late Ring Ouzel was at Samphire Hoe. 150 Golden Plovers flew north over the Café on the 10<sup>th</sup>, a Swallow flew east and a Lapwing came in off. On the 11<sup>th</sup> single Little Egret and Muscovy Duck were at Samphire Hoe.

Single Chiffchaffs were at Samphire Hoe on the 12<sup>th</sup> and at Mill Point on the 14<sup>th</sup>, and a late House Martin was at Hythe on the 13<sup>th</sup>, when a Blackcap and 2 Little Egrets were at Samphire Hoe. A solitary Snipe was the only bird of note at Abbotscliffe on the 16<sup>th</sup>, and a Common Buzzard was seen over Pedlinge on the 18<sup>th</sup>.

A Little Auk lingered briefly off Samphire Hoe on the 20<sup>th</sup> and 15 Red-throated Divers flew east there. A late Chiffchaff and 2 Goldcrests were at Abbotscliffe, and 36 Chaffinches arrived in off the sea there, with a Corn Bunting east. 7 Brent Geese flew west past Hythe on the 21st.

Samphire Hoe continued its good run with a superb **Dusky Warbler** on the 25<sup>th</sup> (to 28<sup>th</sup>) – a new bird for the area. The site also recorded 3 Black Redstarts, Snow Bunting, Little Egret and Water Rail on the 27<sup>th</sup> and Little Grebe and Fieldfare on the 28<sup>th</sup>. On the 30<sup>th</sup> 25 Common Scoter were offshore of Mill Point, with an Eider off Hythe and 2 Shelduck flew east there.

#### December

December was typically quiet. The only notable count of Red-throated Divers was 15 east past Mill Point on the 12<sup>th</sup>, and up to 5 Great Crested Grebes were at Nickoll's Quarry throughout, with Little Grebes there, at Botolph's Bridge (2-3) and at Samphire Hoe. Two Shags were at Samphire

Hoe on the 11<sup>th</sup> and 3 were offshore of Mill Point the next day. Little Egrets were seen at Nickoll's Quarry (c.1<sup>st</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup>, with 2 on 24<sup>th</sup>), Samphire Hoe (11<sup>th</sup>) and Botolph's Bridge (29<sup>th</sup>).

The Mute Swan flock in the Botolph's Bridge (Donkey Street) area peaked at 85 on the 24<sup>th</sup>, and attracted a Greylag Goose from the 24<sup>th</sup>. Ducks were in very short supply with just 1 Pintail, 2 Pochard and 1 Tufted Duck at Nickoll's Quarry (all on 12<sup>th</sup>) and 3 Teal there on the 27<sup>th</sup>, on which date 20 were flushed from the Willop Sewer. 13 Common Scoter were off Mill Point on the 12<sup>th</sup>. Up to 75 Coot were at Nickoll's Quarry, and a Water Rail was seen there on the 27<sup>th</sup>.

Two Jack Snipe were at Nickoll's Quarry on the 11<sup>th</sup>, when single Green Sandpiper, Redshank and Snipe were noted at Botolph's Bridge. 104 Golden Plover were counted in the Botolph's Bridge area on the 29<sup>th</sup>. 2 Razorbills were off Samphire Hoe on the 4<sup>th</sup>.

A Black Redstart was at Samphire Hoe on the 27<sup>th</sup> and a Snow Bunting was seen there on the 11<sup>th</sup>. Linnets were wintering along the Hythe Ranges (20) and between Hythe Hill and Lympne Hill (9).
