PERSONAL MANAGEMENT

- 1. Obtain a copy of the merit badge handbook and read it.
- 2. Complete requirement 1. Email to get your purchase idea approved. Note that the requirement includes a discussion with the family regarding how the major purchase will be paid for; please bring a note signed by a parent that you have had this discussion. The shopping strategy should include comparison of 3-5 items, and prices for one specific item from at least 2 stores.
- 3. For requirement 2, prepare a monthly income and expense plan, and begin tracking all income and expenses starting no later than January 1. (The counselor will check on your progress on this at MBC.)
- 4. Be prepared to discuss the concepts or take a written test on requirements 3, 4, 6 and 7 at MBC. (You will be allowed to use the merit badge pamphlet or any notes you would like to make beforehand.)
- 5. Complete requirement 5 and be prepared to present the information you collected on your stocks to the group.
- 6. Complete requirement 8: one-week time management activity. Please note that the requirement includes three items: a prioritized "to do" list, a schedule to be created before the week that you track your activities, and a journal of how you actually spent your time. The requirement is not complete if all three of these items are not presented!
- 7. Bring an idea for your project plan (*requirement 9*) to MBC, but do not complete the project plan. The counselor will discuss your project plan with you at MBC and will schedule a time to meet with you after MBC so you can present your final project plan.
- 8. Complete *requirement 10*. Be prepared to discuss:
 - 1. What interests you about this career
 - 2. What the advantage or disadvantages of this career might be
 - 3. What are the education and training requirements of this career

- 4. Who might employ a person that works in this field
- 5. What skills, talents, or personality traits a person working in this field should have

PULP AND PAPER

 - d. Visit a recycled paper collection or sorting facility. Describe the operations there.

- e. Using books, magazines, your local library, the Internet (with your parent's permission), and any other suitable research tool, find out how paper products are developed. Find out what role research and development play in the papermaking industry. Share what you learn with your counselor.
- Find out about three career opportunities in the papermaking industry that interest you. Pick one and find out the education, training, and experience required for this profession. Discuss this with your counselor and explain why this profession might interest you.

RADIO

- 2a Sketch a diagram showing how radio waves travel locally and around the world.
- 3. Do the following:
 - a. Draw a chart of the electromagnetic spectrum covering 300 kilohertz (kHz) to 3,000 megahertz (MHz).
 - b. Label the MF, HF, VHF, UHF, and microwave portions of the spectrum on your diagram.
 - c. Locate on your chart at least eight radio services such as AM and FM commercial broadcast, citizens band (CB), television, amateur radio (at least four amateur radio bands), and public service (police and fire).
- 5a Explain the differences between a block diagram and a schematic diagram.
- 5b Draw a block diagram for a radio station that includes a transceiver, amplifier, microphone, antenna, and feed line.
- 8. Find out about three career opportunities in radio. Pick one and find out the education, training, and experience required for this profession. Discuss this with your counselor and explain why this profession might interest you.

Requirement 7 involves a trip to a radio station that has been approved by the parent and counselor. The Scout can either do this on his own, or I can arrange for a field trip to a local station to take place in between sessions. I will ask when I send out the introductory email.

SCOUTING HERITAGE

Scouts prior to the Scouting Heritage MB sessions please obtain access to, borrow or buy a copy of the Scouting Heritage Merit Badge pamphlet. Much of this merit badge is understanding the great history of Scouting and the associated programs and most can be found in that MB pamphlet or in the references at the end of the MB pamphlet.

Requirement 2: Prepare the two (2) biographical summaries and be prepared to give the summary at the MB session and be prepared to discuss 2 (b).

Requirement #4. Complete one (1) of the tasks (a), (b) or (c).

- (a) is self-explanatory and you will need to bring your journal as reference when you report to me what you did, saw and learned.
- (b) Either visit the Scouting Heritage Museum, at Philmont Scout Ranch or write a letter / email to obtain information about the facility and give a short report on what you think the role of this museum is in the Scouting program. (See the "Bryan on Scouting newsletter" at https://blog.scoutingmagazine.org/2017/04/06/new-procedurecompleting-scouting-heritage-mb-requirement-4b/. Essentially you can write or email the Philmont Museums for Scouting Heritage information. Key to completing (b) is that you bring to the MB Session the response received from your request to show along with your report. Scouts you must include the following information: first and last name, current Scout rank and your home mailing address. Send the letter, with your parent's permission, either by email to (philmont.museums@scouting.org) or via regular mail to: Scouting Heritage Merit Badge Request, Philmont Museums, 17 Deer Run Road, Cimarron, NM 87714. Please verify that your Scout information appears legible (can be read easily) and is correct / accurate; a number of letters every year are received where the Scout's information isn't legible or is inaccurate. You will receive a letter, fact sheet, and brochure, which can be used to prepare your report, and as proof that you followed the above procedure. Scouts allow at least three weeks (maybe more) for a response - that means YOU MUST do this several weeks in advance of the first MB Session, March 12, 2022.

(c) Visit an exhibit of Scouting memorabilia or local museum with a Scouting history gallery - BUT FIRST get my permission to visit –

Requirement #5. Have your Scoutmaster provide confirmation that you completed the required interview of two people and developed a report that you presented to your patrol, troop or at a Court of Honor and added to your troop's library. This confirmation can be an email from the Scoutmaster directly to me or a signed statement / letter to me from the Scoutmaster stating that you have completed requirement 4 (c). If you need help or guidance, give me a call or shoot me an email (cc another adult as well).

Requirement #6. Bring your collection of Scouting memorabilia to show me and share with the others in the MB session.

Requirement #7. If you pick an old-time Scouting game from the Scouting Heritage Merit Badge pamphlet, be prepared to teach the game with the other MB participants. (If you are considering using an old-time Scouting game NOT found in the Scouting Heritage MB pamphlet, call me before the first MB session for my permission to use the game - be prepared to tell me what the game is, where you found the reference for the game (came from), etc.

Requirement #8. Your interview of three (3) people should NOT include the two (2) you interviewed for requirement #5 above and they MUST be over the age of 40 and were Scouts. Be prepared to share with me at the MB session what you learned.

Questions about the prerequisites or need more guidance give me a call, email or text before the first session. (Always cc/copy another adult when you contact me by any method.)

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Safety glasses with side shields (if they have glasses they will need a pair that go over).
Cotton pants/denim jeans, no poly or nylon. Most Scout pants will light up pretty quick. I have welding gloves and fireproof jackets to cover shirts.
Leather boots or shoes. Sparks will go right through cloth shoes.
