CHURCHWARDEN'S ROUND-UP by Richard Clash

Nothing is ever what it seems!

Many years ago I happened to find myself in the role of churchwarden for a church in south London and, guess what, not long after being appointed the church had a vacancy. My fellow churchwarden - who originated from the Caribbean, was much older than myself and one of the wisest people I have ever met, displaying absolute integrity in any situation — certainly knew how to delegate. During the vacancy the church was blessed with having to organise a visit from the then Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr Robert Runcie. Why we had this honour bestowed upon us is another story, worthy of any French farce, but on the day I was duly delegated to stand outside the far east door and await the arrival of the Archbishop.

So with much aplomb and some trepidation I duly stood by the unassuming east door - commonly known as "the back door" - and awaited the arrival of our honoured guest. Soon a rather battered Morris mini drove up and decided to park in the one remaining vacant spot near the entrance to the east door. So, with great fortitude, I decided to make myself known and say to the driver: "Oi, you can't park there because this spot is reserved for the Archbishop of Canterbury." Trying to anticipate what colourful south London phraseology the driver may use in reply and work out a means of trying to persuade the driver to "shove off", I suddenly had to rework a more diplomatic approach as the driver, on getting out of the mini, stood about 12 inches taller than me, sported an extremely broad torso and didn't look in the mood for a polite conversation. Just as I approach the car an equally large individual got out of the passenger seat and, with an engaging smile, said: "Good afternoon, I believe I'm taking a service here this afternoon." My replay was a humble: "Welcome to St Paul's, Archbishop." The driver was his chaplain. I have never figured out how they got the Bishop's crosier to fit in the mini!

In the same vain I found myself driving home late at night from Peterborough to Sleaford. Finding the radio's news station rather boring I tuned into a music channel. For the next three minutes I found myself listening to one of the most soulful voices I had heard for some while. This voice was full of richness and effusing a natural talent of extreme depth. At the end of the song the radio presenter said: "... and that was Amy Winehouse." I was taken aback. Until that moment my only recollection of Winehouse was that portrayed by various newspaper reports and media presenters, the majority not very favourable. But, hey, the music I had just heard moved me and I thought here was somebody who had immense talent. Why did I not just listen to her singing rather be taken in by the bad press reports? It was sad the see her go in such a tragic way - such a fragile personality and extremely vulnerable individual. Such a loss to the music world.

SOME DARKER MOMENTS FOR ST DENYS'S

§ <u>John de Kirkeby</u>: In *The Registers of Henry Burghersh* 1320-1342: III, [Lincoln Record Society, 101 (2011)], is this entry: "John, vicar of Sleaford, to visit Rome for remedy of his sins and for other business concerning himself and his church. He is to return to his vicarage within 5 months. Trusthorpe, 4 October 1325." (Note 173: "John de Kirkeby was vicar of Sleaford from 1313 until 1336.") One wonders what John's "sins" were that needed remedy!

§ <u>Frederick James Daughtry</u>: He was already organist by November, 1882. During the great public meetings about installing a new organ and choir-stalls in the chancel, one report - 28 May, 1890: Sleaford Gazette - states: "Mr. Bissell observed: 'Mr. Daughtry ought to keep his choir in order', to which the Vicar [Alfred Langdon] replied: 'He cannot'".

A year and half later, various local newspapers around the country carried articles along these lines: "Terrible Tragedy in Hartlepool. ATTEMPTED WIFE MURDER BY AN ORGANIST. Suicide of the Assailant. The Press Association Hartlepool correspondent telegraphs: 'Shortly before ten o'clock on Thursday night Mr. Frederick Daughtry, organist of Christ Church, West Hartlepool, attempted to murder his wife and then shot himself dead. Mr Daughtry came to Hartlepool about eighteen months ago from Sleaford, Lincolnshire, and has since acted both as organist and a teacher of tnusic.'

"A later telegram from Hartlepool states that F J Daughtry was annoyed at the presence in the house of his wife's sister, Miss Jackson, and that he had told his wife that unless she got rid of the sister there would be trouble. During the struggle in the house Daughtry fired point blank at Miss Jackson, but she escaped the bullet by falling on the ground." The Sleaford Gazette's report of the incident and subsequent inquest runs to three and a third columns of small print.

- § <u>Canon Alfred Langdon</u>: i] The "Langdon" barometer. Mr. Michael Channon, a collector of antique barometers, bought an angle tube barometer: on the back was "Invented and made by the Rev. Alfred Langdon, sometime vicar of St. Denys Church, Sleaford, Lincs. Circa 1786-1824". The question is: did Alfred Langdon simply own this barometer, or did he make a reproduction of the original? Any answers would be very welcome! ii] In 1882, for reasons I know not yet, our vicar, Richard Yerburgh II, exchanged livings with Alfred Langdon, rector of High Bickington, Devon. Here Langdon remained, and this entry appeared in The Eagle [magazine of St.John's College, Cambridge.] "The REV. CANON ALFRED LANGDON (B.A. 1865), Vicar of Sleaford, Lincs., since 1882, and Prebendary of Nassington in Lincoln Cathedral, formerly Rector of High Bickington, North Devon, died at the Vicarage, Sleaford, on 16th November, 1925, in his 84th year. "He had been in failing health for some months, and never really recovered from the shock caused by burns in an accident which occurred in his study earlier in the year."
- § As a final thought, the Revd. Robert Alford, along with William Brown. Robert Bee, woollen draper, Thomas Ballard, late of Sleaford, and Sir Hammond Whichcote, of Sleaford, Knight, was indicted for high treason at a special assize held in Grantham in April 1643!



EMBRACE The Middle East

I am wondering how many of you actually know about the charity Embrace the Middle East and the work that we do in the Holy Lands.

Embrace was founded in 1854 as The Turkish Mission Aid Society during the Turkish massacre of the Armenian people. Lord Shaftesbury was one of the original founders. During its 168 years the name has changed several times for various reasons Some of you may have known it as The Bible Land Society or Biblelands. The name changed to its current name because of confusion with The Bible Society which is something totally different. We are the only Christian charity working solely in the lands of the Bible - Israel, Palestine, Lebanon, Egypt, Syria and now Iraq. We support approximately 50 projects in these countries working in Education, Social Care, Health and Medical Care, Special Needs and Disabilities, Vocational and Adult training and Support and Care of Refugees. All of the projects that we support are Christian run but nobody of any denomination or none are ever turned away when in need.

Many of our projects are long term, i.e. hospitals, schools, homes and for disabled and refugees. There are many who just need one-off short-term help. They all tell us that our prayers and the ability to talk to us regularly are of utmost importance to them, someone is always available to talk to them, usually now by video link.

I have been a member of Embrace since 1983 and a volunteer for many years. I have visited over 20 of our projects in the Holy Land including two of the Syrian refugee camps. The job of a volunteer is to assess the work we are doing and to report our findings, good or bad, so that appropriate action can be taken. If we find that any of the help we are giving to a project is being misused it is investigated and , if necessary, that project is refused further support.

I am very proud to be a volunteer with Embrace and wholly support the work they are doing amongst the people in the lands where Jesus lived and carried our his ministry.
