It is hard to believe that we still find ourselves amid a pandemic. We have given up so much and have learned to adapt to change.



My Favorite Saint



Saint Francis of Assisi

As a lifelong Catholic, Saint Francis of Assisi has always been one of my "go to" saints. Among the most venerated saints of all time, he was committed to following God's will to rebuild the Church. The founder of the Franciscans, he embraced a life of humility, poverty, and devotion to the Eucharist. One of my favorite prayers, *Lord, make me an instrument of your peace*, (traditionally ascribed to him but never found in his writings) calls us to be Christ's instruments of peace and love. In his *Canticle of the Creatures* Francis inspires us to praise and thank God for all creation. Francis received the stigmata two years before his death at age 44 and was canonized two years later. The patron saint of Italy, animals and ecology, his feast day is October 4.

Spirituality Corner

Walk Through Holy Week

Holy Week is an epic story of a hero who fights to save innocent lives. Jesus came into the world to be the hero of this epic story of light and darkness and good and evil. Ancient prophecies will be fulfilled. He will be called upon to sacrifice his own life.

As Jesus began his last journey, he told his disciples exactly what would happen, he would be handed over to the chief priests to be crucified. He also told them that he would be raised on the third day.

On Palm Sunday, as they approached Jerusalem, his disciples secured a donkey for him to ride as he entered the city. Everything happened as he said. This was foretold five hundred years before Christ by the prophet Zechariah: Exult greatly, O daughter Zion! Shout for joy, O daughter Jerusalem! Behold: your king is coming to you, a just savior is he, Humble, and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey.

In ancient times the donkey was an animal that was used by people daily, and a king who rode a donkey was coming in peace. Jesus was coming as the King of Peace. As Jesus made his way through, the people treated him royally by waving palm branches. In ancient times the palm was used to welcome a victorious king back to his city.

Palm Sunday begins Holy Week. The day's title is actually, "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord." We now move from the Green vestments of Ordinary time to red vestments that are worn on Palm Sunday, Good Friday.

There are two Gospels. The liturgy of Palm Sunday begins in the back of the Church. The deacon reads the Gospel story of Jesus' triumphant entrance at the back of the Church. All the people are holding palm branches that will be blessed by the priest in silence.

Also, during Holy Week, the Diocese celebrates the Chrism Mass on Monday evening of Holy Week. The word Chrism comes from the word Christos, a Greek word meaning "the anointed one" who is called the Christ. Oil is used many times throughout the Old Testament. At this Mass priests from throughout the diocese bring three vessels of oil to the Cathedral for the Bishop to bless. These will be used over the next year for the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation and to anoint the sick. During this Mass the priests will also renew their priestly promises.

Now we begin the Triduum. The word Triduum is Latin meaning Three Days. The Sacred Triduum begins with the Mass on Holy Thursday. There is only one Mass permitted on Holy Thursday, The Mass of the Lord's Supper which takes place in the evening. The tabernacle is empty, and the altar light is gone. The priests wear simple white vestments.

On this night, Jesus and his disciples are celebrating the Feast of Passover, which commemorates the exodus of the people from slavery in Egypt. During the Passover feast in the upper room, Jesus institutes the Sacrament of the Eucharist, taking the unleavened bread and pronouncing the words, "Take and eat, this is my body. Take and drink, this is my blood." At the end of the meal, Jesus, the Lord and Master, kneels to wash the feet of the disciples.

After Jesus washed the feet of the disciples he told them that this is what they must go and do for others. This wasn't a request, it was a mandate, a command, and that is why we often hear Holy Thursday referred to as Maundy Thursday. Maundy is old English for the word Mandatum or Mandate.

Good Friday is the Solemn Commemoration of the Lord's Passion traditionally taking place at 3:00 pm, the time indicated in the Scriptures of the Lord's death. It is at this time we venerate the Cross, with the usual veneration being a kiss.

We conclude Holy Week with the Great Vigil of Easter. It is at this Mass we celebrate the resurrection of the Lord. We are brought out of the darkness of sin to new life in Christ. Alleluia! Alleluia!

LEGISLATION/RESPECT LIFE

March for Life: Anti-abortion protesters were optimistic at the March for Life. A crowd of thousands, with a heavy contingent of young people and students, were in attendance. The mood was upbeat, with many treating the end of Roe v. Wade as inevitable. President Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris released a statement saying the right established under Roe v. Wade "is under assault as never before" and they said they were committed "to ensuring the country is not pushed backwards on women's equality." Jeanne Mancini, President of the March for Life Education & Defense Fund, told the crowd that Roe is not settled law and "we are hoping and praying that 2022 will bring a change for life."

U.S. Supreme Court Case Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization: This is a pending case dealing with the constitutionality of a 2018 Mississippi state law that banned abortions after 15 weeks of pregnancy. Lower courts had ruled in preliminary injunctions to prevent enforcement of the law on the basis that it violated the holding of women's rights in Planned Parenthood v. Casey which generally allows a woman to opt for an abortion within the first 24 weeks. Oral arguments were held in December 2021 with a decision expected in early spring or summer of 2022. This decision could impact the fate of millions of children and their mothers. It's possible that a decision could come in March.

Stop Taxpayer Funding of Abortion in Pennsylvania: The PA Senate Health & Human Services Committee has approved Senate Bill 956, a commonsense amendment which would stop taxpayer funding of abortion in PA and keep abortion out of the PA Constitution. The next step is a vote by the full Senate. Please send an updated message to your State Senator urging them to support this amendment.

Spiritual Adoption Program: The Commission Chairs of Legislation/Respect Life, Family Concerns and Community Concerns are once again sponsoring this program. It will begin on Mother's Day, May 8, 2022 and end on February 8, 2023. The procedure for registering will be the same as last year. You can also register at our Convention on Saturday, April 23, 2022. More information will be forthcoming.

Pro-Life Rosary Bead: This is a new bead which will be available at Convention. You may purchase it for \$1.00.

Doctor Mildred Jefferson

In honor of Black History Month, we recognize **Doctor Mildred Jefferson**, the first Black woman to attend Harvard Medical School and the first woman to be employed as a general surgeon at Boston University Medical Center. In 1975, she became the President of National Right to Life, serving as an eloquent and dedicated voice for the most vulnerable until her death in 2010. May her example inspire us all.
