This past Christmas, both of my sons asked for a cross chain (a necklace with a cross pendant). At different times in the past, I myself have wanted a gold cross charm on either a necklace or bracelet, but refused to purchase one. Too many foul-mouthed, bad-behaving, "fake Christians" had completely tarnished the perception I had of what wearing a cross should mean. At first, I grimaced a bit when I saw that item on their lists, and I half-way decided to try and sway them from that desire. But as days passed, I pictured myself telling them that they shouldn't want to wear the symbol of Jesus Christ. I walked in my mind through the process of telling two young men who study the Bible, pray regularly, worship Christ, and profess Christianity, that because some *other* people don't represent the cross properly, they too should not wear one. Needless to say, that wasn't happening.

Of course I understand that my boys are at the age where they're influenced heavily by what they see on screens in cyber-world. And who doesn't like the way "gold" jewelry shimmers against his or her skin or smooth-textured clothing? While all of that may have fed into their desire, I also knew that they were well aware of what the symbol of the cross means—a representation of the instrument of the crucifixion of Jesus, His love, His death, and our faith as Christians. And so if they could wear Jesus on a baseball cap, or represent their church or episcopal district with a T-Shirt, why should I have a problem with their appropriate representation of the cross?

How many times, and in what other ways do we as Christians *not* do something because of how the world has made it appear? Instead of concerning ourselves with who is doing things for the wrong reasons, perhaps we should just make sure that we're doing them for the right reasons. People who do the right thing, for the right purpose, will always endure, and will outlast the imposters.

"Do not fret because of evil men or be envious of those who do wrong; for like the grass they will soon wither, like green plants they will soon die away. Trust in the Lord and do good; dwell in the land and enjoy safe pasture. Delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart. Commit your way to the Lord; trust in him and he will do this; He will make your righteousness shine like the dawn, the justice of your cause like the noonday sun." "Psalm 37: 1-6

The truth is, as Christians we are all wearing a cross. Everyday, everywhere we go, we bear the symbol and responsibility of Christianity. When you claim God as your father, and Jesus as your savior, someone is always watching to see how you will represent that. As spoken in Psalm 37, God will make your righteousness shine like the dawn and the justice of your cause like the noonday sun. What a privilege to be able to have our purpose in Jesus shine like the dawn!

So whether the cross is hanging in silver or gold around your neck, or whether it is hidden in your heart, it is present. The question is, how will you *wear* yours? What will others see when they look at how you represent the cross?
