

"Roads Less Travelled" Ride Report

First weekend in July and the temperature drops dramatically. I wondered how many people would venture out when it was only 1 degree. I was pleasantly surprised at Yamanto as there were a good many bikes already there when I arrived at 8:30am.

The sun was shining and the day looked promising with absolutely no clouds on the horizon. We left Yamanto just on 9:00am with 17 bikes and 19 riders. Heading off to Rosewood, Tallagalla and Minden we all crossed the Warrego without any problems. Then onto to some back roads through Tarampa, Mt Tarampa and Lockyer Waters along some very interesting quiet country roads.

We came out onto the Gatton Esk Rd north of the jail and then we went around the back of Gatton and out past the railway line and back in through Placid Hills, which is a short hop to Grantham and the "Floating Cafe".

By this stage people were commenting on the amount of new roads they had never travelled on before, even my Tail-End Charlie Bev, who often comes on a recce with me found some new roads that she hadn't been on.

Dorothy and Gunter were waiting for us at the cafe. Gunter was just about to leave as he sick of waiting for us. He had calculated that we would take around 35mins from Yamanto to get to Grantham but nobody warned him that I like to see as much of the countryside as possible rather than scream down the highway. Ado and Amanda were going to head home as Ado had a few "Bowen" customers in the afternoon but i persuaded him to come a little further up the mountains so that he wouldn't miss the best parts of the ride.

It makes sense for them all to graze in the same direction, so the herd stays together as it drifts around the field or across the savannah. Facing the same way also cuts down on conflict in the herd because it avoids head-to-head confrontations, because you know how Cranky cows can get.

Useful extracts from the Qld Motorcycle rider guide. Lane filtering rules

Lane filtering is when you ride your motorcycle at low speed between stationary or slow moving vehicles travelling in the same direction you are. The 2 lines or lanes of traffic must both be travelling in the same direction. If one of the lines or lanes is a dedicated turning lane (left or right) you must not lane filter using this lane.

You're only allowed to lane filter in Queensland if you hold an open licence for the motorcycle you are riding and:

- your speed when filtering is 30km/h or less
- it's safe to do so.

You're not allowed to lane filter:

- at a speed more than 30km/h
- in school zones during school zone hours
- if you're a learner or provisional licence holder
- if it isn't safe.

A motorcycle rider is not allowed to use a bicycle lane to lane filter.

To ensure pedestrian safety, lane filtering is only allowed between stationary or slow moving vehicles, not between a vehicle and the kerb. Any vehicle, including a motorcycle may overtake to the left of a stationary vehicle

Rules for riding on road shoulders

If you hold an open licence for the motorcycle you are riding, you can ride on road shoulders and in emergency stopping lanes on major roads—such as highways, freeways and motorways past stationary or slow moving traffic if:

- the speed limit is 90km/h or more
- your speed is 30km/h or less
- you give way to cyclists or other motorcycle riders already using the shoulder
- it is safe to do so
- you are not riding on any unsealed parts of the road.

Road shoulders are the sealed area to the left or right of a road's edge line.

But be warned, if the speed limit on a major road is reduced to less than 90km/h for any reason, for example by a variable speed control sign or because of roadworks, then you can no longer legally ride on the road shoulder or in an emergency stopping lane.

Motorcycle control rules

You must stay in control of your motorcycle at all times. You must sit with 1 leg on either side of your seat at all times when riding a motorcycle, but you can lift your leg from the footrests or raise yourself from the seat if you need to while riding






