CEDAR HILL SCHOOL BUILDING Listing on National and State Register as an Historic Place

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the Nation's cultural resources worthy of preservation. The National Register is one outcome of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966. It is administered by the National Park Service under the Secretary of the Interior.

Nominations to the National Register are normally made through the state offices of historic preservation. In our state, the program is administered by the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. To be nominated, a property must be documented and evaluated according to uniform standards and criteria. If approved for listing in the State Register, the nomination is forwarded for national recognition.

Listing results in the following:

- Recognition that a property is of significance to the Nation, the State or the community.
- Consideration in the planning for Federal or federally assisted projects.
- Qualification for Federal assistance for historic preservation, when funds are available.

The Cedar Hill Schoolhouse has been proposed for nomination. As members of the Bethlehem Historical Association, we recognize the historical significance of the schoolhouse in our community. If the nomination is approved, our community can be proud of the fact that efforts by members of the Association to preserve the schoolhouse is also worthy of national recognition.

Notification has been received from the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation that nomination of the Cedar Hill School for listing, will be considered at the next meeting of the State Review Board, scheduled for March 20, 1998.

MARJORIE TERRELL LEGACY

DISPLAY OF BETHLEHEM ARTIFACTS

Two display cabinets at the Cedar Hill School contain artifacts presented by Floyd Brewer. One display cabinet contains items from the Pre-historic Era found on the Goes/VanDerzee farm. The other cabinet contains artifacts from the Nicolls-Sill Estate from the period after European settlers came. One coin, dated 1757, indicates the general timeline of these artifacts.

RECORDS OF THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF BETHLEHEM BOOK AVAILABLE

The Bethlehem Historical Association has published a book with 15,000 name entries, representing over 1,400 families from church, government, and private records covering 1698 - 1880. Genealogists will find elusive branches of their Albany area families here. In this single volume an individual can be traced from baptism through marriage and a variety of public activities to his or her death. Descendants can find the location of his home and grave site. The cost is \$25.00 + \$3.00 for handling and postage = \$28.00. Mailing address is shown at the heading of this newsletter.
