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INTRODUCTION

Welcome to this series of Learning Lookups in the New Testament, giving children an excellent understanding of their Bibles from the coming of Christ through the Revelation.

The sure benefit of this package is that your students will have the big picture of the New Testament gospels, letters, and revelations after completing these worksheets. They will know what occurred in the 27 different books and have a better understanding of God's message of salvation played out through all the contributing apostles. God's messages will become very clear!

You can use the package as a comprehensive study to help students ages 7 & up learn the New Testament. Or you can bring out pages on an as-needed basis while completing other studies. Flexibility is key, so let's look at the package and all the ways to use it.

What's In This Package

Enclosed are 21 Learning Lookup sheets, each covering one or more books of the New Testament. All 27 books are covered, with some doubled up based on the authors. A complete list of all 21 worksheets with the book breakdowns is included in the Table of Contents, and the complete list of books in the New Testament is on a separate page.

On each sheet are the following:

Background Information on each book is found at the top of each worksheet and is generally one paragraph long and designed for easy reading.

Seven or Eight Bible Lookup Questions follow on each sheet, and generally cover the most beloved, classic, or well-known scriptures from that book. Students will have to complete lookups to pick the correct answers at the bottom.

Teacher's Answer Sheets are provided for all 21 worksheets.

A list of the books of the New Testament is covered on one sheet that students can have in the middle of the table while completing the Bible lookups.

How to Use the New Testament Worksheets

A list of the books of the New Testament is covered on one sheet that students can have in the middle of the table while completing the Bible lookups.

Encourage children to take their time and enjoy the passages.

It is important to help with lookups and understanding. Enjoy the material with them, praising lookups and showing your interest in the questions and answers. This isn't a time to rush to finish, and the material should not be used in relays.

For many children, this series may be their first exposure to the basics of God's word. Children need adults to help them along with it. Answering questions could easily ignite further questions. While you don't have to know all the answers, your enthusiasm for God and his word will spread! Hence, we suggest using this series as a send-home sheet or unsupervised fill-in sheet only if children are 10 & older.

Allow plenty of time for students who are new to Bible lookups.

Some of the Bible passages require children to read more than one verse—sometimes the surrounding four or five verses! Such gives them an opportunity to understand the question's context and not just grab for the answer. Therefore don't expect students to whip through these lookups in 10 minutes. The time you will need will depend on the ages of students and their abilities. In the cases where the scriptures involve stories, half an hour supervised study will most likely suffice.

Incorporating teamwork

Teamwork makes learning more fun and can optimize retention!

If you teach a mixed-age group, it pays to pair an older child with a younger child. Children as young as seven should be learning how to navigate the Bible, and the older student can act as mentor. They can derive the answer together.

Why This Package is Important

We don't want children to just know the names of the Bible books or be able to recite a dozen important verses. By the time students are halfway through their Sunday school years, we want them to start getting an overview of the story God is telling in this one amazing book.

The Bible is 66 books with more than 40 authors, written over a period of 1,500 years. They all had their own styles, perspectives, eras, and challenges to deal with. However, the more one reads the Bible, the more one is able to see clearly that it is ONE ongoing story—God's message to mankind—and it still inspires as many people today as it ever did! Your students will begin to understand this and thus become closer to God as they unveil his secrets—one book and author at a time!

MATTHEW

Matthew is the first gospel and was written by Jesus' apostle by that name. It was written around 60 AD. Matthew was writing to Jews as opposed to gentiles, which is why his gospel often quotes the Old Testament to show how prophecy was fulfilled. The other gospels aren't as much about that.

1. **In this famous passage, Jesus brings hope to all by promising to be with us always, even until the end of this.**
(Matthew 28:20)
2. **In this beloved passage known as the Great Commission, Jesus says to make this of the people in all nations.**
(Matthew 28:19)
3. **Matthew had this occupation before becoming an apostle, and probably was a ruthless person prior to his salvation.**
(Matthew 9:9)
4. **The verse attests that following Christ makes life easier and more joyful, though sometimes it feels like the opposite. Jesus offers this to the weary and heavy-laden.**
(Matthew 11:28)
5. **Jesus called Peter a strange term when they first talked about the church. It implied that Peter would always be known as the apostle who started the church. This is the word Jesus used.** (Matthew 16:18)
6. **Jesus says he came to fulfill the law and as well as the words given by these special people.** (Matthew 5:17)
7. **Jesus called this the greatest commandment.**

MARK

John Mark, who wrote this book, is thought first to be a friend of Apostle Peter, but then he traveled with Apostle Paul and his assistant Barnabas on Paul's first missionary journey around Asia Minor. The book accents the miracles of Christ.

Mark's point was to show how powerful, kind, and merciful God is. Whereas Matthew presents Jesus as king, Mark presents him as a humble servant of man. Mark was most likely the first gospel written, with dating between 50 and 60 AD, or within 20 years of the death of Christ.

1. **Jesus said, surprisingly, that a certain day of the week was made for man. It shows that men are more important to God than laws. This is the day. (Mark 2:27)**
2. **The Bible implies that Jesus was biologically fathered by the Holy Spirit. However, Mary and Joseph went on to have other children after his birth. Jesus' biological half-brothers were named Simon, Judas, Joseph, and this man. (Mark 6:3)**
3. **Jesus tells us to pick up this thing daily, which means to put his ideas in front of our own. (Mark 8:34)**
4. **Jesus says that we can have whatever we ask for, in faith, as long as we do this also. (Mark 11:24)**
5. **Jesus said he came not to start a rebellion or cause trouble, but rather to do this. (Mark 10:45)**
6. **Jesus proclaimed that this belongs to the little children. (Mark 10:14)**
7. **While Jesus was on the cross, he asked why God had done this certain thing. (Mark 15:34)**

LUKE

Luke is considered a gospel of extremely good news for the common man. This is why stories are included such as the Good Samaritan (who helps an injured man while religious leaders pass right by him). The conversations between the robbers on the crosses near Jesus show the Lord's grace for those who have committed crimes.

While Matthew attempts to prove Christ's kingship, Luke shows him as the one who offers salvation to all humanity—Jew and gentile alike. It is thought to have been written shortly after the Gospel of Mark was completed, around 60 AD.

1. **God sent an angel to tell Mary that she would have the baby Jesus. This was the angel's name.** *(Luke 1:26-33)*
2. **Jesus made this all-time famous statement, naming a rule that everyone should follow to achieve peace on earth. It is to love you neighbor as you would love this.** *(Luke 10:27)*
3. **Mary and Joseph traveled to Bethlehem for a specific purpose, not intending to have a baby there! The purpose of the journey was this.** *(Luke 2:1-4)*
4. **At the start of his ministry, Jesus went into the wilderness and was tempted by Satan. He was in the wilderness for this amount of time.** *(Luke 4:2)*
5. **When he was 12, Jesus got separated from his parents while on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. His parents found him here.** *(Luke 2:46)*
6. **Jesus tells us not to worry but instead to be like these animals.** *(Luke 12:24)*
7. **Jesus healed on a special day. The religious leaders were angry instead of happy for the person he healed. This was the day.** *(Luke 14:1-6)*

JOHN

John wanted to make sure people knew that Jesus was not just a great prophet, miracle man, or teacher. He was “the only begotten son of God.” Jesus was different from us. We are born of men, and Jesus was born of God, according to all that John stated.

New Christians often start reading their Bibles with the Book of John. This is because he was a fisherman, and not a Jewish scholar, before becoming an apostle. All he has to say is very relatable to normal, working-class people—like us and the generations who came before us.

Apostle John wrote five books in the New Testament, including the Revelation. This gospel is thought to be his first, penned between 80 and 90 AD.

1. **Here is the most quoted verse in the entire Bible among Christians. It states that “God so loved the world that he gave his only...”** (*John 3:16*)
2. **John calls Jesus this in the beginning of his gospel, saying he was God and he was with God.** (*John 1:1*)
3. **Jesus made eight famous “I am” statements in the Book of John. They include “I am the bread of life,” “I am the door to the sheep.” In another, he referred to himself as the way, the truth, and this.** (*John 14:6*)
4. **To all who receive him and believe on his name, Jesus gives the right to become this.** (*John 1:12*)
5. **Here is another famous passage among Christians. It states that in order to see the kingdom of God, you must become this.** (*John 3:3*)
6. **Jesus’ very first miracle occurred in the small town of Cana, at a wedding. Who asked Jesus to turn the water into wine?** (*John 2:1-5*)
7. **There wouldn’t be enough of this one thing in the world to hold all of the stories about Jesus.** (*John 21:25*)

ACTS

Acts is the only book in the Bible that tells us how the early church was born. It gives a valuable account of how the church was able to spark in Jerusalem and spread throughout the Roman Empire. It covers the works of the apostles in the early days after Christ's death.

Acts covers the time period of about 30 years, from the day of the Ascension until around 30 years later, or 30 to 62 AD. It was thought to be penned in 62 AD, or shortly thereafter.

1. **At his Ascension, Jesus promised the disciples they would receive this special gift on the day of Pentecost. It is available to all of us through the Holy Spirit.** (*Acts 1:8*)
2. **At the Ascension, two men appeared who some scholars think were Enoch and the prophet Elijah. They were the only two Old Testament heroes who were taken to heaven without dying first. They said that Jesus would return to earth in this way.** (*Acts 1:10-11*)
3. **On the day of Pentecost, the people heard this sound, which meant the Holy Spirit had come among them.** (*Acts 2:2*)
4. **God doesn't show favoritism and accepts people from every what?** (*Acts 10:35*)
5. **Saul was threatening to do this to the Christians before his conversion when he became Paul.** (*Acts 9:1*)
6. **Ananias lied about sharing to God and the Holy Spirit. Consequently, this happened to him.** (*Acts 5:5*)
7. **As the church grew, believers shared all their possessions. They were described as being of one heart and this also.** (*Acts 4:32*)

ROMANS

Paul was writing to Christians living in Rome. He knew he was writing to city people who could be very different from each other. Tough sailors, well-traveled tradesmen, wealthy former idolaters, and slaves were all part of the new church in Rome. He wanted them to see their likeness in Christ. This book is known as the best for understanding the basic truths of salvation.

At the time of this writing, around 56 AD, the emperor Nero had not yet started to persecute Christians. It was considered a time of relative peace.

1. **In this famous passage, Paul tells us that we have all sinned and fall short of this attribute.** (*Romans 3:23*)
2. **When you declare Jesus as Lord and believe in his power, God will do this.** (*Romans 10:9*)
3. **“The wages of sin is death,” but the gift from God is this.** (*Romans 6:23*)
4. **We can have confidence that even bad things will work out in this way if we have Christ as savior.** (*Romans 8:28*)
5. **We should live our lives for God by offering our bodies as these.** (*Romans 12:1*)
6. **Good men might die to save other good men. But Christ died for these people to show God’s love for all.** (*Romans 5:8*)
7. **Do not to conform to the ways of the world but have Christ do this instead.** (*Romans 12:2*)

1 & 2 CORINTHIANS

Paul wrote 1 Corinthians to address bad behavior and quarreling in the church. He wanted to teach them about discipleship and send them instructions for living according the Christ's example.

Second Corinthians is actually the fourth letter Paul had written to this feisty group of believers. Two of the letters were lost in history. After three bad reports of their behavior, Paul finally got a good one. He wrote 2 Corinthians to encourage them on their journey toward the kingdom of God.

The books were written about a year apart, possibly 55 and 56 AD.

1. **We should not be deceived and think that wrongdoers will inherit this.** (*1 Corinthians 6:9*)
2. **Love is patient, love is kind. Love does not envy or do this.** (*1 Corinthians 13:4*)
3. **Our bodies are to be like this for the Holy Spirit.** (*1 Corinthians 6:19*)
4. **All people experience temptation. However, God will never let us be tempted beyond this.** (*1 Corinthians 10:13*)
5. **We should not allow unbelievers to hold us back in our faith. But we can be held back if we get in this situation with them.** (*2 Corinthians 6:14*)
6. **Jesus gave up all his riches and became poor so that we might receive this blessing.** (*2 Corinthians 8:9*)
7. **We should not do good while rolling our eyes or having a bad attitude. Rather we should give in this way.** (*2 Corinthians 9:6*)

GALATIANS

Leaders in the Church in Galatia were starting to say that gentiles needed to follow Jewish laws in order to be saved. It was confusing people and putting a burden on them all that was unnecessary. Paul wanted to straighten that out. He explains that Jesus sets people free; he doesn't put them in bondage to hard laws. Salvation comes through faith and not following laws.

Paul defends against accusations that he is not a true apostle by explaining his spiritual experience of seeing Christ. He saw Christ in the sky after his death, but hadn't walked with him like the other apostles. The book was written early among New Testament contributions, around 49 AD.

- 1. The Fruits of the Spirit are love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and this.**
(Galatians 5:22-23)
- 2. There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for are all this in Christ.**

EPHESIANS

Paul wrote several New Testament epistles while under house arrest in Rome, and Ephesians is one of them. The others are Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon. He was arrested several times for preaching the gospel, but these four books are known as “the prison gospels,” as it was a very high-energy couple of years for Paul in the writing department. The book dates around 60 AD.

Paul met his goal of encouraging believers in Ephesus, calling them “adopted sons” of God and saying things like God picked believers before the foundation of the world. He encourages believers to walk in a manner worthy of their calling.

1. **This famous salvation scripture tells us that we are not saved by our deeds. Rather we are saved by this, which is a free gift from God.** (*Ephesians 2:8*)
2. **Our struggle is not against flesh and blood. It is against rulers, authorities, powers of this dark world, and these, which exist in the heavenlies.** (*Ephesians 6:12*)
3. **We are God’s handiwork, created in Christ to do these, which God prepared in advance.** (*Ephesians 2:10*)
4. **God chose us to do his good works before this time.** (*Ephesians 1:4*)
5. **God is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work in this place.** (*Ephesians 3:20*)
6. **You are no longer foreigners, but members of this.** (*Ephesians 2:19*)
7. **We must speak the truth, but must do so while having this.** (*Ephesians 4:15*)

PHILIPPIANS

This book begins with Paul describing his imprisonment in Rome. He was under house arrest while writing this and three other epistles. Paul wrote this letter to express his appreciation and affection for the believers in the church of Philippi. More than any other church, the people offered Paul support for his ministry in payments, gifts, and comfort. The book was penned between 60 and 62 AD.

1. **God tells us not to be anxious about our problems. That is a tough assignment. But in this popular verse, he tells us to use prayer, supplication, and this in solving problems.**
(*Philippians 4:6*)
2. **We can feel angry, insecure, even hateful over certain problems in life. Here is a verse to help distract us from toxic thinking. Think of whatever is true, noble, right, pure, and virtuous, and then do this.** (*Philippians 4:8*)
3. **We can be confident in God, because we don't have to do all the work to grow spiritually. He is the one who will bring us to this point.** (*Philippians 1:6*)
4. **Don't do anything out of selfishness or conceit, but instead we should think of others in this way.** (*Philippians 2:3*)
5. **Paul could handle a lot of hardship because he was filled with the fruit of this.** (*Philippians 1:11*)
6. **The peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard these parts of us through Jesus.** (*Philippians 4:7*)
7. **Philippians is one of the books Paul wrote while imprisoned. He explained to the guards that he was in chains for this.**
(*Philippians 1:13*)

COLOSSIANS

Paul wrote this letter to defend the authority of Jesus and to warn against spiritual practices which are not of God. He tells the people that Jesus is divine. They were starting to say what many people say today, that Jesus was simply a great prophet and teacher and there are other paths to contact with God the Father. Paul wanted to set the record straight. Jesus is our Savior.

He wrote the epistle while under house arrest in Rome, around 60 to 61 AD.

1. **Some people think God is hard to know. But this verse says that Jesus is “the image of the invisible God.” It also says Jesus was the firstborn over all of this.** (*Colossians 1:15*)
2. **Be clothed in compassion, kindness, humility, patience, and also this.** (*Colossians 3:12*)
3. **We have been rescued from the dominion of darkness! We are now part of this.** (*Colossians 1:13*)
4. **When we work on a task, whether it’s homework, a chore, or a good deed, we should do it all as if this were the case.** (*Colossians 3:23*)
5. **To “put to death” is another Biblical way of saying “resist temptations.” We should resist temptations to do with these.** (*Colossians 3:5*)
6. **We should let this to rule our hearts instead of fear, bitterness, or other toxic emotions.** (*Colossians 3:15*)
7. **We should devote ourselves to prayer, being watchful, and this also.** (*Colossians 4:2*)

1 & 2 THESSALONIANS

Paul spent around three months in Thessalonica when it was a small, new church. He wanted to check up on their faith, fearing that false teachers might have infiltrated their members. He sent back Timothy, who gave a surprisingly good report. That prompted Paul to write 1 Thessalonians as a letter of encouragement.

In 2 Thessalonians, Paul spoke to the people again about the coming return of Jesus Christ, as some there thought that Jesus had already returned. The letter was to correct any misunderstandings.

The letters were written in the same year or a year apart, somewhere around 51 AD.

- 1. Paul explains that we do not have to be upset about these people, even though the world is very upset about them.**
(1 Thessalonians 4:13)
- 2. Thessalonians is famous for a passage about the Second Coming. It states that these people shall rise first to meet Christ** *(1 Thessalonians 4:16)*
- 3. Paul says that we should give thanks in all of these.**
(1 Thessalonians 5:18)
- 4. The verse states that we should encourage each other and also do this.** *(1 Thessalonians 5:11)*
- 5. This verse explains that whoever rejects Paul's or the Bible's instructions rejects this being also.** *(1 Thessalonians 4:8)*
- 6. Paul says he is proud of the church of Thessalonica for this trait, which we should all try to have. It means to not give up.** *(2 Thessalonians 1:4)*
- 7. Paul prays that the Lord will direct our hearts into this trait of God's, along with Christ's perseverance.**
(2 Thessalonians 3:5)
- 8. Paul prays that the church will have this virtue at all times and in every way.** *(2 Thessalonians 3:16)*

1 & 2 TIMOTHY

Both letters were addressed to Paul's young disciple Timothy and were written by Apostle Paul. Timothy may have been experiencing some burnout, as many pastors do at times. That inspired the first letter as an encouragement.

The very serious tone of the second letter inspires us to believe it was near the end of Paul's life. Paul knew that his work was nearly done. He was arrested by the Roman Emperor Nero during the time when Nero was persecuting Christians in violent ways. Nero eventually had Paul decapitated.

The letters were written about three years apart, in the early- to mid-60s AD.

- 1. A mediator is a person who sits among two or more people and makes sure they understand each other. Paul tells Timothy that our mediator with God is this person.**
(1 Timothy 2:5)
- 2. Apostle Paul explains that some will abandon the faith because of these forces.** *(1 Timothy 4:1)*
- 3. Paul says not to let anyone look down on you because you are this.** *(1 Timothy 4:12)*
- 4. Paul describes himself as the worst of this type of person because he wanted to help kill Christians before his conversion.** *(1 Timothy 1:15)*
- 5. Some people say that money is evil. Apostle Paul doesn't say that. He says that, rather, this is evil.** *(1 Timothy 6:10)*
- 6. Nearing his death sentence, Paul shows his love for Timothy when he calls him his...** *(2 Timothy 1:2)*
- 7. Paul encourages the church members to correct and rebuke each other with this type of learning.** *(2 Timothy 4:2)*
- 8. Paul states that the Spirit should not make us timid but give us this spiritual gift.** *(2 Timothy 1:7)*

TITUS

Titus was a young pastor put in charge of the churches at Crete, which is a large island found in the Great Sea, known today as the Mediterranean. Paul wrote to encourage Titus, and he addressed some of the same leadership challenges he addressed with Timothy, his young disciple.

The book is only three chapters long and was written around 63 AD.

1. **We have been saved, not because of the things we have done, but because of this.** (*Titus 3:5*)
2. **This verse assures us that God keeps his promises and does not commit this sin.** (*Titus 1:2*)
3. **Apostle Paul explains to Titus that we will be able to refute false doctrine if we hold firmly to this.** (*Titus 1:9*)
4. **The apostle says that an elder must be this.** (*Titus 1:6*)
5. **Divisive people are those who start quarrels. We should warn divisive people this many times before we distance ourselves from them.** (*Titus 3:10*)
6. **God promises that to the people who are pure, all things will be this.** (*Titus 1:15*)
7. **The Apostle Paul tells us to avoid this behavior, which is toxic in our lives.** (*Titus 3:9*)
8. **This famous verse teaches us to say “No” to ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live lives that are Godly, upright, and this.** (*Titus 2:12*)

PHILEMON

The book was written so that a slave would be accepted as a beloved brother among Christians, and Paul wanted to encourage Christians to not think in snobbish terms. Paul's message is that even though slavery was an accepted part of Roman society, we should treat each other as equals, like he encouraged Philemon to treat his slave as a brother.

The book is just one chapter long and was written between 60 and 62 AD, when Apostle Paul was under house arrest in Rome.

1. **This verse shows where believers met before there were churches. (*Philemon 1:2*)**
2. **Apostle Paul uses a term in this passage, which means having God's love and forgiveness. (*Philemon 1:3*)**
3. **Mature Christians remember to do this, and so should we. (*Philemon 1:4*)**
4. **This verse mentions one good way to gain greater understanding. (*Philemon 1:6*)**
5. **Paul speaks of a Christian man whom he describes as this. (*Philemon 1:12*)**
6. **Paul speaks of this great principle about people's behavior—that good deeds are more precious when they are not given in this way. (*Philemon 1:14*)**
7. **This verse states that even slaves, if they are Christians, should be seen this way. (*Philemon 1:15-16*)**

HEBREWS

Hebrews is the only book in the New Testament where scholars are unsure of its author, though some feel it was written by Apostle Paul. The book was written around the time when the evil leader Nero was persecuting Christians and putting many to death. Nero reigned between 37 and 68 AD, and the book dates itself to that period. Thus it still serves as a great letter of hope and help for people who are under a great deal of pressure.

1. **Faith is defined as the confidence in what we hope for and the assurance of this.** (*Hebrews 11:1*)

JAMES

The name James, like the names John and Mary, were very common during Biblical times. There were two disciples of Jesus named James. However, this book is not traced back to either. It is from the half-brother of Jesus, born to his mother Mary, but with Joseph as the biological father. James did not believe Jesus was the Messiah until after the resurrection. But his book shows how much he changed. The Book of James is sometimes referred to as “the Proverbs of the New Testament,” full of wisdom and nuggets quoted by hundreds daily.

James dates early for New Testament books, around 44 to 49 AD.

1 & 2 PETER

Peter wrote the first letter during Nero's reign. Nero was the Roman emperor starting shortly after Jesus died until the 60s AD. He eventually did horrible things like throw Christians to lions. Apostle Peter was addressing both Jews and gentiles with encouragement to stay the course with Jesus, no matter what happened. The book is considered a great source to read when you are being picked on, bullied, or persecuted for your faith.

Second Peter was written to address false doctrine. Peter told the people to become mature and not be driven apart by people who teach false things.

The books were written about three years apart, perhaps 60 and 63 AD.

1, 2 & 3 JOHN

John wrote later than the other Apostles, in the 90s AD. He focused on misinterpretations of the gospel that were causing problems. First John was written to combat false teachings called "Gnosticism." Gnostics taught that Jesus was a spirit and never really had a body, and other errors.

In 2 John, he is addressing the same issue but not in as much detail. In 3 John, the Apostle criticized a false teacher, Diotrephes. He accused the man of having a big ego and being a troublemaker.

JUDE

Jude was the half-brother of Jesus. Like his brother James who contributed to the Bible, Jude did not believe Jesus was the Messiah until after the resurrection. The Book of Jude was written around 75 AD to address false teaching, which was already getting out of hand. We can take from Jude's letter to not believe strange, new doctrines. We need to stick with what was tried and true since the beginning. Like 2 & 3 John, Jude is only one chapter long!

1. Jude says to keep ourselves in this thing as we wait for Christ's mercy. (*Jude 1:21*)
2. Jude's brother wrote a book named after him that is a New Testament epistle. His name was this. (*Jude 1:1*)

REVELATION

Revelation was written by the Apostle John, who was very old by that point—around 95 AD. In fact, he was the only disciple who hadn't yet died. He was in prison for preaching the gospel, on an island called Patmos, which is like an ugly giant rock the middle of the Adriatic Sea. While there, he experienced the visions that are contained on the Revelation. They concern the end times and all the good and bad things that will happen.

The book is dated around 95 AD. Many people read the book today, watching the news and comparing it to things that the Revelation states will occur.

1. **Revelation contains a very famous invitation from Christ. It states that he will sit down and eat with anyone who does this.** (*Revelation 3:20*)
2. **The letter to church of Laodicea describes rich Christians who think they are very cool. Jesus says they are actually this.** (*Revelation 3:16-17*)
3. **There are seven judgments that will fall on planet earth in the end times. They are symbolized by this.** (*Revelation 6:1*)
4. **John sees up in heaven all the people who have been saved. They were wearing these famous garments.** (*Revelation 7:9*)
5. **John sees Satan hurled down to earth, appearing in the form of this mythological creature.** (*Revelation 12:9*)
6. **The apostle John describes the new heaven and new earth we will see at the end of time. Strangely enough, it says there will no longer be any of these.** (*Revelation 21:1*)
7. **At the end of time, God will finally do this so we can enjoy eternity with him.** (*Revelation 21:4*)
8. **This will be so bright in heaven with this, that there will be no need for a sun.** (*Revelation 22:5*)
