You should realize that successful participation in this course requires a substantial commitment of time and energy. Your ultimate success will depend upon your understanding of design investigations as an on-going process aimed at discovering the significance of formal order as it applies to your theme. I expect all of you to go beyond merely completing an assignment to produce thoughtful engaging work. I expect that you will revise, experiment, and develop your work. The intention behind all the course activities is to direct you to the development of mastery and a passing score on the AP Art Exam.

A tab on www.cudaart.com has been provided specifically for AP Art students. It is the best guide to everything you need to know with answers to most questions. You will develop a substantial body of work as you explore each of the sections of the AP portfolio; 15 Sustained Investigation pieces, 5 Selected Works and a Written Statement, as well as art for our personal gallery shows. You will be creating approximately 1 work per week. There will be less structure in the studio sessions as the year progresses. This will allow for in-depth concentration on your own work. You are expected to use the time to your advantage.

Student Expectations:

- → A late submitted assignment without prior approval will result in one grade lower.
- Store Bookbags on the back counter.
- Clean your workspace before and after class. Clean-up is 10 min. before class is over. Stay seated until the bell rings.
- ★Upon entering each class, open your studio book and start working on the warm-up.
- Bring your Studio Book, Mug and Apron to every class.

<u>Tuesday Groups</u> AP Students will meet in small group settings either Tuesday of each week to discuss their progress.

<u>Studiobook</u> Two (2) minimum planning pages are to be completed in your studiobook using traditional art materials for planning of every SI and SW. *Digital work is not accepted.* Students must address the four critique questions throughout the pages in written form. All files are posted on the art class website.

- Students may use last year's studiobook or purchase A NEW hardbound studio book size 8" x 10"

Opportunities are always available to show your art. It is mandatory for Seniors to enter the Scholastics competition, and the YoungArts Competition. A list of optional District wide shows/contests to enter is posted in the classroom.
