Saint Benedict's Road Map

Well, he wouldn't have called it a road map, but now nearly every plan is a road map!

St Benedict lived from 479 or 480 to 547. He moved to Rome but left the wild life of the city and became a hermit. People were led by his example and a community formed around him. So, how do you run a religious community? St Benedict worked it out, and the Rule of Saint Benedict is still valid today - it's a well-balanced guide to community life.

One strand of thought that Saint Benedict developed was on complaining or grumbling: it can have a corrosive effect, destroying community life. Imagine it in you family, your neighbourhood, your place of work: now transfer it to a closed community with the same small body of people and it's even worse.

At a Mass last month Pope Francis said it was "Pointless, even tedious for Christians to waste their time complaining about the world, about society, about everything that is not right". He reminded us that even in the midst of terrible persecution the early Christians "did not cast blame - they prayed".

He said recently "We are used to insulting people, especially those with responsibility. The first Christians did not complain about Peter, they prayed for him. They did not talk about him behind his back, they talked to God."

On the door of Pope Francis' private room there's a sign in red lettering: "No Complaining!" (but it's not in English).
