Bishop Edward B. Scharfenberger announced a major event for the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany: the Hearts Aflame Eucharistic Congress which was held on Saturday, September 22, 2018 at the Shrine of the North American Martyrs in Auriesville. In our Catholic tradition, a "Eucharistic Congress" is a special gathering led by the bishop and focused on our Lord Jesus in the Eucharist. It is a time of joy, fellowship, prayer, and unity. The day offered Mass with the bishop, inspirational speakers, Eucharistic adoration and procession, activities for children and youth, and tours of the shrine.

I had the honor of being Immaculate Conception's point of contact for the Eucharist Congress. As the event neared, feelings of anticipation and a bit of apprehension started to rise within me. These feelings changed to awe and respect as I passed the three crosses and

entered the grounds of the Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs. The Shrine honors four saints--the Jesuit martyrs St. René de Goupil, St. Isaac Jogues and St. Jean de Lalande who laid down their lives sharing the Gospel with the Mohawk Indians, and "The Lily of the Mohawks" --Saint Kateri Tekakwitha--an Indian Maiden who was converted to the Catholic Church by these

priests in the 1600's.

Continuing to walk the grounds,

I could hear and feel the atmosphere of the crowd filled

with hope, prayer, and gratefulness. We were all here looking for something, perhaps forgiveness or reconciliation, spirituality, peace or individual answers. I passed statues by the streams and on the hillside. This is truly a place where time stands still and history comes alive.

Entering the Coliseum was spellbinding; so much history and symbolism was represented with every step I took. I could not do justice in capturing it all. Built in 1930, this is an amphitheater, with each door representing the 72 disciples and main aisles representing the 12 apostles. Crosses on the columns are likened to trees on which Isaac Jogues carved his crosses, and over the eight double doors are sculpted images of the eight North American Martyrs. At the center of the Colise-

um are four wooden altars, each dedicated to one of the Jesuit martyrs and

Kateri Tekakwitha. A 72-foot altar rail surrounds the sanctuary inside of which is a reliquary which

contains bone fragments of the three martyrs. Also, there is a statue of Mary which originally stood in a shrine in Rouen, France, where Jesuit martyrs completed their novitiate.

As Mass began, more than four thousand joined in harmony to sing the introductory hymn "Here I Am Lord." This was remarkable; I felt an energy, an exhilaration I had never felt before. I felt the lyrics are about being called by God and trusting him to walk with you through everything.

Focusing on renewing our faith, being watchful of our temptations, and not confusing our faith with the organization, Reverend Patrick Winslow and Bishop Scharfenberger reminded or re-affirmed for me who Christ is and why our faith is important. We should be disciples and spread the news one person at a time.

As I sat there meditating, I envisioned Jesus as a model of someone who does not accept the status quo, who speaks for the oppressed and the marginalized. Jesus leads me into a greater hope, that maybe we can get past the violence, injustice and feelings of disappointment as we seek God's realm in the world. I may feel defeated but Jesus reminds us that through his trust, our faith will be restored. Without faith, no matter what the situation might be, we can't expect things to turn out all right for us.



In celebrating the Eucharist, a communal of more than four thousand people gathering together in a place filled with historic background and sacrifice, I was moved in a way to unburden my past offenses so that I could rejoice in the company of others and share the sign of peace with strangers who seemed like long lost friends. I listened to the readings as they were proclaimed to us as a community and followed with a public proclamation of our communal faith.

Taking in the magnificent and spectacular view and visualizing the human drama of the martyrs, imagining the time period, the distrust, sacrifice, the love, hope, and honor of all who lived on these grounds, I wondered if I would be as brave as these martyrs were. That being said, what I learned growing up in a devout household is a message well worth expressing to the world: care for the poor and sick, have tolerance, peace and love.

The Shrine of the North American Martyrs is a tranquil location filled with history and a view that brings harmony to your spirit. It was the perfect location to gather in a Eucharistic Congress and focus with others on Jesus in the Eucharist. Besides this large spiritual gathering, it is also a place for individuals and families. If you haven't taken your family this is a must see on your bucket list, and if you have seen it you need to re-visit.

It is a physical and spiritual treasure in our own back yard.







## Spotlight on Kim Klementowski by Annette Botsford

When Kim was asked to be interviewed for this issue of the Pipeline, she came up with a list of other people who she felt were worthier and much more interesting. So, after some convincing, Kim reluctantly agreed. It is amazing how involved she is with so many aspects of parish life.

Growing up in Saratoga Springs, Kim graduated from Saratoga High School. There, she played every sport they had: basketball, volleyball, track, field hockey and softball. Basketball was her favorite. After high school, she went to SUNY Cobleskill (where she played volleyball) and then on to SUNY Plattsburgh. She has a degree in accounting. At first, she worked for Beech-Nut Nutrition Corporation in Canajoharie and continued working in private industry for 22 years. Presently, she is an accountant for the NYS Thruway in their budget division. As a kid growing up in Saratoga she loved riding her bike into town and would often end at the

Lake Avenue Armory where she played summer basket-ball.

You have probably seen Kim's name in the bulletin and in the Pipeline often. She is the Coordinator of the RCIA Ministry, is a member of the Rosary Altar Society, Ladies Auxiliary of the Knights of Columbus, Adult Faith Enrichment Team, serves on the Stewardship and Morning of Service Evaluation Committees, and is a reader and a greeter. In May, July and September, Kim joins a team from Immaculate Conception serving dinner at the City Mission. Kim graduated from the Kateri Institute for Lay Ministry. This is a diocesan program for those wanting to help their parish priests with whatever they need and is required by those preparing to be Deacons. You'll also see her with the Ladies Auxiliary working at the Friday Fish Fry during Lent, as well as serving at the parish picnic and the parish Mardi Gras celebration.

A few years ago, Father Jerry asked Kim to lead the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) Ministry at our church. At first, she wasn't convinced that she was the person for the job. But after hearing Father's homily on the prophets in the desert and how things God wanted them to do were things they'd run away from, she felt she had received a sign from God that she should give this a try. Now, four years later, she feels she gets so much more from the candidates than she gives. "It is a pleasure to walk with them on their journey," Kim said. In the first 3 years, 15 adults completed the process. The process has just started up for this year with new candidates. Kim credits the success of the RCIA process to the many devoted team members who spend hours preparing talks for the candidates and who are very open to sharing their faith.

Kim has been a parishioner of the Church of the Immaculate Conception for about 12 years. She joined just before Father Jerry became pastor here. She considers Father to be a great mentor, teacher and friend.

When she is not at work or busy with church activities, Kim is a Booth Coordinator for the Make a Wish Foundation. She has coached the girls' travel basketball team in Scotia as well as various girls' softball and soccer teams. She has always wanted to make a difference in a child's life. She feels that the youth in our parish are wonderful and that gives her great hope for the future.

Through the Spring Enrichment Program, she has her Adult and Youth Ministry certifications. Last year she joined Cursillo and was on the team this year for the special weekend. She attends the meetings here at Immaculate Conception.

# Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs in Auriesville

Some Interesting Facts—

The statue of Christ on the cross above the altars is 9 feet tall and was carved in wood by Troy sculptor Frank Feigeler. The cross is made of hemlock from a tree in the Ravine.

In the 1640's, Father Isaac Jogues, and his two lay companions, Rene Goupil and John Lalande, were killed by the Mohawks. During the same decade, five Jesuit priests were martyred in Canada. In 1930, these were canonized as the eight North American martyrs.

Kateri was born in Ossernenon a decade after the killing of Fr. Jogues. She was scarred and almost blind because of smallpox. After her baptism, she was devoted to the Eucharist. She died at 24, whispering the names of Jesus and Mary. When she died, her smallpox scars miraculously disappeared. She was canonized on October 21, 2012 by Pope Benedict XVI.



The Shrine season begins the first weekend in May and extends to the middle of October.

The amphitheater has a diameter of 257 feet. If you walked around it 6 times, you would walk almost a mile.

The amphitheater seats 6500 people and can accommodate 10,000 pilgrims.

Auriesville was originally the Mohawk village of Ossernenon.
