PASTOR'S CORNER Careful planning puts you ahead in the long run; hurry and scurry puts you further behind. Proverbs 21:5 (The Message)

I sit down to write this article on March 25<sup>th</sup>, the day each year when fans of the work of JRR Tolkien read from his works and encourage others to do the same. (Think "Dr. Seuss Week," but with dragons!) As I read some select passages, I ran across this thought by one character in the story, roused to action by the evil encroaching upon his people: "We must not be hasty […] for it is easier to shout *stop!* than to do it."

The author of the proverb found at the head of this article would agree with the character in *The Lord of the Rings*: haste can lead us astray, but intentionality and sober planning can lead us where we need to go. Jesus himself told would-be disciples,

"Suppose one of you wants to build a tower. Won't you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it? For if you lay the foundation and are not able to finish it, everyone who sees it will ridicule you, saying, 'This person began to build and wasn't able to finish.'

"Or suppose a king is about to go to war against another king. Won't he first sit down and consider whether he is able with ten thousand men to oppose the one coming against him with twenty thousand? If he is not able, he will send a delegation while the other is still a long way off and will ask for terms of peace. In the same way, those of you who do not give up everything you have cannot be my disciples." (Luke 14:28-33 NIV)

Now, this may seem self-evident – we understand the value of planning in life. And it may also seem off-topic in this month where we observe Good Friday and celebrate Easter. Yet I think the Easter season, particularly *this* Easter season, is the vital time to think seriously about how we follow Jesus, both as individual disciples and as a community of faith.

For a year, life has been disrupted; that is true for our church, as well. Now, with rising rates of vaccination and lower numbers of serious COVID cases, we are excited about resuming many of the activities we deeply miss. I know I certainly am, and I've heard many in our congregation express those sentiments too.

Yet I believe we must heed the words of the wisdom writer of Proverbs and our Lord Jesus: take thought for what we do as we head into this summer of reopening and return. What are the safest ways to reengage with such vital things as Sunday school, congregational fellowship, and mission? How can we ease back in a way that takes, not just the desires of those who are vaccinated, but also those who have not been able to be vaccinated yet, into account? Furthermore, is there anything we need to reevaluate as a church? Are there any programs or ministries that need to look different on this side of COVID than they did before? Is God calling us into any new fields of harvest? And are we, collectively and as individuals, ready to recommit ourselves to the work of the kingdom in ways that we may have set aside for these past many months?

This is the Easter season, where we celebrate the God who brings new life in Christ, who changed the world and moved in new ways after the catastrophe of the cross and the joy of the empty tomb. In this season, may we move not with thoughtless haste, but with careful thought and compassionate hearts, eager to follow our Lord into a bright and hopeful future of both renewal and opportunity.



There is so much to say about Joe Foxwell! In 1927 he was born in Deltaville, close to the water. He served his country in the United States Navy for three years, during World War II. He worked at the shipyard for a while, and later joined the Virginia State Police in 1951, seeming to find his life's work there. For a time, he worked on the drug investigation team, and then as Assistant Special Agent in Charge. Joe loved his work.

He was especially proud, says Lois, of his time as an investigator of missing persons cases, especially the "cold case" of a child who had been missing for five years. Joe solved the disappearance and brought closure to the grieving parents. He retired from the State Police Bureau of Criminal Investigation in 1984, after 33 years of service.

Whatever Joe was doing, he gave it his all. We have seen him working in his yard or running on the treadmill at the gym, even at age 92, and we have wished for his stamina and endurance. His friends testified to his incredible cooking, especially his stew (for which he was known as the "Stew Master"), to his love of hunting, fishing, and golfing. Two of them said they wanted "to grow up to be like him." He was a friend you could count on.

Many of those who knew him well agreed that he was a great guy; there will never be another Joe Foxwell", they said. He called Appomattox "The Garden Spot of the World", and was very happy living here. He and Lois were charter members of Grace Hills. He was a regular in Sunday school and in worship, and was happy to grill burgers, plan a stew, or serve pork chops to the Wednesday supper crowd—anything to serve his church family. Thank you, Joe; you are certainly missed.




Grace Hills ELC friends have been enjoying the beautiful weather, playing outside and taking nature walks discussing God's creations.
