


















Row by Row Remembered

Have you ever visited a quilt shop in July? How about August? Summertime must be the slowest,

loneliest, saddest season of the year. As a former quilt shop owner, I've experienced the frequent days when no one comes through the door. My fellow quilties are either gardening or off on vacation. All the Spring classes have wrapped up, and the calendar is empty until Fall.

At this mid-summer point, I'm craving a bit of chitchat. Anything. The lousy weather forecast, why you weren't out weeding your rose garden, the anticipated visit with your grands. I wouldn't care whether you made a purchase, or not. I'd be so grateful you cared enough to pass some time with me.

What happens to the creative passion of guilting, come the end of June, or in some cases, even April? Where does that simple, satisfying, and seductive relationship with one's stash go? Perhaps this quandary was on Janet Lutz' mind when, in 2011, she launched the first Row by Row

Experience. What began in twenty shops across New York State is today hosted by thousands of shops in the United States, Canada, and Europe. Now in its eighth season, this elevenweek summer event is pure fun. For shop owners, it's also a lot of hard work.

Behind the scenes, to the quilting industry with great fanfare, the theme for the next summer's Row by Row Experience is announced. In the past, amongst others, there's been

H20 (2015), Home Sweet Home (2016), and On the Go (2017). For 2018, Sew Musical is the theme. Can't wait to see the lineup of inspiring rows that will begin to populate the Row by Row Experience website!

Having registered our shop to take part, my daughter Sara and I put on our caps, and thought, and sketched, and rethought, and muddled until our Row, unique to our shop, reached its final version. Then on to making it come alive through beautiful fabric, embellishments, and quilting. I particularly loved our 2015 row, a minimalist Niagara Falls captured in Northcott's Shimmer collection, complete with twinkling lights, reminiscent of the Falls at night.

Developing the pattern into a printable document is not for the faint of heart. But this is part of those hidden jobs for the shop. All who ask will receive a pattern for the Row, no purchase necessary. Then, there's the cutting and assembling of kits, ordering the complimentary bolts of fabric and bagging the add-on doodads. Putting up the map. Planning opening day's treats. Each shop owner will give the event their distinctive touch.

And before we've barely caught our breath, launch day would be upon us, and the magic would begin.

Gone were the slow and lonely days. From all over, they'd come. By two's and by carloads. With girlfriends, and with family. Day-tripping. Roadtripping. On-vacation-tripping. And each one excited to share some part of their RxR experience. The distance they'd driven. How many shops they'd



"Easy" Eating

"Summertime, and the livin' is easy," composer George Gershwin observed some 80 years ago. Fast-forward to summertime 2018, pull some shrimp out of the freezer and use shrimp-themed recipes to confirm that summertime

eatin' can be easy, too. Shrimp in their fresh or frozen forms are readily available year-round, but they seem like warm-weather food when they're not breaded and deep-fried.

Utilizing pre-cooked cocktail shrimp, Marinated Shrimp is an easy dish to assemble. Offer it as an appetizer at your next backyard gathering, or discard the lemon slices and serve the shrimp, onions, peppers, capers and dressing over a bed of garden-fresh greens. Add some sliced avocado and a sprinkling of feta cheese, and salad never tasted so good!

Shrimp Creole is not quite as easy to make, but it is exceptionally "easy" to eat. Packed with shrimp and seasonal vegetables, this classic dish is delicious as well as elegant. If needed, the base may be cooked a day or two in advance and then stored in the refrigerator. It also freezes well. For serving, simply heat the base to boiling and add raw shrimp as detailed in the recipe. What could be easier on your summer schedule than a fabulous make-ahead dish?

Marinated Shrimp

2 pounds frozen jumbo shrimp

(pre-cooked, peeled and de-veined with tails intact)

1 white onion, peeled and thinly sliced

2 medium lemons, thinly sliced

½ cup sliced, drained "pepperoncini" deli-style peppers

4 cup drained capers

1 cup Italian dressing

1 tablespoon prepared horseradish

½ teaspoon celery seed

Thaw shrimp in refrigerator according to package instructions. (This may take overnight.) Pat shrimp dry. Place single layer of shrimp in bottom of 9- by 13-inch dish. Cover with half of onions, lemon slices, peppers and capers. Repeat layer. In separate bowl, whisk together dressing, horseradish and celery seed. Pour dressing over shrimp. Refrigerate 8 to 10 hours, stirring once after 4 to 5 hours. Transfer to a bowl for serving, if desired. Makes 8 servings.

Shrimp Creole

2 pounds shell-on frozen raw shrimp, medium or large size

½ cup vegetable oil

½ cup flour

1 large onion, chopped

1 large bell pepper (red or green), seeded and chopped

1½ cups chopped celery

2 to 3 cloves garlic, minced

2 cups fresh, peeled, chopped tomato

1 6-ounce can tomato paste

3½ cups chicken broth

2 bay leaves

1 teaspoon Creole seasoning*

½ teaspoon dried thyme

¼ teaspoon black pepper

3 tablespoons fresh chopped parsley OR 1 tablespoon dried parsley

Several dashes of hot pepper sauce, plus more for serving


8 to 10 servings steamed rice

Thaw shrimp according to package instructions. Peel, de-vein and remove tails. Refrigerate while preparing base. To make base, heat oil in heavy soup pot or Dutch oven. Add flour. Reduce heat to medium low. Cook and stir for approximately 15 minutes, or until mixture is a rich caramel color. Adjust heat as needed to keep mixture from browning too slowly or too quickly. Add onion, bell pepper and celery. Simmer 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add garlic and continue cooking and stirring an additional 5 minutes. Add chopped tomatoes, tomato paste, chicken broth and all seasonings except parsley and hot pepper sauce. Simmer on very low heat for 35 to 40 minutes. Just before serving, remove bay leaves and add parsley. Bring mixture to boil and add raw shrimp. Cook just until shrimp are opaque. Remove from heat and add several dashes of hot pepper sauce. Serve over steamed rice. Makes 8 to 10 generous servings.

*If Creole seasoning is not available, substitute several dashes of Worcestershire sauce.

I won't even begin to describe the stuff that blew out of the pipe he sank in his septic field.


But, Renee wasn't one to quit. He kept pounding down pipe and kept coming up empty. Pipe after pipe until finally he got one that produced







The Collectors Corner

Vintage Wedding Cake Toppers Start a Wonderful New Collection

Just the other day a friend was sharing a story about her circle of stuff. She falls in love with something and then, before she knows it, she has a collection. After a bit of time, she finds herself in love with something else and sells off her old stuff in order to get new stuff—thus, the circle of stuff. Sound familiar? It does to me!

Welcome to The Collectors Corner. Over the years I have collected many different things and, while I am not an expert at identifying or valuing, I do consider myself very experienced in the art of collecting. I love the thrill of the hunt, learning



about my new finds and talking to people who are passionate about what they collect. I'm always looking for new uses for old things and imaginative ways to incorporate my newest treasure into my everyday living.

Not that long ago I stumbled upon some vintage wedding cake toppers. At the time, I was planning a wedding shower for a dear friend who loves all things vintage. I didn't have a clue what I was going to do with the beauties but those cake toppers that had been lovingly cared for—one still in its original box—needed to come home with me and find a new purpose. If I didn't know better, I'd swear the couples in the toppers grinned as they were being purchased and carried out of the store.

Wedding cake toppers gained favor during the Victorian era. They originally consisted of flowers, bells or some object related to the bride and groom and were often made by a family member or a professional baker who used frosting, icing or non-edible materials.

In the 1920s, American high society started the trend of using bride and groom figures on the wedding cake. Two things happened in a relatively short span of time that fueled the popularity of bride and groom cake toppers. In 1922, Emily Post, an American etiquette expert wrote about wedding cakes and the placement of bride and groom figurines atop the cakes. Retailers such as Sears Roebuck & Company began selling mass produced bride and groom wedding cake toppers. They were manufactured primarily in the United States, Germany and Japan. In 1927, the Sears catalog had a full page devoted to cake toppers: grooms with and without top hats, brides with and without veils, some holding hands, some under gazebos, some surrounded by flowers, but all in the classic wedding theme.

Vintage wedding cake toppers featuring bride and groom figures continued to be dominant through the 1950s. They were (and still are) a non-perishable part of the wedding cake that is kept as a reminder of that very special day and oftentimes passed down from one generation to the next. What once was a staple of every wedding cake today is seen as a lovely connection to the generations before us. With cake toppers today being more reflective of the couple's style, the vintage bride and groom cake toppers can seem old fashioned.

Enter the vintage lover, the collector, the one who wants to find uses for these beautiful old things. With such a vast variety of styles, you can find toppers that reflect different eras. Included are the flapper days of the 1920s, 1940s war time brides with grooms often in military attire, 1950s Grace Kelly style, 1960s with bouffant hair styles reminiscent of Jackie Kennedy, even ruffled shirts and longer hair on the grooms that were both popular in the 1970s, different hair colors and skin tones, and ones celebrating 25th and 50th wedding anniversaries. Materials range from chalk ware, composition, celluloid, plastic, crepe paper and netting, bisque, some with lace and others with millinery flowers.

If you have a collector's heart, it is nearly impossible to have just one. You can find them in vintage and antique stores and, if you are lucky, thrift stores or online. Prices range from \$10 to over \$150, with the rarest ones and those made of chalk ware commanding the highest prices. Once you have a little group together, the charm, warmth and romance is undeniable. A trio displayed under glass cloche on a side table, several grouped together with vintage photos in a white cabinet, a vignette that includes a vintage cake plate and pearls on a nightstand—the ideas are endless. Let a little whimsy enter your home and surround yourself with things you love.

At the wedding shower for my friend, we used my three lovely toppers to decorate the food, dessert and gift tables along with vintage doilies, shades of aqua, ivory and brown. It was really lovely. The bride now displays one of those toppers in her home, perhaps the beginning of another

This year, you might want to change up the way you celebrate your time away at the beach. So, you may ask, "What can I do? Why not put a different twist on your vacation and have a Beach Party Tea Party. This doesn't have to be limited to children. You just might want to have the party as your vacation is winding down, or perhaps to start off your holiday in a different upbeat way. Whatever you decide, this unique play on the time spent at the shore could become a regular

tradition, or maybe just a onetime occurrence that years from now people will say, "Remember the time we had a tea party on the beach?"

If you have a beachfront cottage perhaps you will find a shady spot to host the party. Otherwise, try improvising a makeshift cabana or canopy to provide a little protection from the sun. Next, set up the table and cover it with a sheet and perhaps a beach towel overlay. A glass enclosed lantern provides light and helps to serve as a nice centerpiece. Love & Marriage



How to Add a Border to Any Quilt

Quilt size may vary slightly because many seams have been pieced together. Any side of the quilt could be slightly longer or shorter than the opposite side.

Do not cut border lengths until after the quilt top is completely pieced even if the instructions give border cutting instructions. Rely on your own measurements.

- Press quilt top carefully.
- Lay the quilt top on flat surface and measure the length of the quilt at the center from top to bottom.
- Cut two borders to the measured length.
- Fold the quilt in half matching the top of quilt to bottom of quilt to find the center of each side.
- Put a pin in the fold of each side to mark the centers. Open the quilt out on flat surface.
- Fold the borders in half, wrong sides together.
- Working with one border, match the fold of the border to the pin at the center of a quilt side. Open the border and pin at the center.
- Match each corner of the border to the corner of the quilt and pin.
- Line up raw edges between pins, evenly distributing any excess length. Add pins, as needed.
 Do not over-pin.
- Stitch the border to the quilt with 1/4" seam allowance.
 For best results, place the layer with the most excess fabric down against the feed dogs.
 If the border is the top layer, be sure to carefully align the points of any half square triange 1/4" from the border edge so you do not stitch over them.
 Stitch slowly, stopping frequently to carefully align the raw edges as you go.
- Press seam allowance toward the borders.









- Follow the same steps to add the top and bottom border.
- Measure across the center including the side borders to determine length to cut the borders.










• Add any additional borders in the same way.

How to calculate border fabric requirement:

- 1. Determine perimeter of the quilt top (Length + width x 2).
- 2. Divide the perimeter by 40.
- 3. Add 1 to that answer and then multiply that total by the width of the border strips.
- 4. Divide that product by 36 and round up at least one eighth yard to determine amount of yardage to purchase.
