# Father's Day Facts

One event that inspired the idea of Father's Day was the start of the Mother's Day tradition at the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Another was a memorial service held in 1908 for a large group of men, many of them fathers, who were killed in a mining accident in Monongah, West Virginia in December 1907.

A woman named Sonora Smart Dodd was influential in the establishment of Father's Day. Her father raised six children by himself after the death of their mother. This was uncommon at that time, as many widowers placed their children in the care of others or quickly married again. Sonora was inspired by the work of Anna Jarvis, who had pushed for Mother's Day celebrations. Sonora felt that her father deserved recognition for what he had done.

Father's Day was held in June for the first time in 1910. It was officially recognized as a holiday in 1972 by President Nixon.

For a row robin each person does the first row of their quilt. Then all the rows are rotated in the group until each person has done a row on each quilt. The border robin has the same concept but each person does their center block and each person adds a border around it.



# Quilting Quiz

- 1. When you haven't got the quite exact match for your thread, do you choose the darker or light thread?
- 2. What size stitch should you use when paper piecing?
- 3. Should you cut batting your cutting board?
- 4. If you refuse to mark your quilt but you do need some guidelines for your gridding. How do you achieve this?
- 5. When sewing needleturn applique, do you match the background fabric or the fabric piece that is being appliques?

# How Many Fat Quarters?

This diagram represents a crib sized quilt. It uses a crib size batting (see my Quilt Batting Size Chart) for exact dimensions. I've allowed 2 inches of overage all around so my quilt top will be slightly smaller than my batting.



	absolute minimum	conservative
King	42	56
Super Queen	35	40
Queen	30	35
Double	30	30
Twin	24	24
Throw	12	12
Crib	8	12
Craft	6	6

- You're probably going to want to cut up your fat quarters into smaller pieces. Every time you cut you need a little bit more fabric to account for additional seam allowance.
- There might be fabrics you don't like or might not want to use as much of.
- If you don't have enough fat quarters for the quilt top you
  want to make, mix in some coordinating solids or neutrals.
  Half prints from a fat quarter bundle + half white is one of
  my favorite fabric combos.
- If you've got more fat quarters than you need for the quilt top you want to make, work extras into the backing or binding.

Notice that Queen and Double (Full) size need the same number of fat quarters. Places like Pottery Barn usually don't even differentiate between the two sizes.

#### Do the Math

Here's what you need to know to get started:

- What size battings are available to you. I've got a cheat sheet for that here.
- How much overage you want around the edge of your quilt top when you sandwich it with the batting and backing. I like 2 inches on each edge, 4 inches total for the width and 4 inches total for the length.
- The size of a fat quarter. I used 22 inches wide, 18 inches long, and a 1/4 inch seam allowance. You could knock that down to 20 by 16 if you want to be more conservative with selvedges.

Here's how to do the math:

- 1. Width of the batting your overage = A
- 2. Length of the batting your overage = B
- 3. A / (width of your fat quarter 2x seam allowance)
- 4. round your answer to 3 up to the next whole number and call that C
- 5. B / (length of your fat quarter 2x seam allowance)
- 6. round your answer to 5 up to the next whole number and call that D
- 7. C \* D = the total number of fat quarters you need at a minimum

Quilting Quiz answers: 1) Always choose the darker thread. It will blend in much better than the light one. 2) Always reduced the size of your machine stitch from your normal stitch to make it easier to tear the paper backing off. 3) No. When cutting batting on a cutting board you embed tiny particles that will get in the small cut in the board creating mini speed bumps that will affect you accuracy when rotary cutting. If you do use a cutting board, turn it over and use the back side to avoid damaging the lined surface on the front. 4) Use a Hera marker and ruler. Run the marker along the fabric to "bruise" the fabric slightly, just enough for you to see the line, without actually marking it. 5) Always match the fabric piece that is being appliques, not the background.
