

It will be some time before the window can be restored to its

former glory, as this is clearly no "two minute" repair job but we are in the hands of experts. It's a sad to see such beautiful workmanship smashed like this, it is sad to think that there are people out there that feel that they have to target a church.



## **Interregnum Update**

Following discussions with ourselves and the Patron of St Mary's, (Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge) the Bishop of Chester has now officially issued a document "suspending the living". The wording of this has caused a little confusion which we wish to clarify. This notice does not mean that no one will be appointed to the vacancy for a number of years, it is a formality to change the way in which that vacancy will be filled, giving greater flexibility, now and in the future. We were required to "publish" that notice, which can be found on the glass panel by the East Doors.

The Churchwardens, in liaison with the PCC, Rural Dean and Archdeacon of Macclesfield are presently preparing the "Parish Profile" (which is basically a statement describing the conditions, needs and traditions of the parish) and "Fact Sheet" (more in-depth statistical information etc.). We will be meeting with the Diocese (the Bishop of Stockport, Archdeacon of Macclesfield and others) on a regular basis to plan together the next step forward.

In the meantime we carry on as normal and thank all those members of the Clergy and Lay-Readers who have to date assisted us by conducting our Tuesday & Sunday services.

## **Easy Ice Cream**

Do you think that ice cream is a foodstuff far beyond the reach of a chef without an ice cream maker? Well, here to prove you wrong is a no-churn recipe that can be easily adapted to make your favourite flavour ice cream. The secret ingredient is condensed milk, which retards the ice crystal formation that usually makes homemade ice cream so disappointing. This recipe can be quite sweet, so consider additions that counteract the ice cream base. Some suggestions can be found below.

### Ingredients

200g sweetened condensed milk / 600ml double cream 1tsp vanilla extract

#### Method

Combine all ingredients and whisk until thick, and soft peaks form. Add your flavour of choice. Fill a tub, cover and freeze until solid.

### Raspberry Ripple

100g of raspberry purée [Swirl through the mix before freezing]

#### **Butterscotch Swirl**

100g butterscotch sauce / 20g butterscotch pieces
Swirl both sauce and pieces through the mix before freezing.

#### Chocolate Chip

3tbsp cocoa powder

Sift the cocoa powder into base mixture and combine well. Freeze.

#### **Rum and Raisin**

90g raisins / 3tbsp rum

Soak the raisins in the rum for a couple of hours. Mix into base before freezing.

## Much more than cows



Almost 30 years ago, Uganda was emerging from a long civil war. With communities – and their farmland destroyed and much of the country's livestock wiped out, a group of Christian dairy farmers flew to Africa to investigate how they could help. Outraged at EU milk quotas, which were forcing them to slaughter healthy dairy cows, and in response to an appeal from Uganda

for milk, they embarked on a project, which was set to become an innovative and practical charity.

Meeting with Ugandan farmers, the Bishop of Mukono, and a livestock expert, they saw how smallholder dairy farming in Africa could work. People there were unable to feed themselves and milk would provide an instant source of nutrition. They returned to the UK determined to help, and sent cows from their own herds to Uganda. Send a Cow was born. The charity doesn't believe in handouts, but in a helping hand giving some of the continent's poorest people the tools and the means to secure their futures from the land. Send a Cow teaches people how to grow their own food by providing a proven package of training, support, tools, seeds and livestock over a period of 3-5 years. It's a long term approach which helps people to turn their backs on poverty for good. Within a few months, malnourished families are growing enough vegetables to eat regularly and are able to pay for children to attend school. Within a year farmers are diversifying their income streams to ensure they survive the hungry months and unexpected disasters like drought.

Send a Cow doesn't just provide cows or put them on planes, but it has helped over 1.3 million of Africa's poorest people to transform their lives.
