Verify meeting your high school graduation requirements are met Keep grades up (3.0 GPA & above) & review your high school transcript Find out the transcript request process at your school Stay involved in activities (sports, clubs, community) Narrow down college majors or fields of study Research & visit colleges (programs, requirements, costs) **Update your Scholar Profile** Take both the SAT and ACT Research financial aid and scholarships Identify who can write letters of recommendations Athletes: Develop a Scholar-Athlete Profile & Your NCAA Certification Profile Send high school transcripts to NCAA Eligibility Center

- ☐ Apply to colleges and track results
- ☐ Apply for scholarships and track results
- □ Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online (send results to top 3-5 schools) Fall
- ☐ Receive acceptance letters and financial aid awards
- ☐ Decide on a college, pay deposits and housing fees

- Interests/hobbies



Research and Visit Colleges Choosing a Major or Degree Program

- ❖ Identify your interests, values, passions, and abilities.
- ❖ Get assistance from parents, counselors, and/or trusted advisors.
- Don't overspecialize (reduces career prospects if too narrow).
- Browse majors and learn more about them at: https://www.princetonreview.com/college-major-search
- Use online tools to help you research colleges:
- ❖ Make a list of potential majors.








Types of Schools and Colleges

- ❖ There's about 2,000 colleges in the U.S. to choose from
- Vocational/Trade schools:
 - Teaches a skill or trade for a specific job.
 - Electrician, Auto Mechanic, HVAC Technician, Plumber, Dental Hygienist, etc.
 - Most programs are about 2 years.
 - Obtain a license, certification or certificate.
- **★** Two-year college:
 - Community or junior college.
 - Obtain an associate's degree.
- **Four-year college:**
 - Undergraduate coursework.
 - Obtain a bachelor's degree.

Public vs Private Colleges

Public college:

- Primarily funded by a state government.
- Generally larger than private schools.
- ❖ In-state students pay in-state tuition.
- Out-of-state students living out of state likely pay more tuition.



Private college:

- Often operates as an educational, non-profit organization.
- Does not receive primary funding from a state government.
- One tuition rate (whether in-state or out-of-state).
- Usually more costly than public schools.


Choosing the Right College

- Find a college that fits your personality, background, interest and goals.
- Consider affordability (the cost of attendance & how much you can pay).
- Rank the college factors that are important to you:
 - Courses and degree programs.
 - Location of school from home (especially after COVID-19).
 - Campus size.
 - * Ratio of students to teachers.
 - Traditional, distance learning, or blended.
- Use an online search tool to help you research colleges
 - www.bigfuture.collegeboard.org
 - www.commonapp.org
- Research colleges and compile a list of college admission requirements & costs. (Recommend top 5-10 colleges)
- Visit campuses (in-person and virtual tours)



The College Application Process

Apply to CollegeCollege Application Package



- Ways to apply:
 - Electronically (create an account through a web portal)
 - By mail
- College application fee varies for each college (\$35 \$100)

Apply to CollegesThe Common Application (App)

www.commonapp.org

- ❖ Students can submit one college applications to about <u>900</u> colleges.
- Create an account/profile and then search colleges.
- * Research and *apply* to multiple colleges through one website portal.
- ❖ New application opens on August 1st of each year.
- Reused when applying for multiple colleges on the site.
- Applicants can use the Common App for free.
- **t** Each college may have an application fee (varying amounts).
- Has essay prompts that can be reused.



Apply to Colleges

The Coalition for Access, Affordability, and Success (CAAS)

https://www.coalitionforcollegeaccess.org

- ❖ Works like the Common App.
- ❖ Almost <u>200</u> member colleges.



- Member colleges must meet criteria like affordable tuition, needbased aid, and a six-year graduation rate of 70% or higher.
- Create an account/profile and then search colleges.
- Research and <u>apply</u> to multiple colleges through one website portal.
- Has essay prompts as well.

Apply to College The Common Black College Application (App)

www.commonblackcollegeapp.com

- ❖ Students can submit one college applications to about 55 HBCUs.
- Create an account and apply to multiple colleges for about \$20.
- Select your top HBCUs to apply.
- Upload your test scores.
- Research and apply to multiple colleges through one website.
- Reused when applying for multiple colleges on the site.

Apply to CollegeOfficial Transcripts

- ❖ Formal copies of a student's official high school academic grades have grades from freshman to junior year,
- ❖ Know the process to request transcripts and follow it precisely.
- ❖ Parental permission may be required at your high school prior to requesting transcripts.
- ❖ Request to have official high school transcripts for all of the colleges you applied to.
- ❖ Most high schools will either mail or email your official transcripts to colleges.
- ❖ Double check with the colleges to verify receipt by the deadline, and follow-up with your high school.



Apply to College Essay Writing Guidance

- Draft essays early and prepare to revise multiple times.
- ❖ Find trusted individuals to proofread and critique your writing (teacher?).
- Use free online proofreading resources (i.e. Grammarly).
- Follow directions (type, word count).
- Adhere to submission deadlines.
- Address the specific essay topic or question.
- Write on various topics and save them all.
- Demonstrate knowledge of college/entity (facts/statistics).
- Share how you will make a difference.
- ❖ Save and re-use content for multiple applications.



Apply to College Letters of Recommendation

- Make a list of recommenders that you trust and who will provide a positive reference but keep an ongoing list.
- Provide recommenders with submission instructions.
 - Mail (provide stamped envelope)
 - Send electronically
 - Both
- Set recommenders deadlines 1-2 weeks before your deadline.
- Follow-up to make sure letters are received by the deadline.
- Offer a pre-drafted letter of recommendation for them to tailor.
- Save and re-use content for multiple applications.
- Provide a Scholar Profile with your recommendation request.

LETTERS RECOMMENDATION

Apply to College SAT/ACT Tests



- ❖ Measures what students are learning in school and what they need to know to be successful in college.
- ❖ More colleges are making these test optional...
 - Essay, academics will be weighted heavier
 - May be needed for merit-based scholarships
- ACT has a Science Test, and one SAT Math Section no calculator.
- Send your SAT/ACT scores to your top 5 schools

Take Both Tests...Early SAT/ACT Prep

- Plan to take the tests more than once
- Complete a SAT/ACT Prep-course (recommended)
- Re-take the SAT/ACT (immediately after prep-course)
- Download mobile apps...and practice
- Retake the test (67% improve their scores)


Paying for College The Funding Process

Navigate the Funding Process

- Consider the cost of college in your college decision.
- **❖** Go where you can afford!!!!!!!!
- Typical college expenses
 - Tuition
 - Room and board
 - Books and Supplies
 - Personal expenses



Navigate the Funding ProcessWays to Pay for College



- Out of pocket expenses
 - College savings plan
 - * Retirement plan (not recommended)
- Financial Aid
- Gift Aid (Scholarships & Grants)

Financial Aid

- Financial aid = Money to help pay for college
- General types of Financial Aid
 - Student Loans money the student/parent has to pay back
 - Work study student works while in college
 - Scholarships free/gift aid
 - Grants free/gift aid




Applying for Financial Aid Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

https://studentaid.ed.gov/

- ❖ The U.S. Department of Education requires students to complete the FAFSA.
- ❖ Colleges will determine your financial aid eligibility
- **❖ FREE** no cost to apply
- Released on October 1st each year prior to the student's college academic year.
- Seniors Apply as soon as possible before the college's deadline.
- College students Apply <u>every year</u> the scholar will return to college the following academic year. (<u>Even if</u> you have scholarships)



Types of Scholarships



Scholarship/Grants (Gift Aid)

- Develop a plan to search for scholarships
- Target a variety of scholarships (large/small \$\$)
- Don't limit where you apply:
 - **❖** Local and national
 - Organizations/non-profits
 - Greek organizations
 - * Religious organizations
 - Employers
- Find a scholarship mentor
- Don't run from essays, get help proofreading and recycle responses
- Provide all requested documentation
- Track your scholarship progress


