Analysis

Unequally Yoked Vows is a third-person account about the emotional torment and situational scars that create dysfunction in the home of a woman that lives on Normal street. The author creatively dictates the deterioration of a family and the trauma that spews over into the lives of the children. The story creates an emotional tug of war when the victim becomes a predator and the predator is also prey.

Guided Reading Reflections

- 1. Which do you think is more of a catalyst for conjugal imprisonment; poverty, or dependency on an elevated social class, explain your answer?
- 2. A rolling stone gathers no moss is a proverb for which the Temptations sang "Papa was a rolling stone", what similarities or parallels can you create using Bessie Lee's analogy of a rolling oblong?
- 3. Dickson thought he was a good husband based on the provisions he set before Lilly and her children, write an argument for or against him.
- 4. Do you think Lilly would choose love and poverty or provisions and infidelity?
- 5. What aspects of Lilly's life can you relate to? Why?

6. What particular aspects of Bessie Lee's personal account coincides with your own life experiences?

7. How does a man's personal relationship and treatment affect a woman's relationship and treatment of her children?

8. What disadvantages could have driven Lilly to continually subject herself and her womb to further hosting of Dickson's abuse?

9. How do you feel Da'Tins name contributed to his behavior as an adult?

10. Do you think the era in which this story takes place contributed to Lilly's fidelity to a "rolling oblong"?

11. Do you think infidelity on Lilly's part could help solve some of her emotional conflicts?

12. Do you think her infidelity would cause other issues either emotionally or physically?

13. Lilly's children are a product of dysfunction. Do you think if they were placed under the state's care they would have had a better chance of breaking generational curses?

14. Explain which you believe to be true generational curses are hereditary or socially formed.

16. If love is based on a person's ability, does Dickson love Lilly, explain?

17. How does Dickson's infidelity make you view him as a person?

19. Based on the information gathered from the story what can you conclude will be Da'Tin's fate?

20. Does the author do a good job of concluding the story? Why or why not?

21. What swelling emotions did you experience while reading this story?

Guided Reading Reflections

2. Why are concepts of judging others important specific characters in the story?

3. Have you ever been in a situation where you were judged based on your past life choices? Explain how that experience shapes you today?

4. How does Normal Street compare to any street on which you have ever lived? Use specific examples and details in your comparison.

a. What does a simplistic life without modern amenities offer that a face-paced society cannot?

d. How do you think one person can find so much resolve to not live bitterly after experiencing a rough and lonely life?
