



THE FLOOR PLAN OF THE MANSION......

Have you ever wondered what the mansion looks like from an architectural viewpoint? Like many homes of this time period, a small section was first built by John Gailbraith in 1740. This was the beginning of what would become the Mansion. In 1798 an addition to the original structure was added by John Haldeman. In 1812, the final addition was completed by him, making this home of rather humble beginnings, the Mansion as we know it today. Over the years walls, porches and bow windows were added and later removed.

It is only with **your help**, that the day will come when the Haldeman Mansion has been fully restored to its former glory!
