A couple of the blurbs the author mentioned was about a 75-yearold man found deceased on a bus that was returning from Las Vegas; another was about a homeless man found when the garbage truck was depositing its contents from the day's rounds. time kept them from being pursued. They wrote of one time that a 20-year old former high-school football player was granted a 13-inch article. The boy's father came a few weeks later to search out this writer to give his thanks for writing about his boy. The author asked the editor one day why some interesting items only received a blurb, while others received much longer articles. The editor responded that they were not going to waste a lot of column on an individ-

ual from an area that doesn't buy papers. In a sense, they were putting a value on the heads of the victims.

I wonder how often we view people in a similar manner. We think, perhaps at a subconscious level, "they have nothing to offer me, I don't have time for them". Worse, we think "they are too far gone for me to share the gospel with for they will not respond favorably, I will put my time into sharing the gospel with someone that is likely to respond". In so doing we forget that the Apostle Paul was known for persecuting (and worse) Christians before his conversion. We forget the way our life was headed before Christ rescued us.

Fortunately, God does not treat us that way. God does not see us a Jew or Gentile (Romans 2, Job 34:16-20), God does not love us more or less based on our wealth, or our position in the community. While our nature to judge people based on looks, wealth, position is normal for our old nature, it does not please God (James 2:1-ff).

How about it? how often do we judge people based on superficial things like looks, color, money, life style, position, or other things that have no eternal value? Most said that the apostle Paul could never become a Christian based on his pre-conversion life of hating and persecuting Christians; yet he wrote half of the New Testament. We need to show respect to everyone, even the ones we disagree with, so that we might win them with our gentleness and love. Is there someone, or group of people that you need to treat more fairly?

What you need:

• Seed pods, nuts, pine cones

Mixing bowl

- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup salt
- 1 cup warm water
- Adult help

What you do:

- 1. Go on a nature walk and collect seeds with interesting textures.
- 2. In the bowl, mix flour and salt. Gradually add water. On a table, knead the dough. (If too dry, add more water; if too sticky, add more flour.)
- 3. Flatten a ball of dough and stamp impressions in it with the seeds.
- 4. If desired, bake for several hours at 150 degrees until dry and hard. Or, to reuse dough, store in an airtight container up to 6 months.

are going to vote for Candidate C because you want to signal that you hope your party will select better candidates in the future. Or you may reason that even though you agree with Candidate B on more issues, that candidate's style or character makes those positions less palatable and actually hurts the goals and policies you care about most. Instead of viewing the election as a matter of immediate national life or death, you think it best to play the long game and vote accordingly. (Pat – I also would add here – But consider the current Supreme Court and other Federal Courts – what kind of judges do you want? One major party is more apt to nominate Judges who actually interpret our Constitution and do not add modern spin to every decision).

I'm not telling you how to look at your vote. Maybe one of these approaches makes more sense in our given context than another. But then we should be clear that we are arguing about a philosophy of voting—something not nailed down in Scripture—rather than about issues of first-order importance. I don't think all of the approaches above are equally compelling, but I do think they are all reasonable ways to approach the act of voting." – Keven DeYoung, Pastor and Theologian, Charlotte, NC.

So please vote and vote your Christian conscience, taking into account what is best for Biblical morality, and for the freedom of Christ's church to live out and preach the gospel. Above all, our hope is always in Jesus Christ, not politics. God is in control,

Pat Answers

Who Should we Vote for in November?

Every presidential election I usually try to answer this question without formally endorsing any political candidate directly by name (because I am not supposed to do this as a pastor publicly). As believers we are called to pray first - "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly, and dignified in every way." – 1 Timothy 2:1.2. The goal is for government to let us alone to be the Church and present, as well as live out, the gospel. As Americans, we do have the right to vote and all Christians should vote as good citizens. So how do we vote in a sinful and imperfect world with imperfect candidates? Here are some thoughts by Keven DeYoung (with a few of mine thrown in):

"Presidential Election

Christians disagree about all sorts of things related to the election. I don't want to talk about Trump vs. Biden. Instead, I want us to think about voting itself. How should Christians in America think about their vote for president? I see at least four approaches.

- 1. Vote for the best candidate of all the candidates. Pretty simple. Look on the ballot (or write someone in) and vote for the person you think best represents Christian values and will effectively carry out the responsibilities of the presidency.
- 2. Vote for the best (or least bad) candidate of the two major parties. It is almost assuredly the case that the Re-

publican or Democratic nominee will be president, so, this argument insists, we ought to vote for whichever of the two candidates is better. And what do we mean by better? That is open for debate as well. For most people "better" means some combination of policies, platform, appointments, personal integrity, and the political party you would be putting in power. You may or may not be excited about the person at the top of the ticket, but you figure you are voting for a network of policies and influencers, not just one person.

3. Vote for the best candidate—of all the candidates, or

- of the two leading parties—so long as the candidate meets a certain threshold for character and ideology. This is like 1 and 2, but instead of saying, "I will always vote for the lesser of two evils," it says, "I won't cast a vote for someone I think is actually evil." You think to yourself, I could never cast a vote for someone who advocates the killing of all puppies. He may be better than the person who supports the killing of puppies and grown dogs, but I simply can't vote for someone who doesn't pass a basic test of moral decency. (Pat the only thing I would add here is then how could I ever vote for someone who believes in killing human babies in the womb through abortion often deceptively now called women's reproductive rights? And one Major Party is fully endorsing abortion right up to the time of delivery now!!!)
- 4. Vote in a way that you believe best advances the long-term interests of your policy goals and convictions. You may reason that Candidate A is less bad than Candidate B in the short run, but you
