

The letter for this month is an invitation to attend a sermon series I will be preaching in October titled, The God You Can Know. I have been wanting to do this series because in talking with people, they find the Old Testament hard to understand. It is as if there are two different Gods in the Bible, the God of the Old Testament that gets angry and punishes the Israelites and their enemies and the God of the New Testament that is more about love and compassion. Other questions that have arisen are, why does the Bible seem to contradict itself, is the Old Testament relevant to Christians and if God is in control of everything then why do bad things still happen? It is my goal to answer these questions and others, so make plans to join us on Sundays in October.

Here is a sampler of what I will be talking about. Science vs. the Bible. Many people think that because they believe in science then the Bible must not be accurate or that the Bible disproves scientific theories and understandings. I say they both work together and it is impossible to understand one without the other. Here is the teaser for week 1 - 10 Dimensions. I would encourage you to look up the scientific understanding of 10 Dimensions before coming to church on October 6th. When trying to comprehend String Theory and the origin of the universe, the mathematical equations only make sense if we live in a universe of 10 Dimensions. What are the known dimensions: length, width, height and time. These are the four we see and know exist - what are the other 6 and how does this relate to the Bible and Christianity? You have to come on Sunday and find out.

Everyone's contribution makes for a successful dinner. I believe that we served close to 70, plus two take-outs.



Unfortunately, we ran out of roast beef, carrots and onions; and so had to turn a few people away. Our profit for the dinner was \$647.00, which will be split up among four missions that we support.

Student School Kit (Midwest Missions)

- 3 Notebooks 1 subject spiral 8 X10 ½ inches
- 1 Pair of student round tip scissors
- 1 Ruler 12 inch long with metric
- 1 Box of 24 crayons
- 1 Pencil eraser 2 inches or larger
- 1 Pencil sharpener
- 1 Box of 12 colored pencils
- 6 Unsharpened pencils

For school kits, we could use many of all items.

Hygiene Kit (UMCOR)

- 1 new hand towel (15" X 25" up to 17" X 27")
- 1 new washcloth
- 1 large, sturdy comb (at least 6 inches of teeth)
- 1 toenail or fingernail clipper no emery boards or metal nail files
- 1 bath sized bar of soap in wrapper (3 oz or larger); No Ivory or Jergens
- 1 new adult size toothbrush in original sealed wrapper
- 10 adhesive bandages (3/4" by 3") common household bandages acceptable
- 1 one-gallon size re-sealable bag

For hygiene kits, the items we are most in need of are:
Hand towels
Soap
Nail or toenail clippers

Layette Kit (Midwest Missions)

- 6 cloth diapers
- 2 gowns or sleepers
- 2 diaper pins must have protective plastic closures
- 2 receiving blankets 28" x 28" to 32" x 32" (no crib blankets)
- 1 sweater, sweatshirt or jacket must open from the front,
 - May be hand-knitted, crocheted or sewn
- 2 undershirts or onesies
- 2 infant size washcloths (no adult washcloths)

For layette kits, the items we are most in need of are:

Gowns or sleepers Diaper pins

Nancy called the meeting to order and gave devotions.

Minutes of the July 23, 2019 council meeting were read by Karen A. Motion by Betty; 2nd by Karen H. to approve the minutes. Motion carried.

Endowment: Dean discussed the difference between an Endowment Fund and an Investment Portfolio on our bequest investment. After more research on an investment portfolio, Dean will have more information at our next meeting on October 10, 2019 at 10:00 a.m.

Energy Audit and Information on building mechanical systems to cut expenses tabled until the October meeting.

Reviewed and discussed "State of the Church" draft letter to the congregation. Sunday, November 3, 2019 at 3 p.m. is the date set for the congregational meeting to discuss the State of the Church.

Reviewed and discussed the 2020 salary recommendations from the SPPRC Committee. Sandy made the motion and seconded by Betty to accept the salary recommendations, motion carried. Salaries for 2020 are as follows: Pastor Rob from \$43,850 to \$45,250; Ona from \$12,200 to \$12,550. These 2 salaries are shared equally with Asbury, Lake Mills. Karen Hove's salary for Northwood \$9,650 to \$9,900.

An amendment to the 2019 Form I for Housing Exclusion will be presented at the charge conference to be held at Northwood with Asbury on Sunday, September 29, 2019 at noon with a potluck.

Brainstorming on Bequest Expenditures was tabled.

Pastor's Report: Discussed a Kid's Life Program and Pub Theology.

Trustees Report: 2 estimates for the Exit Lights and ground fault plugs. One from Northwood Electric and one coming from Lupkes Electric.

Betty reported that she had made visits to our shut-ins.

October... Breast Cancer Awareness Month

According to my list of National Health and Wellness Observances Calendar, there are many special things to observe during October. Where they come up with some of these ideas is beyond me (such as Vegetarian Awareness Month). But the one possibly best known is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. That one has been long-standing as we all know, is well publicized and is especially dear to my heart in many ways from being a two-time victim of breast cancer. Also, as an "old nurse," I worked with the local program to advance and promote free or reduced cost breast cancer screening for women who qualified. That service still exists locally through the statewide "Care for Yourself" program. Contacting a local public health agency or asking a physician is the first step for someone who has questions or needs help to obtain these life-saving screenings. According to the website, there are several other health areas included in various aspects of that program now.

As always: Don't forget to get your annual mammogram according to age-related guidelines. Early detection of breast cancer is the key to saving your life. Monthly breast selfexams and awareness of changes in our bodies is also extremely important in maintaining good health. It never hurts to ask a provider or nurse questions.


