## **Spring Happenings at Spring Valley – March/April 2020**

Spring is a busy and popular season at Spring Valley! See below for a list of upcoming events and family programs! Note that some programs require pre-registration due to limited space. ### **CONSTRUCTION ALERT!**

Construction will begin this spring (likely in May) on the new grant-funded visitor amenities near the Nature Center – picnic areas and restrooms near Bison's Bluff and a new Pollinator Display Garden. During construction, which will likely progress throughout the summer, signs will detour visitors around the construction area west of the Nature Center. Some trails near the Nature Center will be closed during construction.

### **Bison's Bluff Nature Playground Update!!**

Just a reminder that Bison's Bluff opens at 9 a.m. each day and remains closed until noon on Mondays for maintenance. The play area will also experience periodic delayed openings and/or early closings in order to accommodate parking at scheduled special events. These changes will be communicated via the Park District's website and via posted signs near the Nature Center and the play area entrances. Organized youth groups are asked to schedule their visit in advance and must pay a modest fee for use of the play area. These fees and scheduling help to offset the costs of maintenance and alleviate over-crowding on busy summer days.

### **36<sup>th</sup> annual Sugar Bush Fair – Saturday & Sunday, March 14 & 15, 9 a.m.-12 p.m.**

Celebrate winter's end at this popular annual event which features a delicious pancake breakfast with real maple syrup, demonstrations of maple sugaring, historic re-enactments, a kid's puppet show, and more. Admission is free; breakfast tickets cost \$6 for a half stack or \$8 for a full stack when purchased at the event. Discounted pre-purchased tickets – \$4.50 for a half stack or \$6.50 for a full stack – are available at the Nature Center until March 13.

### **Sunset Fire & Picnic on the Prairie – Saturday, April 4, 5-7p.m.**

This popular program provides insights into the benefits of fire for Midwest natural areas. Start with a picnic in the Nature Center backyard (food available for purchase or bring your own). Following a short program on the benefits of fire, trained staff will ignite a portion of the prairie behind the nature center – a sight not to be missed! Fee is \$4/person or \$16/family. NOTE: this event sells out, so purchase tickets in advance at the Nature Center!

## Nature

My father came from Sweden in 1920. Nineteen years of age and alone, he traveled to South Dakota to stay with cousins, learned the language, traveled on and finally became an ingredient in the melting pot of America. So I am the son of an immigrant.

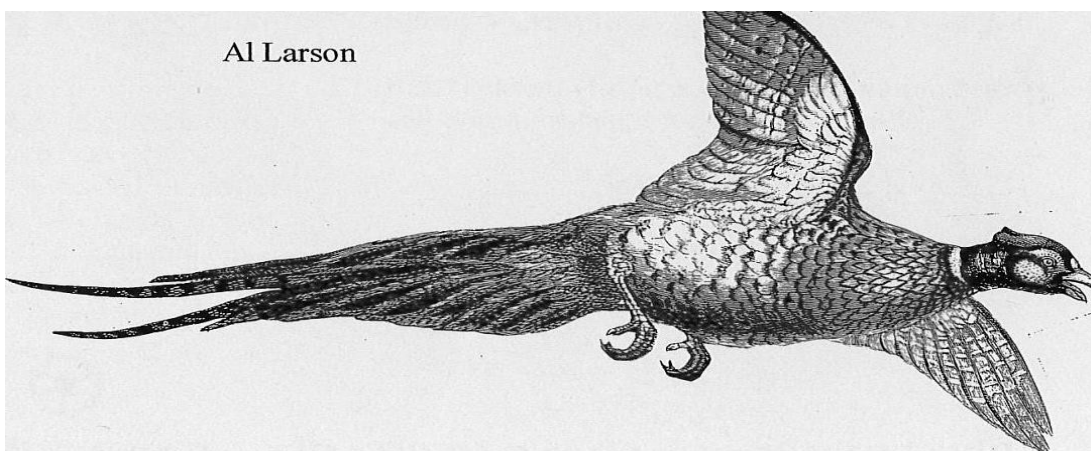
The land was new and the surroundings were strange to many newly arrived immigrants. And like my father, they longed for a touch of the old country, something to remind them of friends and family that they had left behind. So in 1853, this led to the first successful introduction of the most common and readily recognized bird in America, the English sparrow.

Fifty of them were set free in Brooklyn, New York. And by the time my Dad arrived from Sweden, they had taken up permanent residence along the California coast. They followed the railroads west and easily adapted to city life, exploiting nesting opportunities and surviving under metropolitan conditions not conducive to native American birds. They are successful immigrants.

English sparrows were not the first non-native bird to prosper in North America. That honor belongs to the pigeon. Early settlers brought them as a source of ready meat. They are now common in cities where they produce groans from building owners and municipal health officials, and feelings of warmth from park bench feeders of these hardy urban survivors.

The starling is another English bird that was fruitful and multiplied. Its introduction was as a result of Shakespeare. A bird lover and Shakespeare fan wanted to bring to America all of the birds mentioned in the great bard's works. Sixty starlings were released in New York City in 1890. The rest is bird history. Not all bird immigrants have produced the negative reactions inspired by the English sparrow, the pigeon and the starling. There is a successful transplant that is difficult to fault. Although the first attempt to establish them was in 1730 in New York, it wasn't until 1882 that ten cock pheasants and eighteen hens, shipped from China, became the breeding colony that established the ring-necked pheasant as one of America's prime hunting birds. Delivered to Oregon and successfully released, descendants were soon live-trapped and shipped throughout the country.

They became so numerous in South Dakota that they were named that state's official state bird. I'm sure my father noticed them when he arrived there. A meeting of fellow immigrants.
