The **LEAD HILL community** one-time 200th anniversary event November 7th, 8th and 9th is one of the more interesting places in Arkansas and the town and county are planning their events around us, with a parade and a great vous site!. Mr. Glenn went up

along with Corey Edge to visit with the promoters who are great historians and have written several books about the area. They will also be paying EARA a substantial honorarium for our group so we NEED AT LEAST 25 CAMPS. PLEASE make a commitment to attend this event. They are really gearing up for a great time and this will give us some great publicity. We are trying to get a nice article in the *Democrat-Gazette* for this event.

There were lead and zinc mines in the area in the years before the 1920s. Actually the person who invented the "roller coaster" got the idea from Lead Hill, where they took the mine carts, put a track down the hills and people would hold on tight (no safety barriers) and roll free wheeling down the hills to the bottom and then the carts were towed back to the top by mules.

When the big lake up there was built, the town was where the water would wipe out the houses, so the people put them on trucks and moved them up the hills. The movers had a contest to see who could move a house up the hill without spilling a glass of water sitting on the dining room table. The losers had to buy drinks for the winners.

EARA PROFILES

This is a series of articles giving information about our members so we can get to know each other better... so let's introduce ourselves and get better acquainted. When you see someone at an event that you don't know, go up and stick your hand out and give them a howdy'do!

William Hardage, our web site administrator

I asked William to send me a profile and I was very much impressed with the one he sent. I've never actually met William, but I interact by E mail fairly often. William is an internet GURU and I'm an "Internet for dummies" kind of gal. so here is William's profile. I am 29 years old and have been reenacting since 1995. Started reenacting as a Civil War Soldier in the 9th Arkansas. Became the Captain of the group in 2004 and have been doing that since. Recently, back in April 2014, I was promoted to Major with the re-created 1st Kansas Colored Infantry out of Camden Arkansas and have started a small Federal battalion of three companies of infantry and one gun.

Around 2005, I got into WWII and WWI reenacting and still do that on the side, and was one of the Founding fathers of the Southern World War II Reenactor Association. In 2006-2007, I met Ed Williams at a Civil War event and he told me about the EARA and what they do, so I showed up as French Marine with Ed at the Lake Dardanelle event. After going to the 2008, 250th Battle of Fort Ticonderoga in upstate New York, after that event I was hooked into 18th Century reenacting.

When I was a kid, I loved British Redcoats, anything that had a movie with them in it I did it. I would go to the second hand store and buy Red Wool Dress coats and would put blue and yellow facings on them and march around the woods pretending I was redcoat. My mom and dad live right next door to the Ouachita Mountains and I can remember me and best friend building forts on the creeks and having battles with the Indians and French (the neighbors down the road) for control on the river. I remember one of

the last few big battles ending up catching one of the forts on fire when some body's bottle rocket landed right into some dry pine needles.

In 2009, I started reenacting as a British Redcoat, then in 2010, I started the 16th Regiment of Foote that was historical stationed in 1768 to 1783 from the other side of the Mississippi River to Pensacola, FL. The group has gone from 1 to fielding up to 7 soldiers. I have really enjoyed doing this and hope to see Revolutionary War reenacting to grow more in and outside the state.
