Three Churches-One Mission for the Homeless

For several years, craft groups in each of the three parish communities have been making or collecting items to keep the homeless and less advantaged warm during our cold winter months.



In the past, St. Joseph's held a Christmas Bazaar to which people would make and donate hand knitted/crocheted items to be sold; any unsold items were donated to the Salvation Army, City Mission, and nursing homes. This activity has often been done by parishioners at home, and COVID made this even more essential. It is hoped that, by making the knitting group part of the Social Concerns Committee, they may be able to get people together, not only for charity, but also for social aspect.

Busy Hooks and Needles, at Our Lady of Grace, started when Deacon Hook served at the parish and his wife started "Carol's Crafters." For the past several years, the group has set up tables in the church hall and sold the items for the Helping Hands Holiday Food Baskets. The items that were left were donated to needy families, the Women's Abuse Center, and the homeless shelter in Saratoga. When COVID hit, everything came to a standstill but now the group is planning to meet again—on Wednesday morn-

ings, from 10 am until noon in Room #2. So far, 2 crafters will be coming, but more will be working at home. The first sale was planned for November 19th, after the 10:30 Sunday Mass.

Donna Lagasse who began Keep Schenectady Warm at Immaculate Conception, is a secular Franciscan whose motto is pray and serve. One day in prayer, a ministry such as KSW came to mind and she began it in 2011. Four other women were part of the original group knitting and crocheting hats, mittens, scarves, and blankets for seniors in cold Schenectady apartments. One of the original members, Pat Clark, is still with the group. When only Pat was left, Donna appealed to the children in grades 1-5 to donate new items for all ages. That year, KSW was flooded with hats, mittens

and scarves. Announcements are posted in the bulletin, and each winter KSW collects more than 300 items. Donna makes sets of a hat and mitten\gloves and places them



in gallon plastic bags with a note that reads: "A gift for you from KEEP SCHENECTADY WARM, your neighbors who follow Christ's example to love. 'And this commandment we have from God that he who loveth God, Loves also his brother.' 1 John 4:21 The Church of the Immaculate Conception, Glenville, NY."



Morning of Service Proceeds Despite COVID

Immaculate Conception's sixth annual Morning of Service was held on November 6, 2021. Sadly, with COVID restrictions in mind, the offsite and onsite activities were scaled back. Since indoor sites like nursing homes and Heritage Home for Women were unable to participate, offsite activities were only those that could be done outdoors. Forty-six volunteers worked at Anchor Diamond Park, Indian Meadows Park, Joan Nicole Prince Home, St. Anthony's Cemetery, Rebuilding Together Saratoga, and the YWCA.

Onsite activities were completed in the volunteers' homes using kits that had been prepared by team leaders. One hundred forty six volunteer participated and created the following:

- 88 Rosary bracelets which were donated to the Dominican Retreat House for sale in its gift shop,
- 17 pom pom scarves, 23 hats, and 62 hat/scarf sets for Bethesda House and SICM,
- 42 blankets for Glendale Home and our home bound,
- 25 cards and letters for Double H Ranch, and
- 72 holiday cards for the military, given to the Air National Guard for the military in Antarctica.
