Kind: This week my class will be reviewing the letters we have already learned along with learning letters P, X, and K. I am so happy to see the kids progressing and recognizing letters and their sounds. My class will also be reading the book "The Relatives Came". We will be discussing events that happened in the beginning, middle, and end of the book. We will also be focusing on recalling details of the book, such as who the main characters are and the setting. In math we will continue to work on number order, identifying and adding pennies, and how to tell time on the hour. We will also be adding two more sight words to our list, "me" and "my". I can't wait to start another fun week of learning! - Miss Rachel

1st/2nd: First and second grade are continuing to work on their math facts and sight words each day. We are also working on our addresses and phone numbers so be quizzing the students on those at home. Second grade will be working on ee and ea words this week as well as looking at how suffixes change our words. We will also begin working on our states more in depth. First grade will be working on number words and talking about different types of punctuation. We will also be talking about gratitude and what

things we are thankful for in life. Both classes will begin writing a book in class that will hopefully be published. And finally, if you haven't been working on reading those AR books, it is important to get going on those so you aren't waiting until the last minute.

3rd/4th: We have a busy week ahead of us in our classroom. In reading, 4th grade is struggling with identifying the main idea of a passage so they will continue to work on that. 3rd grade will work on identifying details in a passage. In language arts, both grades will be working with adjectives. Due to the way Saxon math is set up, each class will have a math test on Friday of this week. I asked that they keep working on Xtra Math at home for help with their basic math facts skills. Study guides for the Missouri Studies Weekly should have come home over the weekend to study. The test will be tomorrow. In science, study guides for chapter 3 tests will come home today with the test being on Wednesday. - Mrs. Cooper

5th/6th: In Writing, 5th and 6th graders will be reading and discussing some different poems this week. In Science, 5th graders will be looking at invertebrates and 6th graders will be getting ready to test over Ch. 2 "States of Matter" next week. In Reading, both grades will start Ch. 7 & 8 of our Lit. Circle and will present roles on Friday. In Social Studies, 5th graders will be reading about the first Thanksgiving and 6th grade will be looking at early Native American civilizations. 5th grade will have a label the United States test on Fri. and 6th grade will have a label Asia test on Wed. 6th grade will also have a test on U.S. Presidents #1-10 on Friday. 5th-8th Grade AR Book Requirements are due on Monday, December 14th. 7th/8th Comm. Arts: Students will begin reading Section 3 of "The Diary of Anne Frank" this week. Since this is a long section, students will not present roles to the class until next Tues. 5th-8th Math: Fifth grade will have a math test on Friday.

7th/8th: In grammar, we will be moving on this week to start looking at modifiers. This will include adjectives and adverbs. In social studies, 7th grade will be looking at ancient Rome, while 8th grade will be studying the American Revolution. In science, 7th grade is looking at climate and the various climate zones across the globe. Eighth grade is studying fluids, including how they move and the relationships between fluids and pressure.
