As we get ready to close out the 2019 calendar year that also means we as clubwomen need to start to compile our volunteer recording sheets. It is most important that every clubwoman turns in their personal volunteer logs to their club and club president. Your club president cannot complete their club report without your support.

Each club president (or whomever completes their club report) needs to send the following information to the state president and vice president before February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2020. Please remember the report is a collection of your 2019 club activities.

1/ Page 1 statistical information of Community Service Projects (CSP) and GFWC Advancement Areas that your club completed in 2019.

2/ Page 2 specific statistical information of the partnership projects that GFWC has a formal relationship with and that your club completed in 2019.

3/ Page 3 7 Grand and 3 Brand Initiatives. Statistics needed for the 10 initiatives that your club may have completed in 2019.

4/ Summary of all your Club activities. This is a narrative of the projects and events that your club completed in 2019. Please write the narrative not by month but by CSP and advancement area. For example, Home Life is where projects that deal with issues that affect the well-being of individuals, families and communities should be reported. Projects that might touch on healthy lifestyles, personal development, financial difficulties, hunger, inadequate housing, homelessness, and awareness, prevention, research and treatment of diseases. Public Issues is where projects that deal with civic and social responsibilities should be reported. Examples would be projects that deal with military/veterans, safetv and crime prevention, emergency disaster preparedness, and citizenship.

5/ Club Submission for a Creativity Award. This is where your club president summarizes ONE project from each CSP or GFWC Advancement Area. It's supposed to be only ONE page and should include the who, what, where, when, why and how narrative. Please no photos or supporting documents. Also include the # of volunteer hours, dollars donated, in-kind donations, dollars spent, and dollars raised.

The week after Thanksgiving each club president should receive an email and a snail mail copy of all the club reporting forms. Please note these have been updated since the State Handbook was published in August 2018. I would truly love to see 30 club reports submitted by February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2020.

# *GFWC of Kansas Chairman Reports*

### *GFWC of Kansas Library Report*

It's official! Though it was a little late in coming, Governor Kelly has made her appointments to the State Library of Kansas Board (SLKB) and I will be serving as your new GFWC representative. Though Jan left big shoes to fill, I hope to do it justice and keep you informed and up-to-date on the board's activities.

Though not yet officially appointed, I did attend the SLKB's September meeting. While these are usually held at the State Capitol in Topeka, the September gathering was on the Emporia State University campus and included a tour of the Kansas Talking Books office. Director Michael Lang did a great job of explaining what the service does, how it operates and how much it is used. The answer to the latter is a lot!

Talking books had more than 4,700 users in fiscal year 2019 and averaged 650 requests per day for the audio and braille books and magazines that the service provides to Kansans with visual and physical impairments as well as reading disabilities. Some days saw more than one thousand requests flood their inboxes!

One particularly cool portion of the tour was the sound booth where some of the actual recordings are made. Most of the collection contains prerecorded materials that are supplied through the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled as well as digital items via the BARD, Braille and Audio Reading Download, web site. But, some are read and recorded right in the office including each issue of a selection of more than twenty magazines from *Angels on Earth* to *Yankee* as well as some of the award winning titles in the Kansas Notable Books program.

For more information about talking books, checkout the state library web site at <u>https://kslib.info/153/Talking-Books</u>. Most of the 4-1-1 is on the site including who is eligible and how they can enroll in the service. It's a great program with a small but mighty staff that makes it hum everyday on the ESU campus.

#### Conservation

#### **BAN THE BOTTLES!!**

It is my hope that the GFWC of Kansas clubs will make this resolution for 2020! Will your club join me in the BAN the Bottles crusade?

**1. Plastic bottles are a waste of Natural Resources.** Oil is a limited resource that is required to transport and to manufacture plastic. Making plastic will require crude oil and water. It requires a lot more water to manufacture a bottle and very little to fill it.

**2. Transportation Cost**. The cost of transporting bottled water to areas where they will be consumed is a waste. The cost of fuel in transporting bottled water from one point to another is quite high on something that could be avoided by <u>banning plastic bottles</u>.

**3.** Pollution of Environment. Human beings have become careless to the point of ignorance and many of them can be seen throwing plastic bottles everywhere after use. The manufacture of bottles of water in various industries leads to the emission of dangerous forms of carbon into the atmosphere leading to pollution. Burning plastic will also lead to the release of dangerous toxins into the environment.

**4. Reality Behind Recycling.** Plastic take almost 1000 years to completely biodegrade and this means that every plastic that has ever been made still exists in one form or another. This means that plastic can never be changed into another form other than plastic and the only way of getting rid of plastic is through incineration. So far very few types of plastic are being incinerated and this calls for its banning all together!!

**5. Purity on the Content.** There has been a great illusion on the fact that bottled water is better and cleaner than tap water. The reality behind it is rather the opposite and tap water is maintained under very strict rules than that of bottled water. This makes it even safer to use tap water than bottled water. If people could understand this then there would be <u>no use of</u> <u>plastic water bottles</u> and should thus be banned.

**6. Health Risks.** Degradation of plastic water bottles leads to the release of harmful chemicals. Reusing a plastic bottle might also provide a good breeding ground for bacteria. These often leave the body at a greater risk of absorbing the chemicals thus posing a great risk to general humanity. The less the bottles of water we

have in the world, the easier it will be when it comes to <u>cleaning the environment</u>. A ban of plastic bottles will lead to reduced manufacture and therefore fewer dispositions thus it will be a lot easier to clean the already existing mess.

**7. Increased Sustainability.** A decrease in the use of plastic will lead to a better world characterized with less <u>environmental pollution</u>. A ban on the plastic bottle will therefore reduce the work load present in making the world a better and sustainable place to live in.

Please note that from the above it takes 1000 years to completely biodegrade plastic bottles!! Also note #5 your tap water is SAFER than ANY water sold in plastic bottles!

Here is another idea: If you must buy water than find the water that is in cans, because it will recycle so much easier!!

It is my hope that ALL the Kansas GFWC Clubs will join with me in the Ban the Bottles Crusade! Let us all help keep Kansas highways, streets, lakes, and farmlands CLEAN!!

A cover sheet MUST accompany the entry. If there is no cover sheet, the essay will not be judged. The cover sheet must include student name, address and phone number, email address, name of sponsoring club, grade in high school. Name of high school and city. NO IDENTIFICATION SHOULD BE ON THE ESSAY. Students are to retain a copy of their essay.

Students should be aware that the Judges' focus will be on the content of the essays, but that grammar and spelling will be taken into consideration in the overall score. Clubwomen, parents, essay writers, and friends are encouraged to attend the State Convention.

GFWC Ad Astra met on Veteran's Day, November 11, 2019. Our featured speaker was a Wamego native, Cheryl Holz, who is employed as Home Based Primary Care Manager for the Veteran's Administration. She works with 23 Veterans and meets with them regularly.

Cheryl shared many experiences in this program which she helped build in 2006. Her background in physical therapy, EMT training, and nursing was the perfect fit for her position. She meets emotional needs, physical limitations and helps the vets deal with end of life issues, providing emotional and seeking fiduciary support.

Club members brought various items which Cheryl will deliver to the VA. These included books, magazines, personal products, gloves, hats, etc.

Our business meeting consisted of planning for various projects we will be involved in supporting and implementing this winter. These include financial donations to HOBY, Friends of the Library, and the Christmas Home Tour to benefit the Ruby Slipper fund,

The patriotic theme was carried out with refreshments and a centerpiece of individual poppies given to members with a Veteran's Day fact attached to each flower.



### GFWC Goddard Woman's Club

October was an extremely busy month for our club. The first weekend in October was the community Fall Festival which has traditionally been an opportunity for the club to fundraise for much needed funds. We had a booth on Main Street where we sold hair scrunchies, decorative pillow covers, and ranch and puppy chow mix. We also had 2 raffles where the lucky winners received either a Grinch Christmas basket or a Sunflower Kansas basket. Despite getting rained out early in the day the sun came out mid-morning and the event was a fundraising success for the club.

Mid October we went on an educational tour of the Child Advocacy Center for Sedgwick County. Thank you to President-Elect Jan Moore for joining us on that tour. The center is staffed by caring professionals dedicated to ending the trauma of abuse to children in our community. These staff members include investigators, social workers (family advocates), medical professionals, therapists and prosecutors all under one roof so that children and caregivers feel safe and there is no need to travel from one agency to another. The Child Advocacy Center of Sedgwick County serves almost 2000 children each year. Of that 2000, more than 1,100 are victims of sexual abuse, more than 300 children are victims of physical abuse, more than 200 children are victims of neglect, and

more than 400 teenagers are at risk of becoming victims of human trafficking. These were staggering numbers for us to hear as a club. Unfortunately, we were also told that 85% of all child abuse goes unreported nationally. Obviously we as a community have a lot of work to do.

Also that same week in October we cooked for the new Ronald McDonald location in Wichita. The other 2 locations (Sleepy Hollow and Midtown) were closed in July and everything moved to the new facility. The new location has 40 separate sleeping rooms on 2 floors with a main and auxiliary kitchen. It is connected by a covered walkway to Wesley Hospital and Children's Mercy of Wichita. There is a private and secure outside play area with an additional area to eat while enjoying the weather. Inside they have multiple lounging areas, a large main dining area, reading nocks, a gaming room, and another play area.
