Preschool: We are over half way through September! We learned so much about the letter 'A' this past week. We learned about the different sounds it makes and the different things that begin with 'A'. We also made an alligator and painted the letter. This week we will learn about different kinds of apples and the letter "L". I am seeing great progress with our names. Please remember to start each letter at the top and only the first letter should be capitalized. Kind: Kindergarten's theme this week is Apples. We will be talking about fiction and nonfiction books. During nightly reading, please ask your child to identify the cover, back cover, title page and spine. You can also talk about the author of the book and if it is fiction or nonfiction. Please continue to point out rhyming words with your student. We will keep working on our previously learned letter sounds, with the addition of /c k/, /e/, and /h/. Students will take home their "the" and "a" flashcards to review nightly. - **Mrs. Stewart**

1st/2nd: Second grade has Stanford testing this week, so please make sure students are well rested and prepared to do their best. This week in 1st and 2nd grade we are going to be working on b and d reversals, as several students are getting these backwards. We will also be working as a class to discuss what being a good citizen of any community means. First grade will have their second science test on Friday this week over habitats and adaptations and second grade will be retaking their science test on Tuesday and then begin a new science unit this week over different kinds of animals. Midterm is Friday and I still have several students who haven't taken and passed an AR test. Please remember reading at home will help with this. If you are unsure, if a book has an AR test, please ask. Students need five before October 7.

5th/6th: 5th and 6th graders will be Stanford Testing this week. Please be sure to get plenty of sleep and eat a good breakfast, so you can do your best on the tests! In Science, 5th graders will have a test over Ch. 1 on Wed. and 6th grade will be finishing a unit on earthquakes. In Reading, both grades will be starting a new Literature Circle Unit. In Social Studies, 5th grade will be reading about pilgrims and the first Thanksgiving and 6th grade will have a test over Ch. 1 on Wed. 6th graders will also start writing their Patriot's Pen essays this week. AR Book requirements for 5th-8th grade are due on Friday, Oct. 15th, so keep reading! Have a wonderful week! -Mrs. Foster

5th/6th Math: Fifth graders are working on the nature of operations including missing number story problems, multiplying larger numbers, and working with negative integers. Sixth grade is working on mixed numbers and measurements, factors, and different types of factor and prime number problems. Tests This Week: 6th Math: Wednesday 7th/8th: In seventh grade, students are learning about ancient civilizations of the Nile River Valley. Eighth graders are beginning to work on early colonization by the English. Constitution Week is September 17th-23rd. In math, seventh grade is working on a lot of geometric concepts such as similarity/congruence, perimeter of complex shapes, and the nature of roots and exponents. In pre-algebra, students are working on various types of unit multipliers using both customary and metric measurement and types of problems using average. In algebra, students are working on more difficult order-of-operations problems and operations with algebraic terms. We begin Stanford testing this week, so please help our students to get off to a good start this week.
