

Conserving Biodiversity

Ephemeral Soaks Field Day

Following the floods of January 2011, you may have seen green and persistently boggy patches of ground around the bases of local granite hills.

Last Sunday 16th November, ecologist Paul Foreman (second left top photograph) took us on a tour of some of these groundwater dependent wetlands, known as ephemeral soaks, near Mounts Kooyoora and Korong. Paul described how soaks are populated by uniquely adapted plant species such as Golden spray, Swamp Goodenia and Slender Aphelia. We saw Blakely's Redgum and Prickly Teatree, which, when seen out of their normal range, can be a tell-tale sign of an ephemeral wetland.

In the dry years, the soaks may appear relatively clear of understorey, as plants lie dormant (middle photograph). When the rains come, large fissures in the granite hills fill with an enormous amount of water, which, over the ensuing months, seeps out into the soaks causing many dormant plants to flourish, transforming the areas into brilliant green, lush wetlands, sometimes persisting for a year or more while the moisture lasts. As we stood on a dry, rather barren patch of ground on private property near Mt Korong, Paul surprised us with a photo of the same site taken in 2011, revealing its alter-ego as an enchanting, vibrantly green wetland (bottom photograph)

The field day which was coordinated by the Wedderburn CMN was funded as part of the ongoing Kooyoora Connections project. The Wedderburn CMN has recently been successful in obtaining a grant of \$49,950, from the Department of the Environment and Primary Industries' Communities for Nature



program to identify, map, assess and prioritise these unique wetland environments for conservation work necessary for their survival.

Paul Foreman will be acting as consultant to the Wedderburn CMN for this project and will be conducting an extensive survey of local ephemeral soaks, which he says have been largely overlooked in the North West goldfields, with a view to suggesting strategies for their ongoing health and protection. Concurrent programs on Malleefowl, Eucalyptus harvesting site restoration, revegetation, cactus control, wildlife corridors, weed coordination, nest boxes, orchid research, field and open days, cats & foxes, guest speakers as well as liaising with landholders and government agencies all needs to be kept in check and organised. This is currently done by the president, the treasurer and the ordinary committee members. They would all greatly appreciate an assistant secretary who would be learning on the job. Like all the WCMN positions this is a volunteer position, so it takes a dedicated person to commit. However, this person would share in the great environmental achievements the WCMN is now starting to complete. For somebody with their heart in the local environment, this share in the success would therefore be a great reward.

The committee of management also needs one or two extra ordinary members. These members would attend the monthly WCMN meetings and help decide on actions, motions and the future direction of the network. 
