## **EDITOR'S RUMBLINGS September 2022**

I have often there is nothing more pleasing to see than a car of any age bought back to original showroom condition. For those who were around in the 1960's and 1970's the car craze was to customize cars, particularly early holdens. The seams between the guard and the body would be filled with body filler, taillights changed, bumper bars removed and even headlights and grills altered. This is without mentioning the lowered suspension and widened wheels. This would have been very satisfying for the owners who individualized their car but when the bog shrank and the paint cracked what did they have? There was then no unbolting of a mudguard for easy replacement after a minor accident.

I contend that they devalued what would be a valuable classic today if it survived at all. At best these cars could be considered a bitser being made from parts of other models and makes. There is no room for mongrels in the historic car movement. Even visible changes to the exterior or interior to individualize a vehicle would spoil an otherwise original vehicle and lower its resale value as an historic car. The CHMC and TMR has strict guidelines on period accessories which are permitted. Below is the transport and main roads link for permitted period accessories. Anything over and above this comes under the modified vehicle category and has a different registration classification which is, misnamed in my opinion, "classic vehicle" registration. There is another category of vehicle produced by professional customizers and although not very practical in most cases are often a work of art and would come under a third registration category if they can be registered at all.



# MOTORING TRIUMPHS PART TWO by RON THORP

In an instant I made, what could have been, a life changing decision. I pressed the pedal to the metal and the little Triumph chugged past the dark stranger.

As I continued on my thoughts were with the hitch hiker. Was he someone in urgent need of a lift or was he an escaped convict or murderer on the run? It was then that it occurred to me that it would have been quite possible for him to have jumped on to the box on the back of the utility and he may well be there, hanging on , just waiting for an opportunity to pounce,

I dared not stop and confront the villain. That would clearly be a risky move. The only option was to proceed and not stop.

The next town was Brewarrina and that was quite some distance away. The more I thought about the uninvited passenger, the more convinced I became of his presence. The little Triumph certainly felt heavy on the back.

At last a light appeared in the distance, it was a vehicle, coming towards me and due to the road conditions, it too was traveling at a steady pace. Now was my chance to resolve the dilemma. I waited until the approaching lights were close enough to enable a person to be seen, then jolted to a stop, jumped out and ran to the back of the utility to discover, to my great relief, that there was no other person on board.

My next recollection of the journey was at Moree, where I noticed that the foot brake was inoperative. The Triumph was one of the very few cars of the late twenties to be fitted with hydraulic brakes and like all modern technology they worked fine, until something went wrong.

After various attempts to rectify the problem I concluded that the fault was within the master cylinder and that, almost certainly, some parts would be required which were not in my on board parts supply.

To dismantle the master cylinder at such a remote location would be point less as this would immobilize the vehicle for several days while the necessary parts were sourced. This was time I did not have to spare.

Brakes only slow you down and in any case I still had the handbrake which operated on a drum behind the gearbox. With the mechanical advantage of a 6.25 to 1 worm drive diff the handbrake was very effective, so effective in fact, that it would lock the transmission up unless applied very judicially and would readily break an axle or shear off a drive key. In so doing the handbrake would become totally ineffective as well as removing any engine braking effect.
