#### The Model "A" Ford

Last Pony Tales we wrote about the first record setting Ford product, the model "T" produced from 1908—1927. This issue we'll look at the Model "A", produced from 1928—1931.— Hold it! Does it seem a bit illogical that the first Ford was the model "T" and the subsequent one was the Model "A"? Well the first Ford produced in 1903 was called the Model "A" It had a 2 cylinder engine, with a roller chain drive to the rear wheels, and a steering tiller similar to that of other cars produced in the 19th Century. There were also models N,K,R & S, before the Model "T" all produced from 1903—1907.

The new, 1928 car, was so radically different, that Mr. Ford decided to restart the use of the alphabet, hence the (re) use of the Model "A".

The new Model "A" had the conventional pedal layout, which survives to this day, for manual transmission cars. The brakes moved to all 4 wheels, instead of inside the transmission. The transmission was entirely new, with sliding gears, similar to today's except for no syncros, which necessitated a shift to neutral, while letting out the clutch, before shifting to the next forward speed. (Double Clutching)

The Model A had an electrical system, which had eliminated the magneto spark system, for a coil/breaker point /distributor. The lighting went from the chemical burning lamps, to Thomas Edisons' incandescent lamps. The engine was a four cylinder for the first year of production. The engine had a starter, so no more broken arms, from the backfire with the crank!

Then competition in the form of Chevrolet, with an inline six, prompted the first Ford V-8 engine in 1929. The Horsepower race was on, for the more common cars. (Cadillac had introduced their V-8 in 1915)
