

I want to continue from last month's letter and tell you about my experiences at three other churches I visited during my renewal leave in October. The second church I visited was River City Church in Mason City and it meets in the Willowbrook Mall. They were having three services a Sunday because the area they were meeting in was too small for the number of people attending church (a good problem to have). They got the approval to knock out a wall and expand their sanctuary and were able to go to having two services each Sunday. The service I went to started at 10am when I arrived at 9:50 and only four other people were in the sanctuary. I thought I might have picked a bad time to visit but as 10 rolled around a few more people arrived and by ten minutes after the place was packed.

Next Sunday I visited Prairie Lakes Church in Osage. This church is a satellite of Prairie Lakes in Cedar Falls and is one of many church plants throughout Iowa. Each campus church has a pastor, a worship leader but the sermon was broadcast on a screen and was recorded by one of the pastors in Cedar Falls. This was interesting because an idea I had for churches in our conference that cannot afford a pastor or are without one could go with a model like this. We have our services recorded and they have someone who is there to lead the service and the message would be delivered via a recording from another clergy. Again, this service was packed too.

The last week I watched the church service online for St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Dubuque. I love this church because of the Tiffany windows and beautiful décor. Watching online you did not get to see the beauty of the sanctuary and miss out on the awe. Otherwise, I thought they did a nice job of presenting a service that was meaningful and invited you into their space. Not sure how many people were attending in person but I saw a lot of empty pews.

I am sure there are a number of factors as to why Cornerstone, River City and Prairie Lakes were a packed house on Sunday but one thing I saw as a common denominator was each church had a strong emphasis on small groups. These groups met at various times during the week and kept people connected. Small groups were a key factor in the growth of the Methodist movement and John Wesley called them class meetings. To this end I want to develop small groups at Asbury and Northwood as part of our discipleship pathway. Be thinking and praying about how God can use you to be a part of these groups. There are opportunities to be a part of a group already by joining one of the Advent studies, Pub Theology, coffee at the Swallow or gathering of people from house to house.

May God bless you this season of Advent. Till Christ comes again.



A Brief History of Sunnyside Cemetery— From the 1978 Dedication

Sunnyside Cemetery is located on the south edge of Lake Mills on Lake Street. It belongs to Asbury United Methodist Church, as Lake Mills has no community cemetery, but each church owns and maintains its own.

The Land was given to the church in the 1870's by C.D. Smith. Mr. Smith owned much land in this area and is credited with founding the town of Lake Mills. The early operation of the cemetery had little organization. A group of families of the church would usually bring their equipment to mow the grass and tidy things up before Memorial Day. But by the end of the summer the upkeep had been forgotten. The only funds came from occasional donations and the \$5 and \$10 for purchase of a lot.

Ray Peterson became the chairman of the Cemetery and treasurer in 1944. He took the responsibility of seeing that the grass was mowed regularly and that other repairs were made. He took great pride in having the Cemetery grounds look nice. He also began sending out yearly letters asking a maintenance fee from each lot owner.

But the cost of straightening the markers, mowing the grass maintaining the road and general upkeep kept rising and the Cemetery's income was small. So in 1972 Ray initiated what had been his dream a Perpetual Care Fund. He worked long and hard encouraging the lot owners to pay the \$200 for perpetual care. He was successful. This money was placed in a Trust where the principal cannot be used, but the interest is available for maintaining the Cemetery. Through the Perpetual Care and the raising of the lot fees to the current \$100, Ray, Almost single-handedly, helped Sunnyside Cemetery become self supporting. He also provided for the upkeep which has resulted in the present excellent condition of the cemetery.

Ray T. Peterson died September 9, 1976. It is very appropriate that we dedicate the monument this Sunday as Memorial Day was the focal point of the year for Ray. We can be thankful for Ray's dream and his work in accomplishing that dream for Sunnyside Cemetery.

Asbury United Methodist Church Administrative Council Minutes

(Unapproved) Wednesday, October 25, 2022 6 pm

Chairperson David Taft called the meeting to order at 6:05. Members present were Dave Imler, Donna Lair, Wayne Mannes, Dan Tiedman, David Taft, Joyce Sherman, Daryl Sherman, Jill Nelson, Sue Bridges and Brad Grotewold. Prayer was given by Joyce.

Secretary's Report was given by Jill due to Donna not having a voice. Brad moved with Dave I. second to approve the minutes. Approved.

Treasurer's Report was given by Daryl. Apportionments are paid up to date. Balance as of today is \$23,900.73. Discussion of recycling. New parttime custodian salary is \$315.00/monthly. Sue moved with Jill second to approve report. Approved.

There was a discussion about computers being used for church business need to be updated. Brad will talk to NGT for sanctuary computer; Daryl will check with the conference for programs for the treasurer.

New Business

*Insurance discussion.

*Charge Conference report. Our Safe Haven policy needs to be reviewed and updated every 2 years.

*Cemetery Committee now has 501C status.

*Trustees report by Dave Imler.

Trees in front of the parsonage have been removed. They were both dead and the east tree was hollow with water standing in it. The trees are down, the stumps are gone, and the yard has dirt in it. The \$5,000 cost is covered from the Trustees savings account,

Parsonage information has been updated since the Congregational Meeting due to firm quotes were finally able to be obtained. Looked at the information from contractors, bids for moving the house, for tearing the house down or repairing it.

It cannot be used as a parsonage because it does not meet Conference standards and is not ADA equipped. It was recommended to remodel and rent it out.

Quotes submitted were Option #1 \$93,000 from Aaron Mannes; Quote #2 repair bad siding sections (City violation) \$350, replace roof \$13,831.81, replace all windows \$25,450, all new siding \$25,527. Bid #2 submitted by Young Construction.

The committee recommends repairing the siding, replace 2 doors and remodel upstairs bathroom for an estimated \$5,000 plus removal of upstairs carpets, cleaning of downstairs carpets and paint/refresh all walls by March 2023. Spring of 2023 goal of replacing roof, \$13,450. 2024-25 goal of replacing windows and siding, \$50,977.64.

Brad moved with Dave I, to accept the Trustee's proposal #2 to prepare to improve and prepare house for rental. Fundraising to be done to 2027. A hand vote was held with 5 voting for the motion, 3 against the motion and 2 abstaining from voting,

The meeting was adjourned at 7:56.


