Pastor's Message

Later this month we will begin the penitential season of Lent in preparation for Easter. In order to try and comprehend the magnitude of the atoning work of Christ Jesus on the cross, we will spend 40 days reflecting on our intentional brokenness and on-going rebellion.

In the narthex we have a banner that displays the Four Core Values of the North American Lutheran Church. A "core value" is intended to declare what is the most important underlying truth or reality that a person or group embraces. In practice, we have to acknowledge that they often function more like confessions that statements.

The first Core Value reads: The Holy Scriptures are the norm for all matters of our life and faith and the Lutheran Confessions are a faithful witness to the Scripture. The truth is that there can be a serious disconnect between what we say we value and what we actually value. We can make all the grandiose statements we want about how important God's Word is in our lives, but if we actually place our confidence and trust in other things, or let other things shape our lives and behaviors, then the slogans on banners become accusations and a reminder that we have indeed not loved God with our whole heart or our neighbors as ourselves!

May this Lenten season be a journey of repentance for us and may this first Core Value guide our confession. We confess that Christ Jesus, the Incarnate Word of God, and the Holy Scriptures have not been the model and standard for our life and faith. Forgive us, renew us, and lead us so that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways to the glory of your Holy Name.

February 23: Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna, martyr, died 156; Bartholomaeus Ziegenbalg, missionary to India, died 1719



Council Meeting Minutes

Mission in Christ Council January 19, 2021

The Mission in Christ council met on Tuesday, January 19, 2021 at 6:00 PM. Those present were Pastor Burkhalter, President Bill Green, VP Deron Hakert, Deb Ommen, David Gould and Terri Gould. Michelle Borrett was absent.

Bill called the meeting to order and led a devotion on Faith and Fear. He then presented the council with a handout outlining Robert's Rules of Order and asked the council to keep these in mind during the meeting.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read. One minor correction was made. Pastor moved to accept the minutes with the correction. Motion died for lack of second. Deb then moved to accept the minutes, striking the section under Other Business and replacing it with a short synopsis. Deron seconded the motion. Motion carried. Terri stated she felt the entire section was a disagreement among individuals and should be struck without adding anything. Terri then moved to amend by striking the section and not adding anything. Deron seconded. Motion carried with one nay.

Pastor then gave his written report. He has had 6 phone visits and 2 in person. Psalms study going well. He presided at one graveside service. Coming up on his schedule are February 2nd, STS regional meeting via zoom, February 17th, Ash Wednesday.

The written treasurer's report was then given as Michelle was unable to be present. Pastor was able to answer one question then Terri moved and Deron seconded a

motion to accept the treasurer's report. Motion carried. Offerings for December totaled \$9,700.00. Of this, \$960.00 went to the Building Fund and \$80.00 to the Memorial Fund leaving a General Fund amount of \$8,190.00. Expenses for the month totaled \$6,690.62 for a net gain of \$1,499.38. Additional offerings were the Christmas Eve offering for the local food pantry of \$210.00 and donations to Pastor's gift of \$260.00.

Under Old Business, Operation Christmas Child was on the agenda but since Michelle was not available with details, the council moved on.

Under New Business, Bill presented a code of conduct he felt would be helpful to remember as the council conducts its meetings. He went on to address the council with a reminder of Biblical problem solving as outlined in Matt. 18:15-17. He stated that friction in a small church like ours was especially harmful. Discussion was then held as to how each of the council members thought things were going at MIC. Ideas were shared concerning how to begin to heal.

Next, Bill asked if it would be possible to have giving compared to budget projections each month in the bulletin. Other ideas were shared. Bill then moved and Deron seconded a motion to have a quarterly giving report printed in the bulletin. Motion carried.

The council then moved on to the pandemic guidelines as appear on our Website. The printed guidelines were presented. Deron moved and Bill seconded a motion to change the wording, "Wearing face masks is expected throughout the entire worship service" to, "Wearing face masks is highly recommended and encouraged during worship services". Motion failed. Terri then moved to strike the first sentence (as above) but to leave "Masks will be available for use during the service and can be dropped off upon leaving." Deb seconded. Motion failed. Deron then moved to strike the passage and replace with, "Masks will be encouraged and available for use during services". Deb seconded. Motion carried.

Bill next presented the subject of goal setting and formulating a Mission Statement. All were encouraged to be thinking of ideas.

The Constitution was then discussed. Deb moved and Deron seconded a motion to have each new council member always receive a printed copy of the MIC constitution and bylaws. Motion carried.

Under Other Business, Bill recommended an article he had read by Martin Luther entitled, "Whether One May Flee From a Deadly Plague."

Having no other business Deron moved and David seconded a motion to adjourn. Motion carried.

The meeting concluded with a prayer from Bill and the Lord's Prayer.

- Q Pr. Gary, each year during Lent we refrain from using the word Alleluia to help us better grasp the significance of this shout of praise once Resurrection Sunday arrives. Are there any other symbolic things that the church has done with our liturgy for similar reasons?
- A Yes, in fact there are several. There is one that I will be implementing this year. Lent begins with the confession we make at the beginning of

the Ash Wednesday service. While we receive real, tangible forgiveness in the reception of the Body and Blood each week at the Lord's Supper ("given for you...shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sins"), it has been part of the Great tradition for centuries to omit the spoken words of absolution from the liturgy until Maundy Thursday! For this reason, we will this year hear the absolution for the last time on Sunday morning, February 14th (Valentine's



Day!), and then not again until the Service of Holy Communion on the eve of Maundy Thursday, April 1st.

Thus, in an effort to remind us of the penitential nature of the season and a fuller appreciation of the forgiveness we receive because of and through Christ's death and resurrection, during the Sundays of Lent, the liturgy of the mass will begin with the Invocation followed by the Processional Hymn and the Apostolic Greeting and not the Brief Order of Confession and Forgiveness.
