PASTOR'S CORNER

"I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God has been making it grow." 1 Corinthians 3:6

The fourth part of our church mission is, I believe, the one that undergirds the other three and makes them possible: to **grow** in Christ. Growth is an assumption of the Christian life, and fostering that growth is the purpose of any pastor, any Sunday School teacher, and any congregation. We do not begin our Christian walk fully grown, fully imbued with a mature faith and deep understanding of God. We do not start off knowing for sure how to respond to life with Christian love; we must develop that understanding over time and steady growth.

But we can choose to ignore the truth of this fourth area of mission in two distinct ways. First, we can neglect it. This is the approach that says that believing in Jesus is the end goal, the transaction we make with God: say some words, get baptized, and we are rewarded with eternal life. But Christian faith, true Christian faith, is more than a transaction. It's a relationship – and relationships grow over time. They become more involved, more fully realized, as time passes. Two people come to know each other more, and they start to become more like each other. This is what growing in Christ entails – and we neglect to our own detriment.

We can make a second error in approaching our growth as followers of Jesus: we can think that we're fully grown. The truth is, our walk with God is never fully done this side of death. We never fully understand Jesus, though we grow closer and closer to him over time. We never fully realize the full kingdom life until we pass into glory or Christ comes again. Paul himself, in 1 Corinthians 13, speaks of "seeing through a glass dimly." But if we assume we've "arrived" or "fully grown," we become conceited, arrogant, and unable to actually grow in Christian faith. We stagnate or even revert – and that has significant consequences for the other three areas of mission. We grow more disconnected from God, grow less caring towards one another, and disengage from the world.

This is something Paul understood. When he wrote to the Corinthian church, he saw a church that was, essentially, immature. Some people thought they were better than others, or more knowledgeable about the will of God. Others were divided over leaders, forming cliques that sniped at one another and wrestled for control. The well-off in the congregation looked down on the poor members. And Paul was dumbfounded – because the church thought it was healthy, it was vibrant, it was in the will of God. So in 1 Corinthians 3, he pulls few punches. He reminds them that God calls us to grow – and God causes us to grow. It is foundational to everything God would do through their church, and its foundational to everything God wants to do through Grace Hills, too.

The mission of the church is to **connect** with God, **care** for one another, and **engage** the world – but it cannot do it unless the church is committed to **grow** in Christ. May Grace Hills always keep this commitment at the foundation of all we do.
