

St. Augustine Lions 40th Seafood Festival March 25-26



The St. Augustine Lions Club is proud to announce the dates for the 40th Annual St. Augustine Lions Seafood Festival, which will be held at Francis Field March 25th-26th, 2023. The beloved festival is the primary fundraising event for the St. Augustine Lions Foundation each year since 1981 – generating funds for charitable needs and

services to the community, with a focus on youth, the deaf and the blind, disaster relief, veterans, and more. With more than 15,000 people expected to attend in 2023, the St. Augustine Lions Seafood Festival is currently the largest festival held in St. Augustine.

The primary draw of the festival is its abundance of great food and live music. There will be seafood offered, of course, with the addition of more cuisines and county fair dishes. Other fun activities include kids rides, family shows, and Arts & Crafts vendors.

"We're very excited to announce the dates for 2023," said Memory Hopkins, Festival Chairman. "After two years with no festivals due to COVID, then a failed attempt at a name change in 2022, we are back as the regionally wellknown St. Augustine Lions SEAFOOD FESTIVAL. This is the primary annual fundraiser for the club with 80 percent of the profits generated being distributed among St. Johns County non-profits, vision screening for school children, eye exams and glasses for those in need,

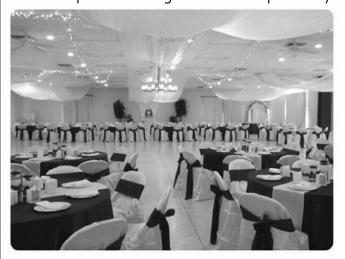

Can I do This?

As we move into Spring, many of us think about getting busy, becoming involved or making changes to our homes or yards. Before we dive in it may be wise to stop for a moment and check that we are permitted to do what we have planned. What rules do we need to comply with?

St. Augustine Shores is a "deed restricted" community which means that there are rules that we are required to follow. When the Shores community was first planned in the 1970s, deed restrictions were created to ensure that, over time, the area developed according to the original concept. These deed restrictions are comprehensive and are divided into 8 parts that conform to the 8 units that have been developed. They are then further subdivided into residential and commercial with some units also having sections for schools and churches

An Architectural Control Committee manual was developed from the deed restrictions to ensure that standards are maintained. If you are having a house built, planning changes to your house or wanting to erect a fence or shed, you may need a permit and should check with the Shores office. To complicate things a little further, there is also a St. John's County Ordinance (79-73) that is specific to the Shores that affects development in the area.

The deed restrictions, A.C.C. manual and county ordinance 79-73 are all available on the St. Augustine Shores website along with a host of other useful information.

There are a number of other county ordinances that affect our lives in many ways and they make interesting reading (if you enjoy reading these kind of documents!).

As a final thought, we are all subject to Florida Statues and these can be difficult to navigate – I guess that is why we have lawyers.

On the bright side, we don't live in the city. That would subject us to whole additional level of ordinances. Happy Reading.

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The Wildflower Meadow Group

Baker and Company did the annual mowing at the end of January and the worker carefully followed our directions, a good man. There were some things we asked him not to mow, like mully and fakahatchee grasses, fennel and blue curls. They provide vertical interest but, more importantly, they offer refuge for critters that are part of the eco system. In addition the remaining

seeds have more time to mature and spread across the meadow. Besides that, the "gone-byes" have a beauty of their own. Yes they do! The wildflower meadow is ready for spring; and though it looks mostly empty now, even eco systems need a rest between seasons and new life is beginning to grow underground. As I type this on February 15, I just came back from the meadow and saw the first spring flower of the season: a spiderwort. Spring is on the way.

I wasn't able to go to the wildflower meadow work day the first Saturday of February and asked those who were there to give me their reports.

Janet cut back branches from what she calls the "ugly" haw tree at the bottom of the meadow. I suspect she refers to it as ugly because its thrones scratched her rather severely, but the blossoms are beautiful. She cleared away most of the baby salt myrtles from under the tree where the

mower couldn't reach during the annual mowing. Marlene and Becky brought and spread some wildflower seeds and Russell removed invasive grasses from the railroad vine. He also trimmed some braches from the myrtle tree in the lower meadow. The last hurricane blew it to an angle and, by trimming back some branches, we hope the main trunk will have the strength to right the tree in time.

The group decided the yellow flower Judy noticed by the pier is a goldenrod and apparently the flower doesn't know this is the wrong time of year for it to bloom. (Maybe it knows more than we do?) The group also noticed the profusion of Carolina jessamine in full bloom among the trees outside the meadow at the edge of the woods. You see? It's not just what's in the meadow that matters to us.

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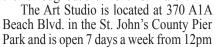
The March First Friday Lands on Friday, March 3rd. at 5pm to 8pm and Features Melodye Stimpel as well as a Brand New Member's Show.

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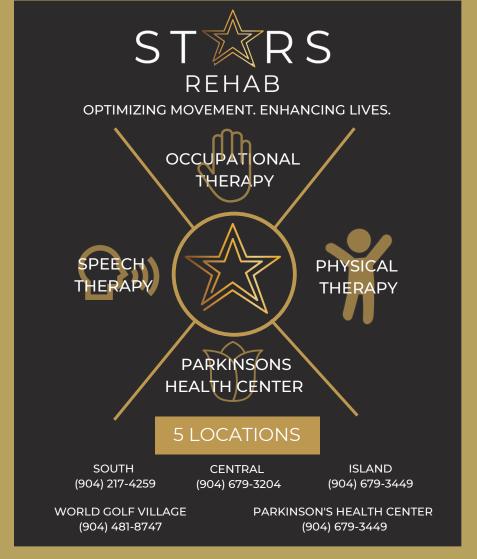


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Right Whale Sightings by Lorraine Thompson



One hundred thirty returnees and new volunteers attended the annual training session of the Marineland Right Whale Project held at the University of Florida's Whitney Laboratory in Marineland on January 3. The group included seasoned right whale watchers as well as novices, many of whom are, like the right whales, are seasonal visitors.

Four days later the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission reported the first North Atlantic right whale sightings of this season in local waters

Each year pregnant females migrate from the Bay of Fundy, Nova Scotia, and the Gulf of Maine to the coastal waters of the southeastern United States, their only known calving grounds.

Late in the day on Saturday, January 7th, Florida Fish and Wildlife Team reported another whale sighting just north of the St. Augustine Inlet. It was identified as Whale #3370, named Archipelago, a whale which has been seen in local waters in several previous seasons. The whale was again spotted late the next day, just north of the Crescent Beach Park walkover. This time Archipelago was traveling with her newborn calf.

Years ago, the Marineland Right Whale Watchers relied on an Air Cam to track the whales. It was a lightweight airplane that was designed for National Geographic to conduct wildlife surveys in Africa. It also had an open cockpit, and its design allowed the pilot and photographer unparalleled visibility. Unlike the earlier days, whale watchers now have the use of more modern equipment including a drone.

North Atlantic right whale facts— Identifying characteristics of right whales include callosities on the head; short stubby, black flippers; black tail on both sides; V-shaped blow; and no dorsal fin on its back.

Once a thriving species, less than 350 North Atlantic right whales are known to exist, making them the world's most endangered whales. Numbers are assigned to the whales as they are located and their identifying markings are photographed, mainly from the air.



Each year pregnant females migrate from the Bay of Fundy, Nova Scotia, and the Gulf of Maine to the coastal waters of the southeastern United States to give birth and nurse their young.

Females give birth every 3 to 5 years to a single calf after a 12 to 14 month gestation. Calves are completely dependent on their mothers for about one year. Right whales mature slowly, and females are typically 9 to 10 years old before they give birth to their first calf.

Reporting right whale sightings— Beach visitors as well as

beach residents, particularly those who reside in upper level buildings, who think they see a right whale in local waters, are asked to report the sighting by calling the U.S. Coast Guard on marine VHF Ch. 16, 877-WHALE-HELP (942-5343) or 888-97-WHALE (94253) which is maintained by the Marine Resources Council volunteer sighting network. Callers are asked to provide the accurate time and location (e.g., GPS) of the sighting and a description of the sighting (how many whales, etc.) For information on the Marineland project, visit https://marinelandrightwhale.blogspot.com/

Humor is a great way to approach some of these situations and now I have run out of room so, I will let the rest go and wish all of you, as always, a Sunshine State of Mind.

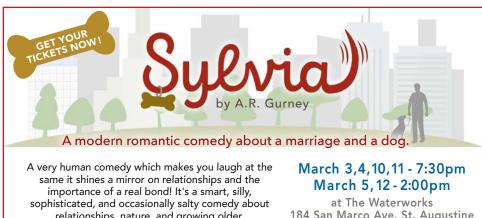
St. Augustine Travel Club

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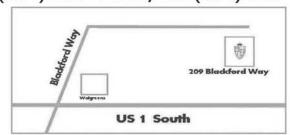
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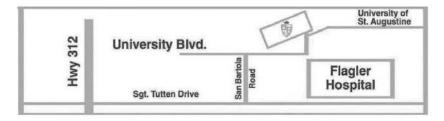
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150 Minutes

It's a new year, which often brings a pause, re-evaluation and plans for the months ahead. One of the areas where changes are planned is in health. There are plenty of infomercials for every type of exercise program imaginable vying for our attention: boxing, dancing, salsa, with equipment and without. When subscribing to new program can cause increased chances of injury during transitional periods such as New Year's, beginning of summer and significant birthdays as people look to make changes in their lives. The start of something completely new and unfamiliar without giving the body a chance to accommodate can often result in soreness, injury, and/or abandonment of the program itself. The end results are no life-style change at all and maybe disappointment. But, it doesn't have to be that difficult, traumatic or extreme.

A recent article in the British Journal of Sports Medicine showed a low-dose of moderate to vigorous physical activity may reduce mortality by 22% in adults over 60 years (Hupin D, et al. BJSM 2015;49:1262-67).

It is known that regular physical activity increases life expectancy and reduces all cause-mortality. The Physical Activity Guidelines Advisory Committee Report recommends a minimum of 150 min of moderate to vigorous activity. Exercise or Physical Activity can be measured using METs, or the Metabolic Equivalent of Task. Moderate exercise is the equivalent of a brisk walk, as if one was in somewhat of a hurry but chose not to run. Vigorous exercise would be the run, not a sprint, but a run. With the brisk walk on the low end and the run on the high end of what is required, this seems very doable for many, including those over 60 years of age.

Do the math. Sixty times 22% equals 13.2. That means one could reduce the mortality rate by 13.2 years. But that's not all. More importantly, when the rest of what is known about regular exercise is also considered, it could mean 13.2 years of improved mobility, strength, function and energy levels.

It seems our busy lives leave less and less time for exercise. But according to this study, 150 min per week, or 30 min a day for 5 day is sufficient to reduce mortality by 22% in adults over 60. The results would certain be the same for all ages. What the article does not say is whether the exercise time needs to be in 5 - 30 minute blocks, 7- 21 minute blocks or 15 – 10 minute blocks. Imagine if every time you visited the store you parked in the space furthest way instead of waiting for the closest and walked "briskly" to the door? What would happen if you "ran" to the mailbox instead of walking? Or strolled during the first part of your dog walk, allowing your dog to take care of business and then walked briskly on the return? You both would benefit. It's physical activity at the moderate level. Run, and it becomes vigorous.

Spend 1-2 weeks looking for opportunities where your activity level could increase with simple daily tasks and start there. Then, challenge yourself to try a few – parking lot, mail, dog-walk, shopping, etc, and see what happens. Don't do them all at first, just a few. Turn it into a contest with your spouse, friends, children or grandchildren. Keep it simple and fun. Before you know it, you could be adding years to your life.

St. Augustine Archaeological Association

In March 1939 teenagers LeRoy and William Stevens and their uncle Raymond McQuaig beached their boat on the shore of Coontie, or "Coony" island as some called it, to roast oysters and clams while fishing. Eroding from the sand bank and washing out of the beach were hundreds of exceptional and exotic stone artifacts. Others too soon went to the island to search for artifacts. Ultimately John Thompson and Harold Ryman, the island's owners purchased and traded to secure the artifacts.

Archaeologists took note and considered the collection unusual and exceptional, but little else was known about them or the site. In May 2022 archaeologists from Eastern Kentucky University and the Florida Public Archaeology Network – Northeast analyzed and documented the Coontie Island Collection, recording an abundance of data for every artifact and creating 3-D models for many. In this presentation, Dr. Jon Endonino will share the history of the collection, its contents, and the far-flung origins for many, revealing the interconnections among prehistoric Native Americans and the social networks that brought them to St. Augustine during the Late Archaic period 5600-4700 years ago.

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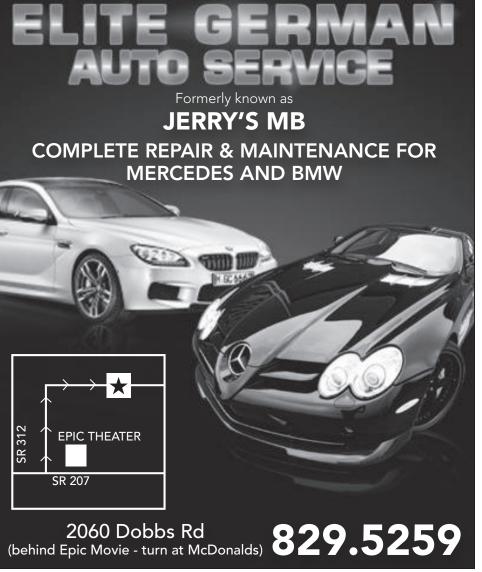
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Computer Corner

Don't call that number

These Fake Tech Support scams are computers? one of the worst things that I hear from my clients. They had a message on their computer telling them to call a phone number to fix some problem with their computer.

Below are a few ways to tell if you are about to be scammed by a notification on your computer. These are ALWAYS FAKE:

- 1. There is a Phone number shown in the notification, along with a plea for you to call immediately.
 - 2. You can't get rid of the notification.
- 3. There are sirens or someone speaking, and you can't stop it.

Here is what you should do if you see such a notification on your computer.

- 1. Hold the power button down for 5 seconds, then release it. This will force on a warning screen. They are ALWAYS the computer to shut down.
- 2. Then press the power button and start it up normally.
- 3. Once it is started, open Chrome, Firefox, Internet Explorer, or whichever browser you normally use.
- computer down again and call me.

5. If it does not, you are good to go. WHAT YOU SHOULD NEVER DO, IS CALL THE PHONE NUMBER.

So, what are these notices anyway? How do the scammers get them on our

Simply stated they are nothing more than a webpage pop-up notification with some fancy scripting to prevent you from closing them. They are generally the result of a hacked webpage or scammer advertisement placed on the webpage you went to.

Typically, you see these notices when you have a typo in a web address you entered. Many scammers buy website names that are typical typos for popular websites. As an example, I recently tried to go to my Medicare Advantage benefits web page, and I typed in the address incorrectly. BAM!!! I was on scammer website.

Bottom line:

NEVER call any phone number shown

If you are unsure about what you are seeing on your computer, call me or any tech that you know and trust. You can shut it down, but take a picture first!

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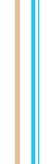


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
