"SIGN, SIGN, EVERYWHERE A SIGN"

Proverbs 3: 5-8:

The 5-man Electrical Band had a great song back in the 70's entitled "Signs", and the Chorus of this song went something like this, "Sign, sign, everywhere a sign, blocking out the scenery, break in my mind, do this, don't do that – Can't you read the sign?" My wife, Linda and I, love to drive around the back-roads of this great country of ours, because of the scenery and the slow-pace of travel – It gives us time to take in the beauty of God's creation in our world – So, on a beautiful, clear, sunny day this past June, Linda and I drove along a narrow, curvy road in the mountains of North Carolina. We were on a quest of finding several picturesque mountain waterfalls in the area, as the state highway we were driving on had an ominous sign posted saying, "Roadway ends – Proceed at your own risk!" Now, we were anticipating some off-road adventure on our quest, but the sign announcing the end of the road, put some apprehension and fear into our hearts and our situation. I gripped the steering wheel a little tighter, tapped the brakes to check their status, and slowed down to take the first curve as we entered a gravel-road. The next several miles were slow going, as the gravel-road was full of twists and turns and huge pot-holes! As we crept along at about 5 miles an hour, I wondered if we had bit off a little more than we could chew, especially since the gravel-road we were on was getting progressively worse the farther we traveled. Then, as we reached the summit of a large hill in the road, we heard it and saw it – a huge, beautiful waterfall – glittering in the sunlight as it was just ahead of us. We coasted downhill into a parking lot, where we could park, with an easy 5-minute walk to the summit of this spectacular mountain waterfall. And again, I thought of the sign which was posted warning everyone about the road ending and to proceed at your own risk, and I wondered how many people stopped right there and turned around to avoid possible danger? If they only would've pressed on just a few more miles, they would have seen the most spectacular waterfall in this area of the state. And then, more thoughts came to me about the other "Ominous" signs I had placed in my path which had spawned more fear in my life – "Life gets tougher after age 60!" "Why are there so many crazy things happening in our world today?" "What bad things will happen to me today?" Here I was, in one of the most beautiful places on earth, but my false, unfounded projection of doom and gloom was ruining this perfect moment – Damn sign I thought! You see, I don't need to be putting false, unfounded fear into my thoughts right now as I don't need those signs anyway! Jesus has given us the guidance we need – We too, must drop our signs and follow him! With Jesus by our side, we can go off any paved-road and find our way in spite of the gravel-road, pot holes, and hazards. With confidence in Jesus' love for us, we can find joy in our journey off the beaten-path! The most beautiful waterfall I had ever seen beckoned and waited for us that day. And, the only thing that could deter us was unfounded fear. Remember what Proverbs 3: 5-8: says to us? "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding: In all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight. Do not be wise in your own eyes; Fear the Lord and shun evil, as this will bring health to your body and nourishment to your bones!" Remember the chorus of the "Signs" song? "Sign, sign, everywhere a sign – block in out the scenery, break in my mind – do this, don't do that – Can't you read the sign?" In the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.....Amen!

Financial Update – July 31, 2022

The following is a summary of Hoge's 2022 financial activity through July. Detailed financial reports are available by request to the church office. - Hoge is supporting the new Westside Christian School for grades K-12 with a donation of \$1,500.00
- Second Community Church on the Hilltop is supporting Hoge's HM3 program by providing paper products and supplies for meals as well as the Personal Care Pantry; we are blessed to receive their partnership of missions in our community
- Many other projects are being evaluated so we can put them into process
