The Fire That Wouldn't Die

Three-Week-Old Blaze Rekindles to Again Torch Northeast Part of County

WARDA - After being extinguished for the second time Monday, the "fire that will not die" broke out again just after noon Wednesday on the Giese property near Warda which drew two units of the Winchester VFD and three units of the Texas Forest Service, one carrying a bulldozer, to respond to the stubborn blaze.

This is the same fire that burned several acres of land and destroyed an outbuilding on the Rick Peter's property on Piney Creek Road almost three weeks ago.

It sprang back to life for the second time Monday afternoon and burned a total of 37 acres of Peters, Walther and Giese land, according to Record correspondent Gladys Giese.

No one was injured in any of the fires, though people living in the area were warned of possible evacuations - though that was never needed.

Some locals in the area said they got important documents and things like family pictures ready just in case a quick departure was needed.

Several round bales of hay belonging to David Lehmann were burned in Monday's blaze, according to Peters' kinsman, Larry Faldyn.

La Grange **Unlucky on Casino Hall Grant Again**

City Likely to Pursue Scaled-**Back Renovation**

After months of waiting, La Grange city leaders have learned they were not selected to receive a \$1.5 million grant from the Texas Department of Transportation to renovate the old "Casino Hall" building adjacent to City Hall.

La Grange City manager Shawn Raborn said the bulk of the more than \$35 million the state was giving out went to the construction of walking trail projects statewide.

This is the second time in the last fours years the city has tried and failed to win a state grant to renovate the building.

The news, however, does not spell doom for the shuttered, and quickly deteriorating 132-yearold La Grange building.

"The council has money budgeted for this, and with council's blessing we can still move ahead with this, just in a scaled-back version," Raborn said. "I know the mayor is very much in favor of doing something and I think that's how the public feels as well."

The city has budgeted about \$1.5 million for the project, money that was to match the hoped for \$1.5 million in state funds, that now aren't coming.

But Raborn said now with no strings attached (that would go along with accepting that state money) local leaders would be more free to renovate the facility in a way they saw fit.

A Louisiana man was arrested early Sunday morning by Fayette County Deputy Garrett Durrenberger after he tried to throw away a cigarette pack


containing cocaine while being

Longtime Local Priest Remembered Fondly



Msgr. Stanislaus Joseph Petru, who died last week, had been a priest at three county churches in Hostyn, Plum and Cistern.

Msgr. Stanislaus Joseph Petru passed away on July 25, but his legacy of love and generosity to the church and others will always remain.

He was born on November 22, 1922 in Shiner to Frank and Johanna Velek Petru and into a family with 10 children (three of whom became priests - Rev. Augustine Petru, the late Rev. Msgr. Julius Petru and Msgr. Stanley J. Petru).

Rev. Msgr. Petru attended college at St. John's Seminary in San Antonio in 1937 and was ordained May 27, 1948 by the late Archbishop Robert E. Lucey. He celebrated his first mass in Raymondville at Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church on May 30, 1948.

"We called him the flying priest," said Deacon John McCourt of Holy Rosary Catholic Church in Hostyn.

Upon retirement, he moved the Oblate Madonna Resito dence in San Antonio where he passed away. He was buried in the Queen of the Holy Rosary Parish cemetery in Hostyn.

"He was very generous and he touched a lot of people's lives," Gina Kozelsky, parish secretary of Holy Rosary Catholic Church in Hostyn said.

After each mass at Hostyn and Plum, he enjoyed giving bulletins to his "bambinos." He personally donated his own money to Young Neighbors in Action and other organizations.

Memories of Tent Shows and The Circus

Part I of II

Not only can traumatic experiences remain a part of one's childhood memories, but also very exciting events can leave indelible imprints never to be forgotten. Flashbacks of memories of some of those exciting events for me go back to the late 1940s and early 1950s during a time when opportunities for children to travel or experience

anything outside of Fayette County were very limited. These memories are sketchy, because I was very young, so they may vary from those of others who were children during that era,

but they were significant enough for me to retain them for all of these years.

Dusting off the cobwebs in the recesses of my mind, I recall attending one or two tent shows that were set up, I believe, next to the old American Legion Hall on North Main Street in La Grange. These traveling entertainment shows were usually in each town for only two or three days. If I remember correctly, admission was 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

Here in La Grange, a stage was set up on the west end of the tent, and wooden benches filled the remainder of the tent with an aisle down the middle. These tent shows were sometimes called "minstrel shows", but in actuality, minstrel shows that were popular in the 19th century had declined in popularity by the beginning of the 20th century due to their racial overtones. The name was the only thing that was retained; the content of the shows had definitely changed. The original minstrel shows were based on African-American characters, first played by black actors and later by white actors in black makeup, reminiscent of Al Jolson. The content of the minstrel shows would be considered derogatory by today's standards. These shows eventually evolved into vaudeville and burlesque.

The tent shows that traveled around Texas during the 1930s -1950s actually were "Rep" (repertory) shows that revolved around a main act, which was a "repartee" between two characters known as an "interlocutor" and an "endman". The "interlocutor" usually was a 'straight man", who was well-dressed and who spoke in aristocratic English with a large vocabulary; the "endman" was depicted as ig-

Blinn Awarded Grant To Increase Adult Workforce Training Enrollment

Blinn College and the Region VI Education Service Center were recently awarded a \$325,000 grant from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) to help adult students acquire skills and certificates in highdemand occupations.

The Accelerate Texas grant is designed to increase the participation and success of adult basic education students in workforce training programs at community colleges and public technical institutions. According to Jobs for the Future, at least 60 percent of jobs in Texas will require a career certificate levels of career and job output at the end," said Hodde Center Director David Yeager.

Yeager said Blinn hopes to see 158 certificates awarded to participants in its manufacturing, professional office specialist and health profession courses over the next two years as a result of the partnership.

The grant will also help pay for personnel, new scholarships and supplies.

norant with a poor vocabulary, but who happily shared his stupidity. The humor of their exchanges came from the misunderstandings of the "endman". Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis were somewhat of an example of this type of "repartee". Additional entertainment was provided by clowns or other "buffoon" - type characters, who performed slapstick comedy with practical jokes, using props such as cream pies in faces, fake guns, cannons or fireworks. There were also song and dance routines, magicians, jugglers and a small band made up of a variety of instruments, including a trumpet, fiddle, banjo, drums and spoons, also called "bones". The "Rep" shows were the forerunners of comedy shows and "sit-coms" that began appearing on television in the 1950s, including "Red Skelton" and "I Love Lucy", and later the "Carol Burnett Show".

Shows varied from one "Rep" company to another, depending upon the available performers and their specific talents. Sometimes, ticket purchasers could vote for one of two or three local girls as the "prettiest girl" in the community. This was a gimmick to entice more people to attend, because family and friends wanted to vote for their favorite girl. The winner of the contest was promised a prize, which oftentimes was a "diamond" ring that may have been nothing more than a rhinestone set in an inexpensive metal ring. I recall that at the tent shows that I attended as a child, boxes of wrapped candy, similar to salt water taffy, were sold with the promise that some of the boxes, which cost as much as admission or even more, had coupons inside for prizes that could be claimed later. The prizes were often metal or chalk figurines or other trinkets.

The Nutrition program prepares and delivers an average of 1.200 meals a month in Favette County. Over 50 volunteers assist with the program throughout the year.

Unfortunately CCA only receives a portion of their funding from the Older Americans Act; the remainder must be raised through private donations.



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Just a Thought

Counting Change

Counting change seems to be a dying art. I remember saving my change as a little girl, then counting it out, rolling it, and taking it to the bank. Now people just take their money to a machine that counts it for them, and they often pay a fee for the machine to do it.

I learned many math skills counting out that money. I'd place my pennies in stacks of ten, my nickels in stacks of five, dimes in stacks of ten and quarters in stacks of four. I learned quickly how to count up the stacks of money, how much money went into each roll and the importance of neatness and accuracy in handling the money.

I didn't realize how much those money lessons had taught me until I started teaching. Asking the students how many quarters were in a dollar they could answer with no hesitation, but if I asked about nickels or dimes, many of them drew a blank. Wanting them to learn this, I worked on teaching it as part of basic math memorization.

I have had people ask me, "Why did you continue to make students memorize their math facts when a calculator can do it for them?" My answer, "A calculator is only as smart as its operator." The truth is, you have to understand how the problem works and what you are looking for. It's not just about an answer.

Counting change helps people with addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills. It also helps with fractions and decimals. It makes learning those facts easier. I was counting change and putting that money into stacks long before I knew how to multiply.

Counting change back seems to have disappeared as well. When I go to the store now, the checker types in the amount I have given and the machine tells how much change to give back. If that person types it in wrong, look out. It seems that many of them are incapable of determining how much change should actually be given based on the amount of money handed to him/her. I even try to make it easy by giving them the correct amount of coins so that I only receive bills back as change. I sometimes give the correct amount of pennies so that I do not receive any pennies in change back - that can blow their minds. It's not that they haven't learned it, it's that they don't have an opportunity to use it. Computers do all the work for them.

I know how it used to be done, I spent a summer working at a local grocery store. The customer gave me the money and often did exactly what I do - attempt to give the change in denominations so that the amount of change received was less coins and more bills. There was not a machine that told me how much change to give back, I had to determine that and I did so. I checked out at the end of the shift with the correct amount in my drawer.

Learning basic math facts, counting change and balancing your checkbook seem to be going by the wayside. Calculators and computers may be making our lives easier, but I fear they are contributing to the "dumbing down" of America. I hope that the future generations of children still know how to do things without them.

buy large quantities of stock in Nexen between July 1 and Sept. 30, 2012. The CFIUS approval was given January, 2013.



AUSTIN — As the end of a second, 30-day special session inched closer last week, the Texas House and Senate fell short of reaching a compromise on a path toward the future funding of transportation projects.

During that time span, however, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, who presides over the Senate, House Speaker Joe Straus and key lawmakers worked out strategies in back and forth messages, in hopes of bringing House Joint Resolution 2 and House Bill 16 to final votes on July 29 and 30, the last two days of the 30-day special session.

Gov. Rick Perry said he would call a third special session if the Legislature failed to act in accordance with his wishes, that is, to let voters decide via constitutional amendment if sizableyet-limited withdrawals from the state's \$12 billion Economic Stimulus (rainy day) Fund henceforth should be devoted to future transportation projects.

Wording for the Nov. 5 ballot measure — if approved by the Legislature as currently written - reads: "The constitutional amendment to provide for revenue from motor fuel taxes to be used solely for constructing, maintaining, and acquiring rights-of-way for certain public roadways and to provide for the transfer of certain general revenue to the economic stabilization fund and the available school fund.'

Take Note Race in America

When I sit down to write this column, I reflect upon the issues that have been discussed in the past couple of weeks. I allow my mind to wander to those issues that I have been thinking about or wrestling with since we last met. As I set my thoughts to paper (well, "virtual paper", since I type on a computer), I try to provide a different perspective on those issues than what I have read or heard in other places. I want readers to come away from my columns thinking about a common issue in a new way. It is my hope that, with exposure to a different way of thinking, folks on any side of an issue can begin to see things in a new light. Perhaps this can open a new dialog that helps bring people together.

In the past few weeks, there has been one very sensitive issue that has been in the news, discussed on Facebook, and bandied about talk radio and the blogosphere. Even President Obama has commented on this issue. However, for all of its popularity, it is a topic that most people are very uncomfortable bringing into the light of day. On July 19, President Obama spoke at a White House press briefing regarding some of his personal experiences with race in America. The President said, "There are very few African American men in this country who haven't had the experience of being followed when they were shopping in a department store. That includes me." Obama made these remarks because, as he put it, "I

Daring Young Texan on the Flying Trapeze

The unique and fascinating life of Vander Clyde ended where it started, his birthplace of Round Rock, when the celebrated star of the trapeze and high-wire died by his own hand on Aug. 5, 1973.

"The first time my mother took me to the circus in Austin, I knew I would be a performer," Clyde once said of the big-top experience that gave him his calling. "From then on, I'd work in the fields during the cottonpicking season to earn money in order to go to the circus as often as possible."

Hour after hour, the youngster practiced "walking" an imaginary high-wire on which his mother dried clothes in the backyard. Confident he was ready for the real thing, he answered an ad placed by the surviving half of an acrobatic duet called the "Alfaretta Sisters."

For a 14 year old boy, Clyde was exceptionally well-developed and coordinated. He aced the audition in San Antonio and agreed to fill the vacancy left by a recent death in the family in spite of his employer's unusual condition.

'She told me that women's clothes always make a wire act more impressive and asked me if I'd mind dressing as a girl. I didn't, and that's how it started."

After a successful apprenticeship as an Alfaretta, Clyde moved onto "Erford's Whirling

Sensation." In this one-trickpony of an act, he and two other performers hung by their teeth from a spinning contraption.

In 1919 Clyde soloed under the stage name "Barbette." "I do wire walking and perform on the trapeze and flying rings," the smooth-talking self-promoter never tired of explaining. "These feats are merely incidental to the surprise which is sprung at the end of the act."

Clyde's convincing female impersonation, complete with expensive gowns and feather headgear, had the audience believing he was indeed a woman. Then he suddenly shattered the illusion by removing his wig and striking body-builder poses that showed off his muscular and undeniably masculine physique.

Four years on the vaudeville circuit led to a European tour managed by the William Morris Agency. "Barbette" was a sensation wherever "she" went, but it was in Paris that Clyde's alter-ego attracted a devoted cult following.

The French frenzy was due in large part to the rave reviews of artist Jean Cocteau, who in a 1923 letter to a friend in Belgium wrote, "Next week in Brussels, you'll see a music-hall act called 'Barbette' that has been keeping me enthralled for a fortnight. The young American who does this wire and trapeze act is a great actor, an angel, and he has become a friend to all of us."



However, things did not go quite as well for Clyde in London. Supposedly caught in a "compromising position" with another man, an allegation never proved, his contract was cancelled and he was banned for life from England.

Clyde weathered the scandal with no serious damage to this career. He continued the "Barbette" masquerade in Europe and the United States, including regular appearances in the major cities of his native state.

Under the heading "Thrilling Acrobat," a reporter for the Dallas Morning News gushed in June 1927, "Barbette, who has rightly been termed 'a sensational European novelty,' opens with a gorgeous splash of color, emanating principally from the beautiful gown employed. For the first few moments it appears as though one were going to witness a style show, but once Barbette gets into action, all else is forgotten."

At the peak of his popularity, a fall, pneumonia, polio or a bizarre combination of the three brought about Clyde's unexpected retirement in 1938. He needed surgery and a year and a half of rehabilitation just to walk again, but there was not much the doctors could do for the constant pain.

On the bright side, Clyde's extraordinary talent did not go to waste. He worked as artistic director for Ringling Brothers and other circuses and choreographed several all-women trapeze acts. As a motion picture consultant, he supervised the circus scenes for "Till the Clouds Roll By" (1946) and "The Big Circus" (1959) and taught Jack Lemmon and Tony Curtis the finer points of female impersonation for the 1959 comedy "Some Like It Hot."

Orson Welles tapped Clyde's creative genius for the circus scenes in his Broadway musical "Around the World." Even Disney was willing to overlook his risqué past in exchange for the aerial ballet for "Disney on Parade" in the late 1960's.

Following a tour of Australia with the Disney road show, Vander Clyde wandered back to Round Rock not in a nostalgic return to his roots but to live with his sister. After more than three decades of intolerable pain, he took a fatal overdose of prescription pills in the summer of 1973.



Four days after the President's remark, occasional Republican Presidential candidate Patrick Buchanan wrote in his blog, "Why are white folks nervous about strange young black men in the neighborhood? Perhaps because they commit interracial muggings, robberies and rapes at 35 times the rate of whites." So, according to Buchanan, the racial profiling that Obama described is well-deserved because African American males commit a disproportionate number of crimes. Other media figures, including some African American males, have gone so far as to deny that the sort of profiling the President described even happens in modern America.

So, why does all of this matter? What is this different perspective that I mentioned at the top of the page? It is this: Racism is becoming an antiquated value in our country. As it dies, its adherents are going to be increasingly vocal. They will seek to justify their behavior and they will even deny its very existence. The best way to handle that is to bring racism out of the dark corners and into the light of day. As Obama concluded a few weeks ago, "we have to be vigilant and we have to work on these issues. And those of us in authority should be doing everything we



Dr. Neely's Neck and Back Notes

Arm and Neck Pain: Pinched Nerves in the Neck

The so called "pinched nerve" is usually caused by herniated discs or spurs in the neck that press upon the spinal nerves. Many names are used to describe the same problem and can cause confusion among patients. Slipped discs, spurs, bulging disc, ruptured discs, prolapsed discs, and herniated discs are names that can be used to describe the same medical problem.

Disc herniations usually cause pain in the neck, commonly described as a 'crick'. Some time thereafter, the pain is usually experienced under the shoulder blade and down the arm in the part of the arm that the nerve supplies. The pain is usually described as deep, aching, and sometimes throbbing. The pain may be accompanied by numbness or weakness in part of the arm or hand that the nerve supplies.

Treatment includes cervical traction, chiropractic, nerve root steroid injections, anti-inflammatory drugs, and physical therapy.

If the pain persists, or significant weakness of muscles of the arm occurs, surgery may be indicated.



Weather Whys: *Lightning*

Q: How hot can a lightning bolt be?

A: Hotter than you probably think, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "Scientists have done numerous experiments on this very subject," McRoberts explains, "and the air around a lightning bolt can reach as high as 55,000 degrees Fahrenheit. That's about five times hotter than the surface of the sun. That's why when the air gets that hot near a bolt of lightning, it expands faster than the speed of sound, and the expansion of the air into the cooler surrounding air creates a sonic shock wave - and that's thunder. And since these waves originate along the path of a lightning bolt, there are several of these shock waves one right after another, each at a different altitude. That's why thunder often seems to rumble."

Q: How many volts are in a lightning bolt?

A: One bolt can contain hundreds of millions of volts of electricity, McRoberts adds. "That's why lightning can be such a killer - it is extremely powerful. Between 1979 and 2008, an average of 58 U.S. residents were killed by lightning each year. Worldwide, there are about 2,000 thunderstorms at any given moment, causing 100 lightning strikes per second. It's been estimated that the Empire State Building in New York City is struck by lightning 50 to 100 times each year."



bales were missed by the first fire, after which he moved them some distance away. Problem was, he later brought them back to the original location and they were destroyed in the second blaze.

Fire Rekindles

The area is mostly pine trees although Giese said Wednesday that many of them are standing dead.

"We've lost most of our pines," she lamented.

The hot dry wind must have re-kindled the original blaze late Monday afternoon, although Peters reportedly said he had been out there earlier Monday afternoon and there was no smoke and the area around the fire had been bulldozed."

Giese said she toured the burned area Tuesday and Wednesday and "there are still some pretty hot spots with smoke coming up."

By Wednesday afternoon authorities weren't letting anyone get close to the blaze and thick plumes of smoke could be seen rising even from quite a distance from the fire.

That could include renovating the upstairs ballroom of the facility to its former glory for things like weddings and recitals.

Raborn said a new committee might be formed this fall to hammer out particulars for a renovation that could start in the Winter of 2014.

Waiting any longer could be a death blow to the building.

"If we don't fix it up, it becomes demolition by neglect," Raborn said.

The building, situated at the corner of Franklin and LaFayette Streets in La Grange, has certainly played a prominent role in the city's history.

Built in 1881, its original purpose was a theater and ballroom, but then served as the La Grange High School building until 1923.

From 1925 to 1992 it was the home of the La Grange Volunteer Fire Department and housed all La Grange city offices until 1965 when the new city hall was built. It also served as the local Senior Citizens Center after the new fire house was built across the street.

The building has been called the "Casino Hall" because it was originally built by the La Grange Casino Society.

friend of Rev. Msgr. Petru said. "Every parish he was in, he built something.'

During his administration, he helped remodel the church directory, build the pavilion, and remove the old school building.

A parish office/garage was built in 2003 and in 2007, construction began on an addition to the church building which includes a Chapel, narthex and handicapped restrooms which were approved by Bishop David Fellhauer on Nov. 23, 2008 as the parish celebrated the 60th anniversary of Ordination to the Priesthood of Rev. He will always be known for his love of roses, birds and Christmas lights. Other hobbies he enjoyed were golf, hunting, fishing, watching football (the Dallas Cowboys were his favorite team) and baseball. His favorite movie was The Sound of Music and his favorite scripture was "You are the light of the world."

"He loved to eat at the Golden Corral in San Antonio," Janda said. "Wherever we stopped to eat, we had to make sure there was ice cream served. Ice cream was his favorite. He also loved hot dogs, smothered liver, drumsticks, and fried okra."

Rev. Msgr. Petru was also an honorary life member of the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus #1095, Co-chaplain of Knights of Columbus Council #2574, Chaplain for the KJT and KJZT and served as Chaplain for the Holy Rosary ACTS

and most joyful experiences as a priest.

"Shortly after I was ordained, I was sent to visit a very sick man, who had not been to church for 20 years. My pastor told me he would probably not even open the door, but to try to visit him anyway. When I got there, he asked me my name and then asked if I was Frank Petru's son. When he found out I was. he told me that Frank was a good friend of his, so he let me in his house. I heard his confession and he received the sacraments,'

Pastor Rev. Daniel Kahlich, the current priest of Holy Rosary Catholic Church in Hostyn said he was inspired by Petru to go into the seminary. They were both in neighboring parishes in San Antonio together.

"He always maintained contact with his brother priests, especially during times of retreat as far as visiting them and always giving them encouragement," Rev. Daniel Kahlich said. "He was also very positive about things and forgiving."

Rev. Kahlich said he was able to organize the congregations and continue growth in the parish.

Doug Janda had a few stories to share about Rev. Msgr. Petru.

When he went to Seminary (about 14 years old) his dad took dropped him off at the front steps where he met a young boy there (former classmate). They were sitting there talking and all of a sudden started crying and eating apples. He was hoping and praying his dad would come back, but if he did come back he would have ran back to the truck and never came back to the seminary.

Another story is about when he was a 4H member, he raised chickens for a project and when

Deacon McCourt also recalled memories from working with Rev. Msgr. Petru.

McCourt said the very first mass I did in Hostyn, I went to him while his head was down to get a blessing. He looked up and jumped, looking startled and told him to get back. After mass he told him he had a professor in the seminary that had gray hair and dark black eyebrows just like Deacon McCourt.

"He had a great sense of humor, and you could always feel comfortable in his presence," McCourt said.

At church picnics he would always buy an animal from one of the farmers for the auction. McCourt said nobody could outbid him and that later on he would donate the animal back again.

He loved joining other priests on retreats and telling jokes during his sermons.

"He was loving, caring and faithful to the priesthood," Mc-Court said. "He loved being a priest and inspired a lot of people."

Stephanie Shroyer... Leaving an Impression in Concrete

nexpectedly, I first saw Stephanie Shroyer's wonderful cast concrete pieces at a Clear Lake Area Art Walk in December last year.

When I saw her name I asked her, jokingly, if she was one of the "Fayette County Shroyers" and to my surprise she answered "Yes!" I spent some time talking with her about her work. Her enthusiasm is infectious. And the pieces she creates are beautiful.

She captures forever in concrete the impressions of leaves though as



they have fallen on your pathway on a wet fall day, leaving a shadowy impression, their subtle color staining the concrete, reminding you always of that cool, damp day. The puzzle to me was how does one become a concrete artist? The name of her business tells it all: "c'ment2b"... a play on her feeling that it was "meant to be".

Stephanie began as a mosaic artist, an art she still teaches. As her life evolved, so did her art. A few years ago she moved into the caretaker's cottage on a large local property. The owner's father had worked with concrete, leaving his equipment behind. Stephanie discovered his cement mixer and began to experiment. Using the found concrete equipment, she explored new methods of mosaic application. Using the most unusual raw materials, she concreted her exercise ball. The plan was to cover it with mo-

saic, but the concrete process itself was intriguing. The plan for mosaic forgotten, she made some partial concrete balls. She experimented with different formulations of concrete, blending in special ingredients, eventually developing her own proprietary formula. She produced lots of experimental pieces, leaving some outside to fill with rain water much to the delight of the birds and her pets. Then when the pecan leaves fell on the wet concrete, they stained the bowls leaving a shadowy impression. Shroyer realized this was it, her inspiration. She began purposefully working with leaves, from her garden and others. Nicknamed the "leaf thief" by her friends, she gathered interesting specimens wherever she could, experimenting with different types and shapes, creating bowls, plates, birdbaths, wall art, fountains, even tableware. She experimented with different formulas and shades of concrete stain to create a natural look.

She describes the process as "sculpting with sand", in reverse. She has large sand tables where she mounds sand in the desired shape, then lays on the leaves, then the concrete. The concrete is thick, the consistency of clay. Stephanie presses it over the leaves and sand, creating the impression of the leaf in the inside surface of the concrete. After the concrete cures, she places the piece in water to continue the curing process. She pressure washes the remains of the leaves out of the concrete leaving behind just their impression. as though fossilized.

The vessels are stained with concrete stain and then sealed with a food-safe sealer. Larger pieces like the fountains and bird baths have layers fiberglass to stabilize the concrete.

Shroyer uses real leaves and plants to create her pieces. Each leaf is used only once, making each piece completely unique. Elephant ears are used to make dramatic pieces with heavy

veining. Leathery magnolia leaves are strong and difficult to mould the concrete around. The elusive rice paper plant took her two years to identify. It has multiple sprays of leaves described by some as "prehistoric" that make a beautiful pattern in the concrete. She has found only two places it grows locally.

When your art relies on fresh plants, the winter weather can be your enemy. A green house keeps her supply of plants alive throughout the winter. A second one is in the works. She is always looking for new leaves to inspire the next piece. Right now she is eagerly anticipating the arrival of three giant gunnera leaves from the Little and Lewis garden in Washington State. The much-photographed sculpture garden is a huge source of inspiration for Shroyer. And one can only imagine what she will create with the gigantic herbaceous gunnera leaves, some of which can be six feet across.

She continues to explore concrete as a medium, now teaching herself "faux bois," the art of creating wood in another medium. For Shroyer of course that medium is concrete. She carves the concrete using everything from dental tools to cat brushes to achieve the artistic imitation of wood. KNOW YOUR **RIGHTS!**

by Professor RICHARD ALDERMAN,

Q. I saw a dog riding in the back of a pick up. The truck hit a bump and the dog almost fell out. Is this legal? It seems very dangerous for the dog.

A. In my opinion, the practice of letting a dog ride in the bed of a pickup truck is very dangerous for the dog, but it probably is not illegal. Texas has laws regarding children under 18 riding in the back of a pickup truck, but no law regarding dogs.

Some cities, such as Dallas, have a city ordinance regarding animals in an open bed of a pick up, but there is no statewide law.

Q. Is a will valid if I write it myself? Does it have to be notarized? Are the wills I can order online valid? Do I have to use an attorney?

A. There is no requirement that an attorney prepare a will. In fact, in Texas, a will written completely in your handwriting and signed, is valid without the need for any witnesses. There also is no requirement that a will be notarized to be valid; although having the will notarized will make it much easier and less costly to probate. There also are many online services that will sell a Texas will for a very reasonable price.

Having said this, my advice is to have an attorney prepare your will and avoid any possible problems. Doing it yourself may save a few dollars, but a simple mistake will cost your loved ones substantially more, both in terms of money and time. Like the ad says, "pay me now or pay me later." It also does not have to cost much money to have an attorney prepare a will. Many attorneys will prepare a simple will for not much more than the online forms cost. I suggest you make some phone calls and shop around with local attorneys. My guess is you find one that charges what you believe is a reasonable price.

Q. I heard you offer a free copy of a living will? How do I get one? Does it have to be notarized to be valid?

A. A living will is the document you complete if you do not wish to be kept alive on life support after you have been diagnosed as terminal. For a free copy of a living will, just go to my website below and click on "Legal Topics," and then "Wills, living wills and powers of attorney." A living will, formally called an "Advanced Directive," does not have to be notarized, but must be signed by two witnesses. Quilt Guild's Gift

The Quilted Story project was overwhelmingly endorsed by the Guild members after a presentation to the Guild by a project leader from the Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild who, among many others, has adopted a quilt-literacy program within their community.

Quilts are made to compliment particular story books and are used in the reading of their partner books. The Guild provides these treasures in the hope of instilling a love of quilts as well as promoting literacy in our community.

Raabe, Guild project leader for Quilted Stories, will offer a short in-service training to each participating school prior to the school year. It is hoped that the books and quilts will be used extensively during the school year as well as in other educational settings.
