As the nights get colder coming inside from "Feeding Out" the next thing is what to have for dinner. The following recipe I make in the fry pan before I go out and just heat up when I get back in.

Easy Beef Dinner.

- 1 cup finely chopped onion
- 3 cloves garlic crushed
- 3tbsp/oil
- 1tbsp mild curry powder
- 500grm good quality steak mince
- 2 med potatoes peeled & diced
- 1 cup each of frozen peas & corn
- 2 tomatoes
- Pinch of salt
- Sweet Chilli Sauce(optional)

Method:

- Sauté the onions and garlic in butter/oil until onions are transparent then add the curry powder.
- Add the steak mince and brown with a wooden spoon breaking up the meat so it browns well.
- Stir in the rest of the ingredients and simmer covered for 25 minutes.

This meal goes down very well with a glass of Red (3). Another handy hint if you ever happen to spill red wine on carpet is to douse it in salt, leave overnight and to vacuum up the next day.

Well back out to the garden so that is all from me this time. Enjoy the colder days and nights.

AREA REPRESENTATIVE REPORT - KATHY DRAKE, WAIKATO UPPER NORTH ISLAND

We have had both extremes of weather in the last 12 months. A very wet winter followed by a very hot and extremely dry summer. Neither have been conducive to good grass supply for the winter we are just entering. Temperatures this summer were consistently in the high 20's, up to mid 30's day after day. We, and the ponies, spent the middle of the days inside—fortunately the ponies have large covered yards accessible from the paddocks, and they made the most of the darkest, coolest corners. The good news was that this weather produced a bumper hay crop for most, and prices for standard size bales are running around the \$12 mark at present. Unlike last winter, when supplies were so low, and demand so high, that the prices were reaching \$20-\$25 a bale! Hay was being shipped in from the Hawkes Bay and Northland just to keep up with the demand.

A small group of Shetlands have once again been out and about promoting the breed. The annual Auckland Highland Games at Ellerslie Racecourse once again saw a turnout of 9 Shetlands—or rather 8 Shetlands and one Shetland/Miniature horse cross. They always attract a large crowd of people. Some remember them from their childhood, others are fascinated to hear of their background and connection with the Highlands of Scotland. And others are just thrilled to be up and personal with ponies in the centre of Auckland City—sometimes it's their first encounter with a pony, and from very hesitant starts where they are scared to get too close in case they get bitten, they are soon with a bit of encouragement, patting a pony and reluctant to leave. Likewise, the ponies just love the interaction and are such wonderful little ambassadors for the breed. We made the most of our walkabout at lunchtime. With tartan rugs donned, we filed up and down the centre of the main parade ground, accompanied by the pipe bands. All ponies were so well behaved.

A couple of weeks later we had what has now become an annual fundraising day for a local primary school—the Christmas at Karaka market day. This time we had five ponies, all in Christmas costumes, and once again raised money by asking for a gold

coin donation from people to come and meet the ponies and have photos taken. Again it was a chance to talk Shetland ponies, provide City people with sometimes their first experience of touching a pony and it was lovely to slowly encourage people who were previously quite frightened of even something as small as a Shetland, to at first venture a hand and eventually see big smiles as they became brave enough to stand up close to a pony and have a family member record it on film! I am sure we have lots of new Shetland pony fans out there.

Thank you again to our Committee who do a wonderful, and sometimes thankless job, of keeping track of everyone and keeping the Shetland breed true and visible out there in the horse and pony community and beyond. Thank you to those who keep the Website and Facebook pages running and to Sarah for taking on the huge job of producing the Newsletter. And thank you to all those who contribute to the Newsletter—it is lovely to see what everyone is up to with their ponies. Communication is so important.

All the best for another 12 months of fun and adventure with these lovely wee characters.

P.S. Since preparing my Area Report for the year, Rod and I have now attended the Annual Meeting in Christchurch. Once again Southern Hospitality was to the fore with great outings, good company and more food than required! As usual we were well looked after and a lot of thought had gone into organising interesting and diverse outings for the two days of the AGM weekend. The weather played its part with warmer than usual temperatures for this time of year, and other than foggy evenings which required concentration driving after dark, and a hiccup for Rod and I who travel on retired staff subload tickets, which meant a 9 hour delay at Christchurch airport, watching I think on last count, 9 flights depart to Auckland before they were able to find seats for us, we are now looking at the weather Canterbury is experiencing today, and feel very lucky. The future of our Society looks extremely promising, when the winner of the Young Handler of the Year, Toby Harden, also went on to make a clean sweep of all classes he was eligible to enter, culminating in Shetland Pony of the Year with the beautiful Burravoe Zesbrie. HORSE OF THE YEAR SHOW 2019 Monday 11th to Tuesday 18th March.

Finally, the day arrived, and Nicola Grigg and her truck rolled in at 10am, along with helper, Bridget. It took over an hour for us to load all the gear, which I had pre-packed in bags, triple-checked the night before and had waiting in a huge pile in the stables. Each pony had their own gear bag, plus we had heaps of spare gear, summer sheets, waterproof covers, saddle blankets and numnahs, grooming kits, Steeplechase gear (Dress rugs, Racing saddle blankets, red lead ropes, jockey silks, Shetland vests for leaders) then there was the feed - chaff, speedy beet, feed supplements, first aid supplies, feed bins, water buckets, electric fencing gear, and so the list went on. And all this multiplied by 8. In retrospect, I don't know how we crammed it all in, but I do know it was often frustrating trying to locate items once we arrived. We were keen to take as much hay as possible seeing as it would cost \$15 a bale up north, but due to lack of space we only managed to ram 3 ½ bales into the truck and 3 in the van.

At 11.15am we loaded up the ponies and departed. Our first stop was Amberley where we met up with the van, full of 5 very excited children and 4 adults. Pre-ordered coffee and food awaited us (not that I am a coffee buff, but it was just what we needed). The remaining children and adults were either flying to Wellington then driving to Napier, or flying direct to Napier.

So, off we went again. Nicola's truck contains a vital piece of technology – a video camera – so we were able to monitor the ponies en-route and witness their antics. They were packed in snugly with no partitions between them so did get a bit warm at times. Foxy, Blue and Merlin spent a good part of the journey amusing themselves by trying to untie and bite each other, but the ones at the back – Burbury, Brocade (who we called Bee) and Basil, were the silent trouble makers who untied each other ever so quietly, and undetected, so they could mingle with the other ponies. So, an unscheduled stop was made in Cheviot to unload and sort them out.

The ponies thought this was a marvellous idea until we promptly reloaded them.

Our first official stop was the South Bay domain in Kaikoura where we spent an hour letting the ponies graze, 'forcing' them to drink, walking them around and just letting them chill.

We arrived at our Picton grazing at about 6pm. This property was 10 minutes south of Picton, and we had a small paddock for most of the team, and cattle yards for Blue and Ella as these two are prone to laminitis. There was plenty of space for the children to give the ponies a run around before settling them in for the night. They had yummy hard feeds, lots of hay, salt licks, clean water troughs and buckets, and also, we put electric standards and tape round the perimeter of the paddock (just in case – Shetlands being Shetlands). They also had electrolytes to encourage them to drink and help replace salts lost in transit. (Electrolytes were given after all the long-haul segments).

Our digs for the night was a holiday home in Waikawa Bay which slept 12 – perfect for us, though Nicola and Bridget opted to sleep in the truck that night and the entire trip. Nicola loves her truck bed, feels like she hasn't left home, and sleeps like a log (lucky her).





We were up early the next morning to organise children and ponies and get to the ferry terminal in plenty of time – just as well, as the truck got lost trying to find the truck vehicle entrance which was over the railway line and out of sight of the van. We had to advise staff that it was on its way, in case they refused to board us. Just as the van entered the bowels of the ship, the truck finally came in to view – phew. Vehicles carrying livestock are parked out on the open deck to ensure plenty of ventilation, so the ponies were comfortable with fresh air coming in through the open windows and vents.

With the reported incident of dog deaths on the ferry, due to lack of air, just two weeks prior to our trip, this was very much on our minds.

After a calm ferry crossing, it seemed to take forever to disembark in Wellington, but once on the road, we headed north via the Kapiti Coast. (On advice, we opted to travel on this route, but did travel via the Rimutakas on the return trip). Otaki Racecourse was our next off-loading point, where we stayed for well over an hour and the ponies really enjoyed the break and were quite lively - they must have smelt the racetrack and thought they were there for a practice. At this point, as we had plenty of manpower, we attached the signage to the truck so were very recognisable, and had to behave

ourselves, from that point onwards. In addition to huge signs on each side of the truck, we had one at the back, plus a massive poster which we attached to our yards at HOY.

Off we set again, slightly behind schedule. We decided the road signage was rather lacking on the outskirts of Palmerston North well, we were fine in the truck, but the van shot off in the wrong direction twice - thank goodness for cell phones so we could rein them in. As the Manawatu Gorge road is closed, we had specific instructions on the alternative route north of the Gorge. As luck would have it, that route was closed too, so we were sent round winding and hilly roads (heading south I might add) in the back

blocks which took forever, and 2 hours later it was little wonder that we could still see those wind farm turbines on the hills overlooking Palmerston North and felt like we had got nowhere fast. The trip was beginning to lose its appeal at about this time! Just on dusk, we finally pulled in to the ponies' accommodation and were greeted by our lovely host, Sharon, and her state of the art property. This was a perfect base, with lots of storage for our feed, a paddock with not much grass, another paddock with grass for supervised grazing, and outside lighting which, seeing it was dark by this stage, was an absolute must. It was getting late by the time we left there and headed to our accommodation at the Top 10 Holiday Park about 15 minutes away. As it was after office hours, we had to fossick around in the dark (this was fast becoming the norm) trying to locate our 3 units and find parking for the vehicles without running over campers in their tents. By the time we had ourselves sorted and had dinner, it is fair to say that we were all ready for bed.



The next day I decided we would leave the ponies in their paddocks so they could relax and get over their long journey without the hype of HOY all around them. In the daylight, we were delighted to see three HOY advertising posters on various intersections in Hastings, one of them featuring none other than Basil, the most photographed Shetland of all time. (Nicola 'borrowed' one of these signs in the dead of the night on our last day in Hastings). After an

hour with the ponies, we headed off to the showgrounds. Parking the truck and van each day was fun as everything was packed to



capacity and it was a case of squeezing in between trucks, encroaching on any privacy the occupants may have previously had. All horses are kept in yards, stables or off-site. There is no such thing as tying to your truck or float. We weren't able to park anywhere near our daytime yards which proved to be an absolute pain on Steeplechase day.

Parents and children spent this day and the next having a great look around and buying loads of bargains that they probably didn't really need, as you do. I spent much of the time fine-tuning race details and having meetings with the management. Forewarned is forearmed as they say, and I knew we would have our challenges, based on our HOY experiences in 2010. I won't bore you with too many details, but issues included their scheduling of our race to run in the dark!! (I told them that wasn't going to happen – and had stressed this prior to us leaving home, and they eventually brought our time forward 30 minutes). We had taken our pole jumps with us and were using the brush jumps made by HOY for us in 2010, but could we find them? Oh no. We knew they were on site in one of the many hunter rings at the back of the grounds but I couldn't find them. The following day we took the ponies in to the showgrounds, and in the evening, we rode around the massive grounds looking for these jumps in vain. In desperation we spotted some jump fillers of the right height in a very flash fenced off hunter arena, so we sent the ponies in to the ring under the tapes, removed fillers from one of the jumps and set them up for a quick practice. From out of nowhere, a lady came marching towards us with smoke coming out of her ears and she was less than impressed that we had borrowed her jumps from a Championship Title Class due to be run the following day. I assured her we would put them back in position and that our ponies were not entered in the class, to which she retorted "Well, that's obvious". Charming. I'm guessing she isn't one of our new Shetland Steeplechase followers on Facebook...

So, we put the unscathed jumps back in position, left the ring and headed to the main arena where we had a scheduled practice to familiarise ponies and riders with the surroundings. Five minutes later my phone rings and it was the Management woman telling me off and saying that they were now having to deal with 'Damage Control' (what!!!) as this jump's lady had complained about us. We did have a laugh about that. We learnt along the way that people at HOY are very precious about their property which they have to provide themselves as HOY doesn't. This was no more obvious to me than when I was trying to borrow some cones for the inside running of our track – couldn't beg, steal or borrow any for love nor money and finally had to settle for six big feed bins.

Steeplechase time arrived and we had some last-minute panics while were getting ready, as various bits and pieces had been left in the truck which was parked a 10-minute walk away. After a few heart palpitations, we arrived at the arena only to be told the programme was running half an hour late, so I phoned my Management contact and the phone went to voice mail. I left a message saying if we were not in the arena shortly, we would have to reassess the situation. I phoned again 5 minutes later – no response. Then out of the blue, we were being ushered in to the arena, as the Wilson Sisters had kindly swapped times with us. Kelly Wilson was our clerk of the course, and their crew helped us put out the jumps and set the course (no sign of our promised HOY men).

The crowd was massive, and I mean massive. The grandstand which seats 5,000 was packed to capacity, and they were 3 deep around the ringside. The oval was smaller than Canterbury so we opted to do 6 laps. All was going brilliantly until Blue had a freak gear failure resulting in his rider having one stirrup up near her ears and the other near ground level. She lasted a couple of laps then bailed out but Blue hadn't come all this way to retire, so he kept going head to head with Burbury for a couple of laps before ducking out that ever-inviting entrance gate, wiping Merlin out in the process. Well, the crowd just loved this turn of events and went ballistic – nothing like a bit of drama to get things stirred up. Both riders remounted and completed the last two laps with no further mishaps. Burbury was the eventual winner with Foxy in second place. The look on Ella's little rider's face when she finished

3rd was priceless – we didn't remind her of the carnage along the way that enabled her to finish in this position – some things are just best left unsaid. During the lap of honour, Basil's rider, Hannah, waved to the crowd, re-enacting the advertising poster, and the crowd erupted.

By the time we got back to the yards it was pitch dark (again) which made untacking the ponies and gathering up all the gear by torchlight a fairly challenging exercise. We literally stuffed everything in to the van which we had sneaked into the yards unnoticed, loaded up the ponies and headed for 'home'.

The next day, we cleaned all the gear and re-packed the truck, ready for an early morning getaway the following day. Children headed to Splash Planet then everyone went back to HOY to watch the Cross-Country phase of the 3* ODE.

This awesome trip was made possible by donations from many generous sponsors – Prydes NZ EasiFeeds (\$5,000), Sefton Riding Centre (truck transport and proceeds from Show Jumping days), Protranz (fuel for truck and van, plus cooked breakfast for 30 and pizza for 30), N.Z Shetland Pony Breeders' Society (\$1,250), Horse of the Year (\$1,000), North Canterbury Community College (free use of 12 seater van), N.Z. Thoroughbred Racing (\$500), MTF Finance Rangiora (polo tops for children), Apex Car Rental (free hire car Wellington to Hastings & return), Cash donations from Fiona & Tom Burrows & family, Diana & John Humphries, and Ann & Laurie Abernethy, PGG Wrightson Rangiora (feed and supplements), Sign Biz (truck signage & poster at cost), Screen Concepts (Printing of Polo Shirts and Caps and Ribbons for fundraiser), Karen & Terry Wilson (hay), and the Steeplechase parents for providing super cheap Picton accommodation, Picton grazing, hay and incidentals, organising and running 3 Show Jumping evenings and obtaining sponsorship for prizes and raffles.

To you all, I would like to say a massive thank you for your contributions big and small. Every little bit helped to fund our amazing trip to HOY, and it was wonderful that we had sufficient funds to cover all our costs (which incidentally were around \$14,000 all up!!) without parents having to dig deep into their pockets.
