Desolation and Gratitude

THANKSGIVING is coming! For Christians this usually prompts the question, "For what am I grateful this year?" In 2020—a year we'll remember (and probably not so fondly for sure!)—this question has a whole new meaning. As Thanksgiving, and the "holidays" in general approach, it's always a good time to do some soul searching. This year it's more important than ever, and paradoxically, it may be a year for which finding gratitude wont be so easy. The reasons for that are obvious and the list is long, so I won't bore you with a list of 2020...um, "difficulties" (I wanted to say "disasters!") about which you are already very aware!

So how <u>does</u> one find gratitude in a time of turmoil, struggle, and suffering? It is not easy, and at times probably feels downright impossible. This is especially true when the suffering and the struggles just seem to keep coming, piling one on top of another, no end in sight. "GRATEFUL!" you say??... "I'm lucky just to get out of bed some mornings and not immediately stick my head into a hole in the ground!"

Of course we have all heard the platitudes of people trying to help in times of struggle and disorientation...

- Don't worry, God never gives us more than we can handle.
- It'll be OK, time heals all wounds!
- Remember every cloud has a silver lining...Everything happens for a reason.
- When God closes a door, he opens a window.
- What doesn't kill us makes us stronger...This too shall pass.
- Everything always works out in the end.
- And my all-time favorite--If it happens it must be God's will!

Now, don't feel bad if you've ever said one of these, because I have used them too!—though I try more and more not to. The thing about platitudes is that they are not helpful, and can actually be hurtful, even when they contain a grain of truth (which some do!). They don't help the suffering; they are mainly offered to help the helpless feeling of those trying to help the suffering...which, in its own way, is a very agonizing form of suffering! In other words, we offer platitudes more for ourselves than anybody else, if we're being honest. So no, we <u>don't</u> find gratitude from platitude in times of pain, especially when that pain is desolating or dislocating/disorienting (totally life-changing).

And sometimes we don't even find it from scripture. We usually offer "helpful" scripture verses to people who are hurting as a kind of anchor—something to hold onto, something solid and immovable—when the world seems to be turning upside down or just plain blowing apart. But again, chiefly, it's when <u>our</u> world is threatened.

But here's the thing: sometimes our world—your world, my world—<u>does</u> turn upside down, and NO anchor is going to stop the shaking and the flipping and the blowing apart. This year, depending on who you are, and upon all of the life circumstances you carried with you into (or thrust upon you by) 2020, your world may <u>truly be</u> turning upside down and inside out. I can think of plenty of examples of people for whom this is definitely true...e.g., those affected by discrimination and social unrest, people who cannot pay their rent because Covid-19 took their job away, first responders and medical workers who are worked to a frazzle and have just seen too much suffering that they cannot take any more, people whose

businesses and livelihood were torched or looted in a riot, people who lost a loved one to the pandemic, people in the path of one (or two, or more) hurricanes and wildfires...the list goes on.

And even if you're still hanging on by a thread (hopefully one made of titanium alloy!), you can still feel the disorienting effect of pain and suffering, of so much rapid, ongoing change and trauma.

So... gratitude...Thanksgiving...Really????

Really...and there are several things that might just help (note: I say "might'!). Numbe ONE is humorsometimes it's either laugh or cry, ya know? We can usually find some humor in just about any situation, especially when we look at ourselves (not humor at the expense or mockery of others). Find a way to laugh, or at least find a wry smile, at your own expense, as you carve the turkey. Put some whipped cream from the pumpkin pie on your nose and make someone else laugh. It's infectious (more so even than a virus). Number TWO: honesty—with yourself and with others; tell yourself and others when you just cannot "take it anymore" and need to hide or be alone. It's OK to do that. It's OK not to be festive and not to celebrate, if that feels out of reach...and it's OK to let that be known, no matter what anybody tells you. Number THREE: reflect / contemplate, what's really behind my pain? How "hurt" am I? Do I feel utterly lost? Am I truly disoriented, truly trudging through a desolate wasteland?...or just temporarily knocked out of whack or offcenter? Do I need some help, or do I still have at least one foot on the ground? Sit with your pain and try to see it a little objectively, from the "outside" (which is very different than dwelling upon it). Try to learn from it. Pain is almost always a reliable (if unpleasant) teacher. And, accept this: understanding may not lessen the pain much, but it can help make it a little more bearable. Number FOUR: be compassionate...i.e, in your own suffering, try sharing in the pain of some else who's hurting...not so much to lessen yours, but to hear and understand theirs. Why? Because healing happens most reliably in community...God has just made us that way. So give at least a little of yourself away (but only if you can). Give a little of yourself, your funny bone, your honesty, your listening (instead of platitudes). Together, some healing will very probably happen. And Number FIVE (probably number one, really): **TRUST**. Trust God, even when trust is hard, or when it seems impossible. And don't think it has to be "holy" or all wrapped up in a pretty "presentable" prayer package with a neat little ribbon. It probably won't be, and if it is, you likely forgot or skipped #2. That trust might sound like a prayer...but just (or more) likely it will sound like a cry, a SOB, a deep sigh, a shout of anger, even a cuss word or two (or three)...or it'll sound like a plea, for mercy, for help, for guidance, for RELIEF... for love, for PRESENCE. It may even be wordless, soundless, and come in broad daylight, or in the depths of the night. Trust God, even when ever fiber of your being says not to ... even when your soul is screaming "My God, MY GOD...WHY have your FORGOTTEN me??" And if those words sound familiar, they are the words Jesus croaked out—probably in a barely discernible, pain-soaked whisper—from his cross, in the midst of his own most UTTER desolation.

And we know how that turned out...and what God did with it!

Trust God...because only God is bigger than 2020...bigger than our trials and suffering, and present ALWAYS WITHIN those trials and our suffering. Even when that suffering is unto death, or those trials seem unending, God is there, closer than our breath, WITHIN our breath, and carrying us to the next moment, the next laugh, the next cry, the next defeat...and perhaps the next victory, Nothing else is promised, except PRESENCE.

And if you understand what divinity really is, and what God's love is really like...well...then that's enough. Ya know?


SPECIAL THANK YOU TO OUR PASTORS Joan Allen and Barry Bordenkircher

The Scouts have been meeting both in person and virtually. It is a challenging time for us to continue moving forward, as it is with so many things.




