





ARPA

Huh? What does ARPA stand for, you ask. Is it Alligators Read Public Announcements, Amorous Rabbits and Porcupines Abstain or Apples Rhubarb Prunes Apricots? What? No, none of the aforementioned. The initials mean the American Rescue Plan Act, which was passed by Congress in early 2021 for Covid-19 relief. It appropriates \$1.9 trillion for such purposes as financial aid to students, low-income renters, the unemployed and childcare assistance with \$130.2 billion earmarked for states and local governments. Based on its 2020 population, our fair City is to receive \$3,507,979.

Over \$3.5 million for a city with an annual budget of about \$15 million is quite a sum. The question then naturally follows: For what purposes can it be spent?

As local government officials have learned bitterly in the past when spending federal dollars, there are strings attached to them. Any use of the money for "unstrung" purposes can subject the governments to rude surprises when the federal bureaucrats later demand, usually after the money has been spent, that it be returned to Washington. So, caution and careful planning are the guiding words for these ARPA times.

Fortunately, the final guidelines from the U.S. Treasury Department give local governments time to spend their ARPA allocation. By December 31, 2024, the money must be earmarked or reserved for allowable uses and by the end of December 2026 it must be spent. Equally as fortunate, the Treasury guidelines are very clear as to what ARPA funds cannot be spent on,



such as to lower taxes, pay debt, build up the City's financial reserves and provide match money for other federal grants; and cities are discouraged from using ARPA money for recurring costs. Otherwise, the allowable uses of the money are truly flexible. Things really don't get much better in the federal grant world.

To decide on what to spend the \$3.5plus million, the City Commission requested that you, Mr. and Ms. Cifizen, tell them what you think are the best uses of the ARPA money. The City posted on Survey Monkey a list of significant, one-time projects and a request that you choose the ones you think are worthy of ARPA funding. Here's the list: improve beach walkovers, improve parking, increase parking, improve City parks and parkettes, repair roads, drainage projects, add sidewalks, put utilities underground, restore old city hall, add eco-friendly projects. The deadline for you to give us your preferences was April 15th.

The City Commission held a meeting on April 19th to review the survey results and decide what projects to fund. Because of the April 15th deadline for submission of this article to this fine newspaper, I will report on the meeting next month. I can report that by April 12th, the City had received 117 responses and the six most requested projects are repair of roads, drainage projects, undergrounding utilities, improve beach walkovers, improve City parks and improve parking. It'll be interesting to see what the Commission decides on April 19th. Stay tuned.










A Classic Theatre (ACT) will be presenting their final show of this season, The Immigrant by Mark Harelik, in the Ancient City's newly renovated and re-opened Waterworks building. Built in 1898, the red brick building served as the original pumping station until 1926 when a new facility was constructed. Two years after closing in 1928 The Waterworks was converted into a community center and was used by the Little Theater of St. Augustine as well as other community groups.

The newly rehabilitated structure, which was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2014, has now come full circle to be used once more as a community center and theater managed by the St. Johns Cultural Council. ACT was incorporated with the State of Florida in March of 2007 by founder Jean Rahner with the mission to produce classical, historical and original plays for the St. Augustine community. She served as president until her retirement in August of 2017.

Since then, with post-pandemic reorganization and a new Board of Directors, ACT aspires to evolve and grow, while still adhering to the principles of quality theater set by the founders.

ACT Artistic Director Cindy Alexander noted "ACT has traditionally been a nomadic theater company, performing in many local venues over the years. It is with great pleasure that we enter into this partnership with the St Johns Cultural Council and continue the theatrical tradition on this historic stage. We look forward to providing quality productions to our community for years to come."

Is DN new?

No, DN is not new. It has been growing in popularity since the 1960's when Janet Travell, MD coined the term Myofascial Pain Syndrome and used it to treat myofascial trigger points. It has been utilized for years by European physical therapists, which was my first exposure and was first approved in 1984 for use by

US/Maryland physical therapists. First Coast Rehabilitation (FCR) therapists have been teaching DN nationally and internationally since 2010, were approved in 2017 by the state PT Board to use in 2017, testified before the FL PT Board on behalf of all FL PT's, which was approved in 2020, and have since trained many others in St. Augustine, Florida and across the nation (see myopainseminars.com).

Why utilize DN?

The benefit of DN is multifactorial and rooted in pain science research. At its root, a trigger point, or hyper-irritable nodule within a taut band of muscle, more answers or call if you don't find an develops when the muscle is overloaded. This can happen in several ways, but poor posture or unaccustomed activities are two primaries. When this happens, the basic contractile elements of the muscle lock up, causing compression of the 2010 both nationally and internationally vascularity, thereby depriving the tissues of oxygen, resulting in tissue damage and the release of noxious (pain stimulating) chemicals = pain.

When treating the trigger point with DN, a twitch response is elicited, which is protective response to the stimuli via *Myofascial Manipulation: Theory &* a spinal reflex loop. The "twitch" is *Application, 3rd ed by Proed Inc.* an indication the trigger point has been treated and the noxious stimuli have been flushed out. It may leave some muscle soreness but can result in an immediate

I have written on Dry Needling (DN) analgesic effect, increase motion, strength and function. And because no medication is involved, there are not medicinal sideeffects.

What kind of problems can be treated with DN?

Almost anyone. It can help with nearly all types of headaches, Ehlers-Danlos syndrome, shoulder, neck, back, hip, leg, foot, and hand pain, where trigger points are involved. TMJ, jaw pain, and ringing of the ears caused by trigger points can also be treated. It can be used for orthopaedic and neurological problems where pain, muscle inhibition and loss of range of motion are a result of trigger points. It can also be used to treat scar tissue, pelvic pain and more.

Is it safe?

Yes. All needles are sterile. In a 2013 multi-site study in Ireland, which included 39 PT's in nearly 8,000 treatments, proved with proper training and practice, DN is safe. (Therapist at FCR have been trained in the same techniques used in this study.) The major side effects were soreness, fatigue, an occasional bruising.

There are many more questions but limited space. What to do after treatment? How may session will it require? Once the trigger points are treated, are they gone forever?

Lately, my clients tell me that their home phone rings many times a day with scam calls. They always seem to start off with a greeting that sounds like the title of this article, then they go on to say that they have detected some sort of issue. They need to fix it right now.

The State of affairs with Scam Support calls is so bad that now a significant part of my business is dealing with the aftermath of someone being scammed after giving remote access to their computer.

Another common call is the Refund scam, in which folks get a call stating that you are owed a refund, and they can help make sure that you get that as soon as possible. All they need is access to your computer. (big red flags should be going

The common thread on most of the phone scams and computer support popup scams is that all important and immediate need to have access to your computer. Anyone that requests access to your computer should be treated with the utmost caution

If I were to ask you for access, and you have never met me, or have not looked me in the eye, you should definitely NOT grant me remote access. Going beyond



this is the idea that If you know me, and someone says that they work for me, or are my representative, you still should NOT grant access.


The problem with someone calling you and claiming to be with Microsoft, Apple, Amazon, or whatever company they may say, is that you have no way to prove they are telling the truth. They may know enough about you to convince you that they are really from whatever company being named.

When someone that called you asks you to go to your computer and go to a website, or "type these words" or "click this link in the email", your default answer should be to hang up the phone. Don't say another word, simply hang up.

Hang up the phone if someone calls and starts off with anything that sounds like "I'm with support", because it's a scam


