They remind me of a fiery shepherd boy full of faith, who chose five smooth stones to slay the giant, Goliath. God had His hand on David to become a mighty warrior on and off the battlefield. - Homemade Clay: 2 cups flour, 1 cup salt, 4 t cream of tartar,

- Large shirt box for clay diorama (9 x 11)
- Acrylic paints (all colors) to paint clay diorama figures and acrylic paints in army greens, tan, and brown for tank marble painting
- Cotton balls for tree tops
- White paper to draw illustrations
- White paper to use in painting
- Camouflage colored construction paper for marble tank craft

LESSON 1 CREATE A SOLDIER CHARACTER

Your main character is called the protagonist. Developing him will take some time and thought.

Don't be surprised if after you start this writing curriculum that ideas come to you about your character all throughout your day. Keep a special battle notebook handy that you can write your ideas in so you don't forget them. When you are ready for writing time, you can retrieve your notebook and add in your new ideas. Some professional writers say it takes them months to develop their characters, but we will not take that long!

A good story will help the protagonist to grow in character. In order to do this, give your characters weaknesses. If he starts out selfish, give him opportunities to be selfless. If he is fearful, give him a situation where he must face his fears to save someone else and be brave. Think about your own life and the lives of the people you know. That will give you ideas. Your characters can learn to trust God on the battlefield for protection, wisdom and strategy. Of all the places on earth, most soldiers rely on God's help once in combat. They realize He watches over all battles of all men.





"BOOT CAMP" B.C.T. - BASIC COMBAT TRAINING

It changes every soldier's life — Boot Camp! B.C.T. is usually for ten weeks; twelve hour days. It's hard, grueling work but it makes soldiers out of ordinary men molding them for the battle field. Every soldier starts out in



B.C.T. where they are trained to handle the rigors of combat. They will:

Learn to trust their leadership

Learn how to take orders

Learn how to march in ranks

Learn team building and how to overcome obstacles

Learn how to handle weapons and artillery

Learn how to stay in top physical condition

Learn how to discipline their bodies to sleep less, eat less, and endure hardships

Learn battle strategies

Learn how to stay calm in difficult conditions

Learn basic first aid and combat life saving

Learn to adapt to hard situations and move on!

Many soldiers will give credit to their Boot Camp Drill Sergeant for their lives being saved during battle. The men that your character starts basic training with are the same guys he will be in combat with later.








Read through all the instructions before you begin setting up to make sure you have all the items you need.

- Tie a **flag** or handkerchief near the beginning of the course
- Begin by hopping up with both feet 10 steps
- Crawl through 3-4 lawn chairs
- Stand up and do 5 jumping jacks
- Lay a **rope** on the ground and hop with one foot on one side then another all the way down to the end of the rope.
- Lay on the ground and do 5 sit ups
- Stand up and throw 10 small plastic balls into a bucket 5-7 feet away or shoot a target
- Do 5 more jumping jacks
- Run over to the lawn chairs and crawl back through to the other side
- Capture the flag!
