Prayers for Lent

The Stations of the Cross (traditional form)

The Stations of the Cross are often called The Way of the Cross (via Crucis) and the form that we have them today with their 14 stations or stopping places originated in Spain in the first part of the 17th century, and the devotion was very popular among Franciscan communities. Prior to this time the Way of the Cross was commemorated as far back as the 13th century when St Bernard of Clairvaux, St Boniface and St Francis of Assisi first laid down a form of via Crucis.

An opening prayer is used and then as we announce each Station the verse "We adore you O Christ" is said followed by a short meditation and prayer. Silence can also be kept. In between each Station there can be silence, or a verse from a suitable hymn can be sung or said. Verses from the Stabat Mater (At the Cross her station keeping) are often used. At the conclusion of the Stations, there is a closing prayer and it is traditional to offer prayers for the intentions of the Holy Father.

We adore you O Christ, and we praise you, because by your holy Cross, you have redeemed the world.

I love you Jesus my love above all things

I repent with my whole heart for having offended you.

Never to permit me to separate myself from you again.


Grant that I may love you always And then do with me what you will.


Jesus is condemned to death

The Cross is laid upon Simon of Cyrene




Veronica wipes the face of Jesus

The women of Jerusalem mourn for our Lord






Jesus is nailed to the Cross
