

RULES OF THE RENDEZVOUS

- 1. All clothing, lodges and accouterments must be pre-1840. Absolutely no modern footwear or sunglasses of any kind, unless medically required. (doctors documentation must be available) Period eye wear is encouraged for those wearing glasses. Period attire is required at all times starting March 13th including setup and tear down.
- 2. All modern items (coolers, bottles, cans, plastic, etc.) must be kept out of sight at all times.
- 3. NO Vehicles in Long term camp from 6:00PM Friday March 13th. Until 7:30AM Sunday March 22nd. GATE HOURS WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED, excepting for emergencies. There will be a one hour time limit for loading and unloading from 6:00PM Friday March 13th. Until 7:30AM Sunday March 22nd.
- 4. Opening ceremony will be Friday March 13th at 5:00PM Period dress is required. NO vehicles allowed through gate during ceremonies.
- 5. Fires must be contained in a pit and attended at all times. A minimum of 2 gallons of water in an open period type container must be kept within 5 feet of fire pit at all times for fire control. No cutting of live trees or brush. Fill and level your fire pit before leaving and do not bury trash or partially burned wood. If you do not know how to remove sod and replace it for digging fire pit ask someone.
- 6. Horses, Mules and Oxen are permitted. Current Health and Negative Coggins Certifications will be required before unloading. There will be a separate area for camping with live stock under supervision of Horse-Camp Captain. Dogs, cats and other critters are welcome and must be one leash and under control at all times. All animals required to be attended to in a safe and healthy manner. Any animal that becomes a nuisance (runs lose, bites, barks or howls extensively, or in any other way disturbs others) shall be required to leave camp and or rendezvous (Head Dogsoldier has final say). ALL animal waste must be cleaned up by owner well enough for children and bare-feet. IF your animal is spooky, jumpy, or afraid of loud or strange noises LEAVE IT AT HOME.
- 7. Artillery will be permitted in designated areas only and must be inspected by Range Captain before it can be loaded. Range Captain must be present when firing.
- 8. The safety and conduct of all children under 18 are the responsibly of parent(s) or responsible adult with which they are camped with ANY use of fire arms. Knives, hawks, axes, or any other weapon or tool must be under direct adult supervision. Hearing and eye protection is recommended and may be required on firing ranges.
- 9. Medical consideration can be made for flammable liquids and gases, but, must have doctors documentation available.
- 10. A modern camping area will be available in parking area for non-period camping with no facilities provided.
- 11. Ice will be available for purchase daily. You must have period covering to transport thru camp. A trash dumpster will be provided and you are responsible for transporting trash to dumpster and must be in a plastic bag and in period cover for transport. No trash will be burned or buried in camp. Clean up camp and remove ALL litter including cigarette butts and gum wrappers. Please preserve our reputation and yours by keeping a neat and clean camp and leave it better than you found it.
- 12. Photography equipment must be covered when not in use. ABSOLUTELY NO FLASH PHOTOGRAPHY!
- 13. Your registration fees entitle you to entrance into all events, seminars, competitions, and camp feast.

 Preregistration ends February 21st 2015. All preregistrations received after that date will be returned and you will have to register at the gate.
- 14. Absolutely no modern firearms for sale or trade anywhere at rendezvous. Absolutely No throwing of knives, hawks, spears, rocks; shooting arrows; use of bull whips; loaded, primed or caped firearms in camp. No smoking or intoxicants on or near ranges. All decisions made by Range Captain including scoring, conduct and safety is FINAL. Hearing and eye protection recommended.
- 15. Infraction of camp rules may result in eviction from rendezvous and forfeiture of all fees,
- 16. All questions regarding camp rules should be directed to the Head Dogsoldier.
- 17. Public visitors will be welcome from 9:00AM till 4:00PM on March 14, 15 and 21. School day 8:30AM till 3:00 PM Friday March 20.
- 18. Closing ceremony will be Saturday March 21st at 5:00PM. Period dress required. Vehicles allowed in after 7:30AM Sunday March 22nd
- 19. Cell phones must be off or on vibrate. Limit use of phones to your sleeping area, vehicles or other areas out of sight and sound of others.
- 20. ZERO TOLERANCE of illegal activities. Thievery, fighting, use of illegal substances of any kind will not be tolerated. Violators will be turned over to the law enforcement agency of jurisdiction. The unlicensed sale, trade or barter of alcohol is prohibited by the State and these rules.



St. Valentine-The Real Story

St. Valentine's Day is not and never was a religious holiday. It has historical roots mainly in Greco-Roman fertility rites. Young men of the day would sacrifice a goat and a dog and go about town whipping young women with the hides. The women would line up thinking this would make them fertile.

I have read several articles about the man or men by the name of Valentine. Most agree he was a Roman Catholic Priest that defied a Roman Emperor. For this he was tortured and executed on February 14th.

At this time in Roman history Claudius II persecuted the Church. He had an edict prohibiting the marriage of young people claiming an unmarried man made a better soldier. He actually liked Valentine and would spend hours speaking with him trying to convert him to paganism. Likewise, Valentine would try to convert the emperor to Christianity. This was his mistake.

In secret this priest would defy Roman law by marrying the young couples. In the year 296, he was caught and sentenced to a three-part execution.

Legend says while he was imprisoned he healed the blind daughter of his jailor, Asterius. Asterius and all of his house became Christians after this miracle. In a last letter to the daughter, he signed it, 'from your Valentine."

Whitefriars Street Church in Dublin, Ireland is one of the three churches claiming to have St. Valentine's remains.

At the end of the 5th century Pope Gelasius I declared February 14th to be St. Valentine's Day and later Chaucer and Shakespeare help to seal the deal in references to the day in their works.

In 1969, the Roman Catholic Church removed the holiday from the General Roman Calendar. This holiday is celebrated all over the world and on different days of the year.

The history of exchanging cards and other tokens of love on this day began to develop in England and France in the 14th and 15th century. So on this Valentine's Day please remember the priest who gave up his life to perform the sacrament of marriage: for love of love and the love of God.

I'm not sure how 'time-period' correct this following recipe is but I have made it several times and it is very good. These heart shaped scones will make a wonderful breakfast for your Valentine. They can also be enjoyed with afternoon tea and Devonshire Cream.

Cherries and Cream Sweetheart Scones



2 c plus 2 Tbsp plain flour
1/3 plus 2 Tbsp sugar
1 T baking powder
1/2 tsp salt
6 Tbsp chilled unsalted butter, cut into 12 pieces
2/3 c dried cherries
1 c heavy cream

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

In a large bowl, combine all the dry ingredients. Add the butter, using your fingertips or a pastry blender and blend all the ingredients together until the mixture resembles coarse meal. Using a fork, stir in the cherries and then the cream to form a soft dough. Let stand 2 minutes.

Transfer the dough to a lightly floured surface. Sprinkle the top of the dough with the two remaining tablespoons of flour. Using your fingertips, gently press out the dough into a round ½ inch thick. Using a floured heart-shaped cookie cutter 3 inches in diameter, cut out the scones. Transfer to an ungreased cookie sheet 2 inches apart. Gather up the scraps and cut out as many scones as possible. Or you can score the round into triangles if you wish. Sprinkle the remaining sugar on top of the scones and bake about 15 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from oven and let cool on a wire rack. Makes 12 scones.

Join in the Celebrations of the Louisiana Purchase Land Survey Bicentennial 1815-2015 "THE Point of Beginning"



Living-history interpreters will be needed for these celebrations during the year.

THE BIG EVENT:

October 17 – Arkansas is celebrating the Louisiana Purchase Land Survey Bicentennial with a public event hosted by the Mississippi River State Park. This event will have several venues. 1) At the Mississippi River State Park/St. Francis National Forest Visitor Center, visitors can meet 19th-century characters like those who might have lived or worked in the area in 1815. 2) At the Confluence of the St. Francis and the Mississippi Rivers, visitors can help an 1815-period survey crew. 3) At the Louisiana Purchase State Park, visitors can meet surveyors involved with the 1922 resurvey as well as all those ladies and gentlemen involved with the 1926 dedication of the monument marking *THE* Initial Point. 4) At the St. Francis National Forest Base Line Trail, visitors can learn about the various plants and animals mentioned in the surveyors' journals while meeting some of the survey crew – the hunter and the camp keeper – those who were responsible for feeding the survey crew.

This celebration is only the culmination of several scheduled events which will be announced next month with more information!

Example:

October 16 – Living history interpreters also are needed for a school day at Mississippi River State Park on Friday, October 16.

These specific interpretations are under the direction of the MS River State Park and, to assure all living-history interpreters are on the same page, some coordination sessions or training will be available.
