RIVERVIEW TREES DAMAGED **DURING AUGUST WIND & RAIN STORMS**

Board members discovered the power of wind! Huge trees were on the ground on top of monuments and blocking interior roads. We piled many truck loads of branches next to the Visitor Center. Davey Tree Company has us on the schedule for September!

Friends of Historic Riverview Cemetery assumed ownership in 2009. A year later. John Kerns created an Urban Forestry Tree Management Plan. At that time there were 227 mature trees composed of 45 different species. Some of the trees were estimated to be over 200 years old.

Since then, an additional 100 bare-root trees have been planted by Delaware Center for Horticulture volunteers providing an attractive screen between the cemetery property and Kingdom Hall at the Southeast end of the cemetery as well as smaller trees along the roadways.

Going back further in time to 1872, one of the first orders of business was the purchase and planting of 222 trees! (more info: Nov. 2016 newsletter on website)

BIRTH OF A BOOK IN SEPTEMBER 2005


My connection to Riverview Cemetery started as a young child when Pop-Pop took me for walks in the cemetery. It was just one block away from his home at 3116 Jefferson Street. I learned later that he took other grandchildren for walks too. He liked to visit the grave of his mother and sister, Ruth, who died at age 16. My special memories of Nana and Pop-Pop were of sleepovers, picking roses in the garden, sitting on the front porch swing, and walking to Eastlake Methodist church.

My Dad's parents, (Grandmom and Grandpop) lived on Boxwood Rd. near the GM plant where Dad worked. I remember helping Dad mow the lawn at their home and delicious Sunday dinners served on fancy china.

As a young adult, all four of my grandparents died between 1980 and 1986; their final resting place is in Section 14 (Martha and Walter Kylen) and Section F (Llena and George Anderson). I attended the burials and visited with my parents on special days like Mother's Day and Father's Day.


I had very little exposure to Riverview Cemetery until my Dad (Tom Anderson) died in 1998 at the age of 71. The cemetery was in poor condition and by 2000 it was in bankruptcy. I cut grass with others and noticed the names on hundreds of tombstones. I felt deeply connected to the 'underground neighborhood' during this time of personal grief.

Little did I know at that time that I would embark on a 5 year project and self-publish *Reading the Stones - A Collection of Memories from the First State* in September 2005. The book is a tribute to the value of each life.
