A special thanks to the man who voluntarily gave our group a donation. I couldn't reach him by phone to ask his permission to mention his name, but he knows who he is.

In March we began clearing away the grasses away from the basal leaves of the spring flowers. That way the sun can reach them and they'll bloom. Because the meadow used to be a lawn, its grasses keep coming back; and if we don't make an effort to pull them, we wouldn't have many flowers.

The cold weather delayed the early bloomers and we're still looking forward to soon seeing spiderworts, field sorrel, showy primrose, daisy fleabane, toad flax, and lyre leaf For information and identification of the flowers, we have some printouts in a covered box on the fence nearest the clubhouse.

In March we went to back to Haw Creek Preserve in Flagler County to see the blooms we saw in February only as buds and also went to Ravine State Park in Palatka.

We meet the first Saturday

of each month at about 8:30 by the Riverview Club House and welcome newcomers. Our goal is to tend the wild

flower meadow, learn about native plants, what grows in this location, and how to care for it. We want to share our knowledge, learn what others know, and occasionally visit state and county parks. 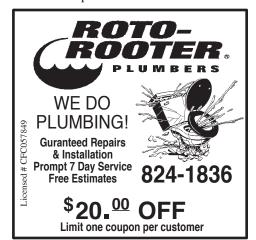

#### The Choir of Canterbury Catheral

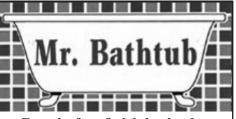
The world-renowned Choir of Canterbury will be coming to St. Augustine April 17, 2015 at 7:30 pm at Memorial presbyterian Čhurch.

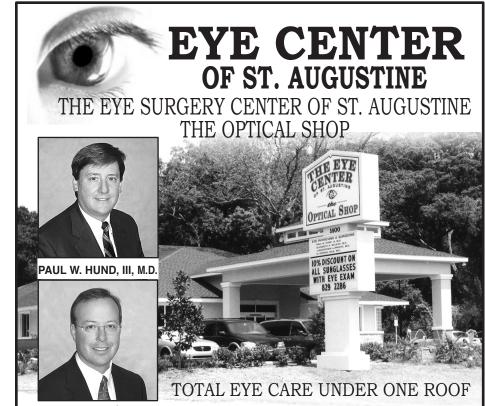

Directors wanted to see future Board action on the following;

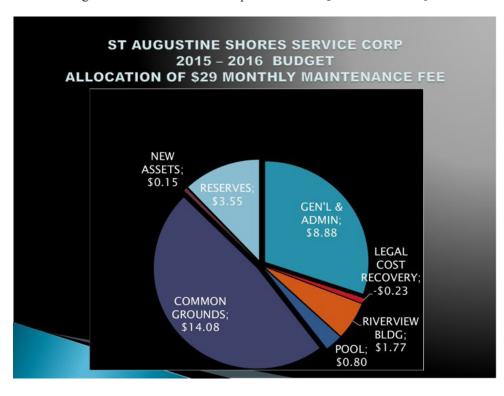

#### **Care for Your Computer**

Greetings from Computer Professor

In this column I will discuss part 2 of the care for your computer, a follow-up of last month's article. Care for your computer falls into two major categories; the hardware (the physical part of the computer) and the software (Windows, programs, drivers and personal files) installed and stored on your computer's hard drive. This month covers the software operation of the computer. Windows is made so that it does what you tell it to do. You have almost complete control over what it does and how it looks. So far, our culture has skipped over training at that level and has us learning the hard way. Below are a few common hot spots for mistakes, even the same stuff can have a major impact over controlling the computer.

The Computer: On/off issues

- When you turn on your computer give it time for everything to fully load, it is still busy when you first see the desktop, that's not the time to stay clicking on things
- When you shut it down, use the start>shutdown commands and NOT the power button, the computer has a very important routine to run while shutting down, which it cannot do if you use the power button
- IF you always keep the computer left on (or in sleep mode), that means you have a constant good source of power and cool temperatures for the computer 24 hours a day, it also means that at least once a week you restart your computer to clear the RAM and allow for windows updates

The Mouse: What you do with the mouse determines what you tell the computer to do.

- The POINT of the mouse is the only active part of the mouse, keep the point on your target
- Pointing to an object can give you an explanation

of what you are pointing at

- Clicking is always down and up with the mouse button without moving the pointer at all • Pressing the mouse pointer down while pointing at a control object does nothing, it activates the object when you release the mouse button - so hold the mouse still
- Double-clicking is two clicks IN THE SAME SPOT, again – hold the mouse still
- Files and Folders: You save files into folders YOU create your own folders, location, names and quantity then save your files into them
- · Unless you have changed Windows settings, folders are opened with a double-click
- You MUŜT open a folder to save a file into it
- All saving processes give you the chance to name the file and designate what folder for it to

Programs: These are the tools you use to do something – anything!

- Know what programs you are using, the name is all over the program and the button you hit to start it
- You want to do something well, then learn more about the program you are using

Peripherals: Everything you plug into the computer: printers, USB drives etc. need drivers installed first to communicate.

Updates: Due to technology advances, security concerns, fixes and improvements Windows will always have updates to keep it running smooth. Your antivirus program, which you should always know what it is, will update automatically as new "bad things" are discovered. As long as we still need to use it, Java needs to stay updated because of its importance and vulnerability. Other than that, it is up to what you have on your computer and what is plugged into it.

## **Pandiculation**

Padicu...what? Pandiculation is involuntary stretching of soft tissues. You've probably seen your dog or cat perform such stretches upon waking from a nap or even experienced the refreshing feeling yourself. Yawning is a perfect example of pandiculation - arms stretched over head, back arched. It's a stretch that can't be stopped. But why do our bodies do such strange things?

One current hypothesis is that it helps regulate our locomotor or musculoskeletal system. Most people know muscles move bones, which create movement but few have heard about fascia. Fascia is the fabric that helps hold us together and more. Current research now tells us fascia not only holds us together but also plays an integrative role with muscles. It helps distribute forces as we move and assist in locomotion.

So why stretch or pandiculate? Although fascia is a durable connective tissue and remains lubricated and mobile with movement, it can become sticky and stiff with the lack thereof, hence the need to "pandiculate" or yawn upon rising from rest. Such stretches are thought to reverse the affects of the stillness of sleeping. The purpose of this column is to emphasize the need to stretch.

Chances are, the last time many of you stretched with a goal in mind was when you participated in "hips, ankles, knees and toes" during elementary school PE. The fact is, stretching should be a regular part of one's life. Gentle stretches to the neck, shoulders, back, hips and legs are thought to decreases compressive forces to the joints, and only take a few minutes. I've been focusing on posture in my last few columns because it is our daily, habitual postures, in part, dictate how we hold ourselves and move. If you tend to sit at the computer much of the day you should reverse the affects by stretching your shoulders back as you walk through the door or stretch your front hip muscles by placing your hands on your hips and bending

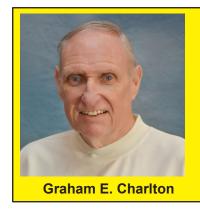
backwards. As I've shown, your body will automatically attempt to maintain the mobility of soft tissue via pandiculation (involuntary stretches). Voluntary, and routine, stretching is bound to have a greater and longer lasting effect.

If you are getting stiffer or feel you are losing range of motion, perhaps you should consult your physician or physical therapist regarding a stretching program. It may be that a stretching program can be designed specifically for you.

There are also many group exercise programs offered in St. Augustine. Why not be a part of one? You can tell them you joined because you have a need

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## Tips On Buying Life Insurance

Life insurance protects your financial future. It provides the resources your family or business may need to pay immediate and continuing expenses when you die. There are different types of life insurance and choosing a policy is an important decision.

Make sure that you fully understand any policy you're considering and that you're comfortable with the company, agent, and product.

Ask for outlines of coverage so you can compare the features of several policies.

Check with your state insurance department to make sure the company and agent are licensed in your state.

Look for a company that is reputable and financially strong. A number of insurance rating services rate the financial strength of companies. You can get such information from your agent, public or business libraries, or on the Internet.

Beware of offers for "free" life insurance. Investors may approach some seniors to offer them money to buy life insurance and then sell the policy to the investors. The investors expect to profit by receiving the death benefit when the senior dies. Often called stranger-originated life insurance, legislators and regulators are concerned about these transactions because they violate public policies against wagering on human life. Also, there may be hidden pitfalls, such as unexpected taxes, fees, and loss of privacy.

Always answer questions on your life insurance application truthfully.

Be sure your application has been filled out accurately. Promptly notify your agent or company of errors or missing information.

When you buy a policy, make your check payable to the insurance company, not the agent. Be sure to get a receipt.

Contact the company or agent if you don't get your policy within 60 days.

Always check the date the insurance becomes effective.

Keep your life insurance policy with your other financial records or legal papers, or anywhere your survivors are likely to look for it. However, don't keep your policy in your safe deposit box. In most states, boxes are sealed temporarily on the death of the owner, delaying a settlement when funds may be needed most.

Review your policy periodically or when a major event occurs in your life—such as a birth, divorce, remarriage, or retirement—to be sure your coverage is adequate and your beneficiaries are correctly named.

#### Are You Following a "Tax-smart" **Investment Strategy?**

We're getting closer to April 15: Tax Filing Day. And while there may not be much you can do to change your results for the 2014 tax year, you can certainly look closely at your tax returns to find areas you might be able to improve next year - and one such area is your investment portfolio.

Of course, you may also find opportunities in other places, too. Could you have taken more deductions? Could you have moved some of your debts into a tax-deductible loan, such as a home equity loan or line of credit? You'll want to consult with your tax advisor to determine areas of potential savings.

However, you may be able to brighten your tax picture by making some "tax-smart" investment moves, such as the following:

• Resist the urge to trade frequently. It can be costly to constantly buy and sell investments. In addition to the commissions you may incur, and the possibility that such excessive trading can impede a consistent investment strategy, you could rack up a sizable tax bill. If you sell an asset that you've held for a year or less, any profit you earn is considered a short-term capital gain, which is taxed at the same rate as your ordinary income. So, for example, if you bought Investment ABC for \$1,000 on January 5, 2014, and you sold it for \$1,250 on Dec. 31, 2014, you'd be taxed on your \$250 gain. If you are in the 28% tax bracket, you'd owe \$70 in taxes. But if you had waited until January 6, 2015, and you sold your investment for the same \$250 gain, you'd pay the more favorable long-term capital gains tax rate of 15%, which translates into \$37.50 in taxes — just over half of what you'd owe at the short-term rate. If you habitually sold investments after owning them less than a year, the taxes

could really add up -so try to be a "buyand-hold" investor.

• Increase your 401(k) contributions. If you aren't already participating in your 401(k) or similar plan, start now. And if you are contributing, boost your contributions whenever your salary goes up. You typically put "pretax" dollars in your 401(k), so the more you add, the lower your annual taxable income. Plus, your earnings can grow tax deferred.

• "Max out" on your IRA. Depending on your income level, you may be able to deduct some, or all, of your contributions to your traditional IRA — and these deductible contributions can lower your taxable income. Plus, your investment can grow tax deferred. (Keep in mind, though, that taxes will be due upon withdrawal, and any withdrawals made before you reach 59½ are subject to a 10% IRS penalty.)

If you contribute to a Roth IRA, your contributions are never deductible and won't lower your taxable income, but your earnings are distributed tax free, provided you've had your account at least five years and you are older than 59½. In 2015, you can contribute \$5,500 to your IRA, plus an additional \$1,000 catch-up contribution if you are 50 or older— and it's almost always a good idea to "max out" your contributions each year.

By following a buy-and-hold investment strategy and using those taxbuy-and-hold advantaged accounts available to you, you may be able to help yourself — at tax time and beyond.

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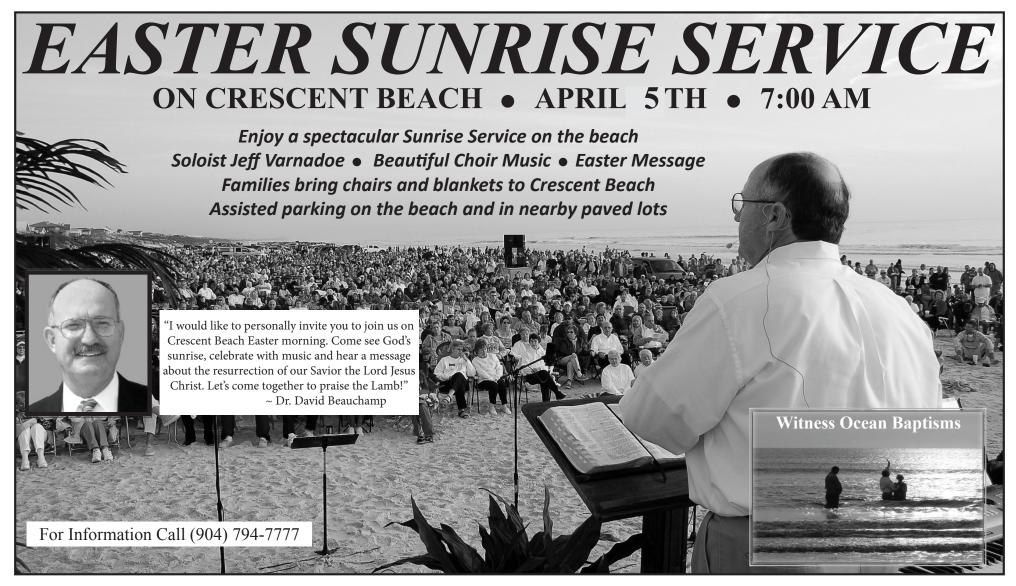


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## St. Johns Business Network and Betty Griffin House Team Up!

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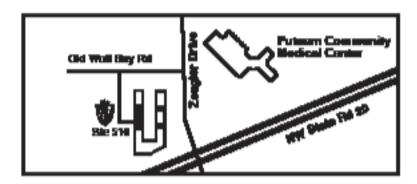
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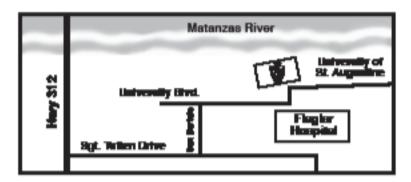
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
