<u>Italian Heritage</u> <u>Best Hidden Gems in Italy</u>

In the Northwest area of Italy, the spectacular Cinque Terre dominates the Liguria region. However, another hidden gem is Genoa (*pronounced jeh now uh*), the capital of the region with



a population of 583,600, more authentic and less touristic. It is Italy's Sixth-largest city and is called "La Superba" (the superb) for its history and cultural offerings. The Port of Genoa is Italy's busiest seaport and major trading center. Genoa is also the birthplace of Christopher Columbus.





Genoa was a rich financial center back in the 1400s. The wealthy built many palazzi's (palaces, public buildings or private residence). Genoa has over 150 palaces and many of them are very beautiful. Forty-two of these palaces became UNESCO World Heritage sites in 2006.

If you walk through the narrow streets of Via Garibaldi you will see swanky shops, galleries, boutiques, mansions and baroque palaces which give a glimpse of the rich Italian heritage of art and sculpture. Stop in at the Strada Nuova museums (**Musei di**

Strada Nuova) book store and purchase a ticket for about \$10 that will give you access to three of the most preserved palaces in the city. Palazzo Rosso, Palazzo Blanco and Palazzo Tursi.

Be sure to visit the Porto Antico (old port of Genoa) where you will find shops, restaurants, bars and events. A very popular tourist spot is the Maritime Museum "Galata" (Galata Museo Del Mare) which has the largest Aquarium (Acquario di Genoa) in the Mediterranean (a must see!). A landmark you don't want to miss is the Lighthouse (lanterna). It's a 384 feet tall beacon that is visible for 20 miles.



Genoa is built in tiers, there are lots of staircases that act as streets. A fun way to get between layers is the funicular. There are three of these inclined "elevators" that scale the various parts of the hill, so ride one up to the top for a fabulous view (as well as a fun rail ride!).

Seafood is very natural in this region. Popular fish are cod, mussel and cuttlefish. The best know dish is **burrida**, a stew slow-cooked with monkfish, squid, king prawns, mussels, garlic, onion and tomato. Salty anchovies is very popular, along with fried fish.

If you like pesto, you will like Pesto Genovese. A sauce made with pine nuts, basil, oil, garlic and cheese.



All over Italy you will find focaccia bread, but Genovese style is slightly different. It is less thick, flavoring is classic, with lots of oil and salt.

You can visit an old fisherman's village in the city called Bocadasse. There are many fishing boats. Lounge by the sea and enjoy the surroundings.
